

WHISKY WAREHOUSE

IN DUBIN RAIDED

Attack Is in Pursuance of Belfast Goods Boycott.

LIQUOR IS DESTROYED

Official Estimate of Damage Not Yet Made—100 Armed Men Take Part in Raid.

DUBLIN, April 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—The worst attack yet made in pursuance of the boycott on Belfast goods took place at 3 o'clock this morning when the bonded stores of the custom house were raided and large quantities of wine and whisky, mostly from a Belfast distillery, with which Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, is connected, were destroyed. One hundred men, armed with revolvers, sledge hammers and pickaxes, broke into the premises where they smashed casks of liquor, pouring it over the floor and into the city sewers.

An official estimate of the damage has not yet been made, but the Dublin Evening Mail places the figure at hundreds of thousands of pounds. Most of this, however, was in duty, so the loss to the government. The boycott committee states that 6000 casks were destroyed, or, roughly, half a million gallons. It estimated the value of the liquor, apart from the duty, at £250,000.

Armed Men on Parade.

NOMAD RIGHTS ASSERTED

Migratory Workers Declared Asset, Not "Ordinary Bums."

COLUMBUS, O., April 7.—Establishment of a country-wide employment bureau, under the direction of the national secretary of the Migratory Workers' union, designed to help members establish a fixed place of residence, as well as obtain jobs, is called for in a resolution adopted here today at the national convention of the union.

"The organization represents millions of workers, who, on account of their nomadic life are deprived of the right to vote," John Kelley of Chicago, national secretary, said. "If men are sent to their jobs from a certain point with the understanding that they are to be furnished transportation back to that point by the employer, they may establish their residence there. By doing this they will take a large step toward the effort to show society that the transient worker is in reality an important factor in the economic life of the nation and not an ordinary 'bum.'"

SCHOOL TAX IS REDUCED

Cottage Grove Board to Raise \$2600 Less This Year.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—The tentative budget to be submitted by the board shows a reduction of \$2600 in the amount of money to be raised by direct taxation in the district, being the first reduction in a number of years. This is despite the addition of another high school teacher and an addition of \$600 to the budget for the year. The sum of \$1800 will be received for the conduct of departments under the federal Smith-Hughes act.

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REPORT FOR 1921 MADE BY COMPTROLLER OF CURRENCY.

Of Total, 163 Institutions Able to Reopen or Otherwise Liquidate Liabilities.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—The calendar year 1921 a total of 628 state and private banks in the country were closed, according to a statement issued today by Comptroller of the Currency Crissinger, summarizing bank failures for the year. However, he added, 163 of these banks were able to reopen or otherwise liquidate their liabilities.

The liabilities of the other 365 banks, he reported, aggregated approximately \$98,000,000, making the average per bank about \$263,000. The southern geographical division, Mr. Crissinger said, was the most seriously affected in respect to the number of bank failures and the volume of liabilities, there being 131 failures, with liabilities totaling \$27,000,000 in that section.

Failures in the western states, he continued, numbered 122 and the liabilities exceeded \$16,000,000. In the middle states the number of failures was 40 and the reported liabilities \$9,500,000. Failures in the north-eastern states, with liabilities of \$3,600,000, Mr. Crissinger said, and four in the New England states, where liabilities were \$1,700,000.

The calendar year 1921, Mr. Crissinger said, was the third most disastrous year with regard to number of failures of national banks in the history of the national banking system, there being 37 national bank failures with liabilities of \$23,677,847. The most disastrous year in this respect was 1893, when 65 failures occurred, and the next was 1897, when 51 failures occurred.

There were, he explained, 49 re-openings in 1921, but in three cases the banks were restored to solvency and authorized to resume business.

SNOW IS 27 FEET DEEP

LA GRANDE MAN DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR.

SALEM, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—Walter Pierce, democrat, residing at La Grande, today filed with the secretary of state his declaration of candidacy for the nomination for governor at the primary election May 19. His platform reads: "Veto every bill and every such item in every appropriation bill that is not absolutely necessary. I will reduce the present state tax budget \$1,000,000. I will do everything in my power to secure enactment of an income law that will produce sufficient revenue to pay one-half of the state tax. I promise that all money raised by the income tax shall be used to lower the property tax. I will protect the free public schools and institutions of higher learning. I will oppose oriental ownership of land. I will favor abolishing unnecessary commissions."

EUGENE MAN SENTENCED

H. O. BOWEN PLEADS GUILTY TO EMBEZZLEMENT.

Manager of Branch of Portland Wholesale House Gets Five Years in Penitentiary.

EUGENE, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—H. O. Bowen, for seven years manager of the Eugene branch of Allen & Lewis Portland wholesale grocers, was indicted by the Lane county grand jury today on a charge of embezzlement, pleaded guilty immediately afterward and was sentenced to serve five years in the penitentiary. Within 45 minutes after the indictment was reported he had boarded a train in custody of Sheriff Stickle.

Bowen was charged in the indictment with embezzling \$723.67 of the company's funds, but District Attorney Johnston stated in court that as manager and treasurer of the Allen & Lewis company he has made a signed statement that he was short \$24,523.96 in his accounts, the money having been taken through the use of fraudulent vouchers for merchandise purchases. The district attorney said that Bowen had been indicted on this charge on March 2, when an investigation of his accounts was begun by the company and he was asked to resign.

C. A. Hardy, attorney for Bowen, said that he possessed to make restitution to the company and had largely paid back the amount taken. The defendant has a large family, said Hardy, "which he had undertaken to maintain in a place in society beyond his means. Under these financial circumstances Bowen used this money."

Bowen came here from Bellingham, Wash. He has served as city school director and president of the chamber of commerce here, and has been a prominent worker in the Methodist church and Y. M. C. A.
