CHERRY TEST UNDER WAY

SPECIAL TAX LEVY FOR COUNTY LOOMS

Heavy Deficit Is Attributed to Bungled Financing.

TREASURER GIVES ALARM

Attempt to Keep Government on Warrant Basis Is Declared Cause of Short Funds.

As the penalty for short-sightedness in county administration, Multnomah county taxpayers may be facing a special tax levy before this year is out to take care of the heavy deficit which has kept the county on a warrant basis for a year, and which has not been appreciably relieved by the collection of the first half of taxes levied in 1931.

Since the first of January, Multnomah county has paid out approximately \$3900 as interest on warrants which could not be redeemed with cash when drawn. During 1931 more than \$20,000 was paid out in interest on the warrants.

Despite the millions of dollars which have been collected in taxes during the past few months and turned into the county coffers, operating expenses and payment of interest on the warrants have kept the principal so heavily that the county treasurer asserted he despaired of realizing his hope that on May 1 the county would have a surplus.

PLANNING MILL IS BURNED

Astoria-Warrenton Plant Destroyed With Loss of \$12,500.

ASTORIA, Or., April 26.—(Special.)—The Astoria-Warrenton mill company's planning mill at Warrenton was totally destroyed by a fire which started from an undetermined cause last night. The burned building was owned by George End of Swensen, was valued at approximately \$1200, and it was reported, was fully covered by insurance.
