Also your oven may have been too hot The recipes you mention have been used successfully (just as written) very recently by some of my students at the university. at the university. The brown sugar cookie you sent was crushed almost beyond recogni-tion. These cookies are best not rolled out, but cut like alices of sausage from a roll of the dough and placed cut side up on the baking tin. They should scarcely rise at all in baking, nor should the "1-2-3-4" cookies orange to one part chopped celefy, with French dressing. Or it might be a "dessert salad," combined a sweet dressing and any preferred fruits in smaller quantity. Or it might be a plain lettuce heart and orange salad, with French dress-ing, mayonnaise or cooked dressing, to serve in the regular salad course. 


