

U. S. MADE POLICY

Visitor From Shanghai Declares New Law Necessary.

AMERICAN FIRMS ARE HIT

Even Break With Other Foreigners Held Possible by Passage of Act Pending in Congress.

American business men can never compete successfully with the Germans, English or French in China until this country adopts a standard corporation law, such as is provided in the Chinese trade act, according to J. D. Powell, a member of the Shanghai, China, American chamber of commerce, who was here yesterday conferring with W. D. Dodson of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Powell said that he was of the fact that all American firms in China are working under American laws. He said that the Chinese government has a number of laws which are in conflict with the American laws, and that the American firms must conform to the Chinese laws, which is a disadvantage to them.

China Trade Act Remedy. "The Chinese trade act which undoubtedly will be passed, will remedy this condition of affairs," declared Mr. Powell. "America wants to establish trade relations with China, but she has given her business men who go to the orient no aid. The American has little chance compared with the English, German or French who also work under their own laws. The American business man in China finds it is compelled to pay taxes to this country. His other competitors among the foreigners do not do this. I know of one case where an American organized a concern and the first year his profits were as great as that of an American firm. He had to discontinue his business because he was not permitted to hold all of its profits. This concern placed a sum equal to that the American had paid in taxes into its reserve. Bad years came and the French concern had a special reserve. The American had nothing and went bankrupt."

U. S. Policy Held Short-sighted. "Our shortsighted policy in the orient is harmful to American business interests. If we are to develop business in China we must have Americans there to do so. These men cannot get business unless they receive aid from home. We might just as well cease sending our ships to China unless we have Americans there to give them cargo."

Mr. Powell declares that the China trade act not only gives American business men a fair chance, but also gives them a fair chance to compete with the other foreigners who are exploiting China for business purposes.

Mr. Larabee did not retire, saying that one berth was not commodious enough for two. He sat in the smoking compartment for several hours, the porter said.

For Three Hours Elevator Is Kept Dashing Up 13-Story Shaft.

KANSAS CITY, April 12.—For three hours early today between 8 and 10 a. m. a 200-pound janitor, dashed from the basement to the 13th floor of the Rialto building here in an elevator, while janitors, porters and A. M. Marty, owner of the building tried to induce him to call it a night and leave his cage.

ALLEN J. MILLER, 87, DIES

Pioneer Came to Washington State 63 Years Ago.

TACOMA, Wash., April 12.—Allen J. Miller, one of the oldest pioneers of Washington, died here today, aged 87. Mr. Miller came to the state 63 years ago. He was born in Ireland in 1834 and when 15 years of age, he started for the Pacific northwest with his young wife by way of the Isthmus of Panama and San Francisco. He first settled in Stella-colum in 1859, and in 1865 moved to a farm near Puyallup, where he lived until a year ago, when he removed here. He was one of the oldest Masons in the northwest, having been a member of the Stella-colum Masonic lodge for 58 years.
