

## OREGON'S POSITION TOLD TO JAPANESE

Mr. Meier Points to Relations  
With Orient.

### BIG OPPORTUNITIES SEEN

1925 Exposition Held Key to New  
Friendships and Broader Fields  
for Trade Development.

Oregon's position before the world in outlining plans for the 1925 fair forms the text of an extensive interview, published at Tokyo, by Julius L. Meier, representing the 1925 exposition, who reached Yokohama with his party March 10 aboard the Japanese liner Taiyo Maru.

In setting forth the relationship between the two countries Mr. Meier is quoted as follows:

"The fact that Japan buys more goods from the United States than all the rest of the orient combined and that a relatively large part of the foreign commerce of Japan is with the United States, is the foundation of an understanding between the two countries conducive of close co-operation and cordial relations. Since the close of the world war the flag of Japan has been seen more frequently in the Columbia river and along the coast than in any previous 120 years."

**New Opportunities Seen.**  
Mr. Meier dealt with prospects for world peace and touched on results looked for from the peace conference.

"As the commissioner of the Atlantic-Pacific Highways and Electrical Exposition, authorized by the congress of the United States to invite the nations of the world to participate in a world's fair to be held at Portland, Oregon, in 1925," continued Mr. Meier, "I have the honor to bear a message of good will and opportunity. Though Oregon is only a single state, I believe it is a commonwealth well designed to serve as hostess to the nations of the world in the first great fraternal assembly since the coming of peace—an assembly where each nation will discover new friendships, new ties, new trade advantages, new fields for economic development and a broadened conception of human progress."

### Portland's Record Cited.

In conclusion the Advertiser says: "In speaking of the advantages of Portland for an exposition of this nature, Mr. Meier said that the Pacific northwest in which Portland is situated is incomparably rich in natural resources and most logically developed far beyond its present important rating in world trade. Exports from Oregon in 1921 and 1922 during the same year more than \$2,218,000 of goods from foreign countries were discharged at that port."

"Mr. Meier also pointed out that Portland made a remarkable record in waterborne commerce in 1921, saying that notwithstanding the tremendous drop in prices of commodities, the export shipments for that year from Portland exceeded by more than \$2,000,000 the exports for 1920."

## SEATTLE, TACOMA MAY BURY HATCHET

Overtures Being Made to End  
Long-Standing Feud.

### INTER-CITY GROUP LIKELY

Organization of Committee Sought  
to Work in Harmony—Programme Is Outlined.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 7.—Coinciding with the removal of the Northern Pacific railroad executive headquarters from Tacoma to Seattle, overtures are being made between Seattle and Tacoma to form an inter-city committee in an effort to work in harmony. The shifting of the Northern Pacific to Seattle recalls the intensity of the rivalry between the two cities in the past. For much of this the railroad, which made Tacoma its original terminal and attempted to divert everything away from Seattle, was responsible. Whether or not there is significance in the move to harmonize the two sound communities just when the primary source of antagonism in daily life is shifting its base to Seattle, is a subject of speculation. Today the railroad may be the harmonizer. In the '80s and '90s Seattle resented the discrimination and the effort at that time to crush its ambitions.

### WIDOW'S SHARE IS ATTACKED

Violation of Clause in Will Is  
Charged in Suit.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, April 7.—Under the terms of the will of the late William Chappell, whose estate is appraised at \$681,540, any

one contesting the will is to receive no benefit from it. Two brothers, Marion J. Chappell of Wendling, Or., and Charles Chappell of Swiss Home, Or., have petitioned the superior court to apply that special provision to the widow, who receives one-third of the estate under the terms of the instrument. The brothers say that Mrs. Chappell is giving aid to Chappell's son by a former marriage. The son, Edmund Chappell of San Francisco, seeks to break the will. He was to receive only \$2000. If he succeeds in his case he would receive one-half the estate and the widow the other half. The brothers allege that the widow did not act in good faith when she did not oppose the petition of the son. William Chappell was a wealthy Klondiker, who owned valuable property in Seattle, including the Bush hotel.

### RUM-RUNNERS ARE CONVICTED

Seattle ex-Fireman Found Guilty  
of Defying Customs Officers.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 7.—On charges of obstructing customs officers in the performance of their duty, A. H. Johnson, Seattle ex-fireman, and C. W. Lewis of the launch C'sco have been convicted by a Vancouver, B. C., court, according to information received here by the federal authorities. They were captured March 6 when the C'sco left Vancouver harbor with 101 cases of liquors without reporting to Canadian customs officers on entering or clearing the harbor. The C'sco is a cruiser type launch, with two masts, and has been active in the rum-running trade. At intervals since Washington went dry Johnson has been in the federal courts in Seattle on charges of smuggling and rum-running.

### FIRE PROTECTION CHEAPER

Seattle Chief Reports \$66,000 of  
Appropriation Saved.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, April 7.—This city spent \$1,537,063 to

operate its fire department in 1921. Chief Mantor, in his annual report just filed, says this is \$66,000 less than the appropriation for the year. Fire loss amounted to \$757,372. There were 2166 alarms, of which 297 were false. Fire endangered property worth \$24,000,000, on which insurance of \$18,000,000 was carried. Salaries totaled \$1,305,821, while other expenses and new equipment amounted to \$231,252.

### Fish Packers to Can Fruit.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 7.—From salmon packing to fruit canning is the change to be made in the plant of the Lummi Bay Packing company's plant on Lummi island, near Bellingham. This is one of the large salmon canneries on Puget sound. The Lummi Bay Packing company will remove all but one of the nine lines of fish canning machinery to make room for the fruit equipment. It will be ready this year. The concern has many acres of its own bearing fruit, and will rather much of its material from the San Juan islands.

### Rotary Division Opposed.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, April 7.—By unanimous vote the Seattle Rotary club has declared its opposition to the plan of dividing the 22d district into two parts. This action was telegraphed to the international board at Portland, which is considering the division of the territory now including part of Oregon, Washington, British Columbia and Alaska.

### Milestone Fund Is Assured.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 7.—With a quota of \$18 from each of the 19 counties in Washington with minute women organizations, Mrs. Edgar Ames, state treasurer of the fund, announces that these counties will contribute toward the cost of the state of Washington

milestone to be erected at Chateau Thierry. This is one of the 240 monuments to mark the battle line where the advance of the enemy was stemmed by the allies in 1918.

### GRAND ARMY TO CONVENE

Washington and Alaska Veterans  
to Be Aberdeen Guests.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—Arrangements are under way for the 1922 encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, including Washington and Alaska, which will be held here the week following June 25. A committee composed of C. P. L. Roberts, Isaac Miles and James Birmingham were looking today for a suitable hall in which to hold their convention. It will be necessary to have two meeting halls, as the Women's Relief corps will meet here at the same time as the Grand Army. It is expected that about 500 veterans will be here, and a number of them will be accompanied by their wives.

### Temple to Receive Imperial Prince

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—Gus Meese of Spokane, imperial prince of the Dramatic Order, Knights of Khorassan, will come to Aberdeen April 21 for an official visit to Te-hama Temple No. 150, and will remain for the Knights of Pythias District No. 6 convention to be held here April 22.

### Commencement Exercises Planned.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—Arrangements were made by the senior class of Aberdeen high school yesterday for the commencement exercises and other activities attendant to graduation, and for the annual senior play, which will be given in the Grand theater April 23.

Commencement exercises will be held Tuesday evening, June 12, in the high school auditorium, with the class service in one of the churches the preceding Sunday. Class night will be celebrated Monday, June 12.

## APPLE YIELD GOOD ONE

Yakima Output Per Tree Near  
Record for 1919.

YAKIMA, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—The average yield of apples and pears per tree here in 1921 was close to the record yield of 1919 and much above the average for the eight-year period, 1914-1921, inclusive, according to figures compiled by W. L. Close, district horticultural inspector. The average yield of apples in this district last year was 3.94 boxes compared with 3.24 boxes for the eight-year period. Pear production in 1921 was 5.14 boxes per tree compared with 1.86 boxes for the eight-year period. Peaches, which suffered heavily in the winter of 1919-20, but some of which survived, came back last year with a production of 7.10 boxes per tree, a figure exceeded only three times in the eight-year period.

RAYMOND, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the Raymond Rotary club, held at the Hotel Raymond this afternoon, the following officers were elected: J. W. Mason, president; W. H.
