

BIG MINING DREAMS SHAPING INTO FACT

Cottage Grove District Is
Scene of Activity.

REPORT STIRS INTEREST

**\$350,000 to Be Spent on Bohemia
Claims as Result of Probe by
Authoritative Engineer.**

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—With the organization with eastern capital of the Oregon-Ohio Mines corporation and the announcement that \$350,000 is to be spent within the next two years in developing the Fairview, Crystal and adjoining claims in the Bohemia district, it seems that the dreams of a half century are to be realized.

Included in the group already owned by this corporation and controlled through options are properties which already have produced gold estimated at \$2,000,000.

Main Office at Cottage Grove.

The corporation, which is capitalized at \$1,000,000 and organized under the laws of Oregon, with its main office in Cottage Grove, is the result of the report of Hugh M. Henton of Cleveland, a mining engineer of note. While his report, a voluminous one, bears the earmarks of conservatism, yet he predicts that the district will develop into the best paying proposition of its kind in Oregon.

Mr. Henton speaks with the authority of experience in many of the mining districts of the United States, as an instructor in the Case School of Applied Science of Cleveland, and as a consulting metallurgical engineer who has handled some of the big propositions of the country. He also is an author of some note upon mining subjects. He will be personally in active charge of operations in the district.

Development Work First.

The reason which always has been given by operators for failure of the district to take its destined position in the mining industry has been the lack of a cheap method of treating low grade ores. Always they have said that metallurgy was the hope of the district. It is by this process, of which he is a master, that Mr. Henton predicts that the Oregon & Ohio properties are to become large producers. The first two years of operation, however, will be devoted entirely to development work, with no attempt to take the gold out of the ores. The mine must first be developed is his statement.

J. H. Boldon of Cleveland, ex-resident of this city, was the moving spirit in interesting eastern capital in the district. He is the president of the organization. Other officers and incorporators are G. W. McQueen, vice president; William H. Ostrander, secretary; Jack Klopfenstein and Ed Jenks, all of Cottage Grove, and for many years owners of property in the Bohemia district.

TRAIN HITS AUTO; 1 DEAD

Mrs. John Parkes Killed, Spouse
Injured in Crossing Wreck.

ELLENSBURG, Wash., April 7.—Mrs. John Parkes was killed, her husband injured, probably fatally, and three cars of the westbound Columbian limited of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad were derailed in a crossing accident here today.

The accident occurred near the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul depot. According to eye witnesses, Mr. Parkes was driving his automobile between the cars of a freight train that had been cut at a street crossing. He saw the Columbian approaching on another track, but was unable to avoid the train. The passenger train struck the automobile, throwing it against a switch and turning it. The locomotive crossed the switch safely, but the mail, baggage and refrigerator cars were derailed, striking and derailing three of the cars in the freight train.

POWER PLAN IS OFFERED

COMMISSIONER MAKES PROPOSAL TO COUNCIL.

Two Auxiliary Steam Plants Are
Suggested to Relieve Tacoma
of Future Shortages.

TACOMA, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—Recommendation that the city of Tacoma abandon its auxiliary power tie-up arrangements with the Puget Sound Power & Light company, through its subsidiary, the Tacoma Railway & Power company, and install two auxiliary steam turbine plants, providing sufficient prime power to offset the city's estimated 1922 shortage of 12,500 horsepower at a cost of \$369,177 for a two-year period, was made to the city council today by Commissioner Davidson of the light and water department.

Confronted with the problem of separation from the Tacoma Railway & Power company for an exchange of surplus power, and the impossibility of constructing Lake Cushman plant units in time to meet the certain shortage of power supply, Commissioner Davidson said his investigations had found this recommendation to be the best and cheapest method of meeting the emergency.

TUNNEL TASK ADVANCING

Crews Expect to Complete 400 Feet
of Hard Surfacing by May 15.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—Crews of the Young-McDonough company engaged in hard-surfacing a 400-foot O.W. R. & N. company tunnel between here and Mosier expect to complete the task by May 15. The work will cost approximately \$60,000. Delays have been experienced as a result of the shattered condition of the roof and sides of the rock bore, the timbered shoring of which burned out last summer. The fire from the heavy, pitch-laden timbers reached a furnace-like intensity and the rocks were cracked to a great depth.

Traffic has been maintained by a shooft track around the promontory pierced by the tunnel.

Veteran Favored for Postmaster.
