

FIRE CHIEF'S FOES MUST FILE CHARGES

Definite Action by Noon Today Is Ordered.

DELAY NOT TOLERATED

Commissioner Bigelow Announces Enemies May Be Tried for Insubordination in Bureau.

City Commissioner Bigelow yesterday demanded a showdown in the fire bureau row in which a group of firemen have threatened to present serious charges of misconduct against Fire Chief Young. The result of Mr. Bigelow's action was the serving of notice on Lieutenant A. L. Pullen, who is the only fireman who has come out in the open, that unless the promised charges are filed by noon today he must face charges of insubordination. Mr. Pullen said the charges will be filed before noon today.

Mr. Bigelow determined to stop the agitation in the bureau and have a settlement without further delay. In event the firemen do not make good by filing charges he says he will delve into the bureau and find Mr. Pullen's associates and have a general housecleaning.

Efficiency Is at Stake.

"The row has reached the point where the efficiency of the bureau is involved," said Mr. Bigelow. "When such a condition arises it is time for a housecleaning, and it makes no difference to me whom it hits. A fireman or any other employe has a right to make charges against a superior officer, but when he makes the statement public he must either produce reasonable charges or he is guilty of insubordination. Mr. Pullen is the only man in the present case who has appeared in the open and therefore the demand has been made on him. However, I believe I can find the others."

"There is going to be a complete settlement of this whole controversy whether the charges are filed or not. If they are filed I will give Chief Young a hearing and both sides will have full opportunity to present full testimony. If the charges are not filed it will be my duty to proceed against Mr. Pullen on charges of insubordination and to make whatever changes are necessary to get the bureau onto the basis it should be."

Mayor Takes Hand.

Before issuing his statement calling for some sort of a showdown that would put an end to the underground warfare that has been going on in the fire bureau for months, Mayor Baker held a conference with Commissioner Bigelow and pointed out to him that it would be necessary to take steps that would bring the entire controversy to a head.

Field Marshal Grenfell issued a statement denying that he had taken any part in any fight against Chief Young. He admitted that he was completely out of harmony with the present chief, but that he had been paying strict attention to his work.

"If any of the men in my force have been spreading untrue statements concerning the chief," said Battalion Chief Grenfell, "they should be ousted and I will aid in kicking them out."

Evidence May Be Offered.

"But I do not want to get into this fight. If I am dragged into it I will be ready to throw as much mud as the next one, and it will be the kind of mud that sticks, or, in other words, evidence that can be corroborated."

Chief Young called on Commissioner Bigelow and made formal demand that the charges threatened be filed. He informed Commissioner Bigelow that under present conditions he is unable to accomplish any of his work and that he was anxious to have it settled.

Other than the promise on the part of Lieutenant Pullen that the charges against the fire chief would be filed by noon today and the demand on the part of Mayor Baker and Commissioner Bigelow of "put up or face consequences, there were no other developments in the controversy.

CRIME PREVENTION URGED

SOCIETY MUST REVERSE POLICY, SAYS DOCTOR.

Great Amounts Expended on Jails and Prisons Largely Misdirected, Declares Visitor.

Far more money is spent to build jails and penitentiaries to lock people in after they have gone wrong and have signed against society than is expended on preventive measures, and this practice should be reversed, according to Dr. A. T. McCormack, state health officer of Kentucky and noted social worker, who addressed the Oregon Social Workers' association at its luncheon in the Seward hotel yesterday. A large crowd was present.

"The present principle, if such it may be called, of our system of handling social problems is wrong," said Dr. McCormack. "We must, if we wish to bring about better conditions, reverse our present policy in spending money for prisons, penitentiaries and asylums to care for people who have signed against society. Instead of putting so much money into these things, which are of questionable value, anyway, we should place more emphasis upon prevention of crime."

"It was not until recently that the people of this country paid any considerable attention to social work and then it has been carried on, for the most part, by volunteers who have been regarded more or less as little consequence by a big percentage of the people. The pioneer work, however, has brought about excellent results and more will follow as the necessity for expansion on a more systematic and well-supported basis grips the citizens."

Dog and Cat Form Team to Destroy Gophers.

Canine Digs Into Holes and Little Friend Nabs Pests.

The dog, a small black and white fellow of undetermined breed, with the cat at his heels, sniffs through the alfalfa or clover cover crops until he finds a gopher's burrow. When he begins to dig, the cat, also a black and white and displaying no pride of aristocratic antecedents, becomes active immediately, seeking an outlet of the burrow. Stopping occasionally to snort into the tunnel, the dog digs furiously, and pretty soon, simultaneous with one of those snorts, the cat is seen to pounce. Another gopher less is left in the Moe orchard. Sometimes the dog catches the gopher, the little animal fearful to move from its underground hiding. Invariably the dog, when the slaughter is complete, will turn over the prey to the cat, and the latter, walking with a pride that brings smiles to those who watch, struts off toward the farmhouse to display the kill.

SPAN HELD LEAST COSTLY

\$26,770 SAVING OVER SELLWOOD FERRY FIGURED.

Commissioners Favor Project but Oppose Bond Issue, Suggesting Plan to Use Interstate Tolls.

A concrete and steel bridge across the Willamette where the Sellwood ferry now plies could be erected and maintained for 46 years at a cost \$26,770 less than the operation of a ferry boat for that period, according to figures submitted to the Multnomah county commissioners yesterday by a delegation of 20 members of the Sellwood board of trade, headed by A. N. Willis, president.

The commissioners pledged their support to a movement having a bridge as its object, but expressed opposition to any attempt to raise the necessary money by a bond issue. With the present public attitude against bond issues such an effort would be "risky," they told the committee, suggesting as a possible alternative that the board of trade petition the state legislature to pass a bill providing that earnings of the interstate bridge may be applied to retirement of outstanding road bonds and for the construction of new bridges within the county.

Cost estimates presented figured that a new bridge would require an initial outlay of \$400,000 and could be maintained for 46 years, including interest payments, for \$450,800 more, making a total cost for that length of time of \$850,000.

For the same period a ferry system would cost the county \$1,034,000, it was estimated, including \$30,000 for the cost of a new ferry in 1934, \$25,000 a year in maintenance and \$100 a year insurance.

The matter of appropriating \$1500 toward the Multnomah county farm, requested by J. J. Johnson, was laid on the table until the next meeting. The commissioners appeared to favor such an appropriation if the money was available, being told that the fair could not be held this year without county assistance.

The commissioners agreed to allow county employes to enjoy a half holiday next Tuesday, when the baseball season opens in Portland, provided they are willing to take the time off without pay.

Sheriff Hurlburt reported that prohibition enforcement receipts for the first quarter of 1922, according to records in his office, totaled \$250, against \$1179.97 expended in the work.

DENTAL STUDY SURVEYED

COMMITTEE INSPECTS NORTH PACIFIC COLLEGE.

Carnegie Foundation and Educational Council of America to Make Report on Needs.

A survey of the work done by the North Pacific colleges is being made by a committee of three men representing the Carnegie foundation and the Educational Council of America. This survey is in connection with a similar investigation of all the dental schools of the United States and Canada.

Although members of the committee declined to make a statement yesterday, it is considered likely that, if a need is found, the survey contemplates giving financial assistance to some of the schools.

The committee making the survey is headed by Dr. W. J. Giles of Columbia university representing the Carnegie foundation. Other members are Dr. S. W. Foster and Dr. E. C. Waite, representing the educational council of America.

Dr. Giles said the local institution is the forty-third to be investigated by the committee. In all he said the survey would cover all the 52 dental schools in the United States and Canada.

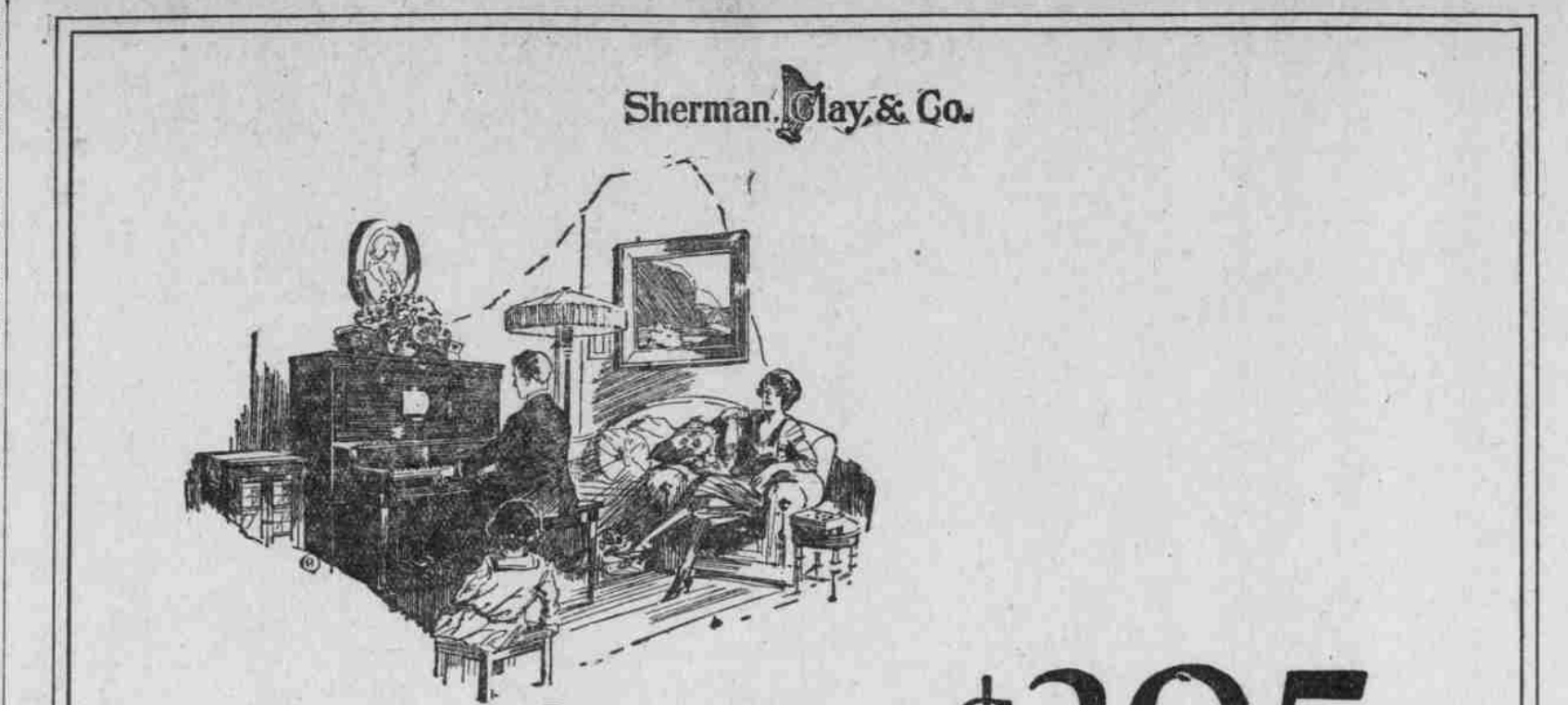
