

CHAMBER MEMBERS ELECT 5 DIRECTORS

Reports on Finances and Membership Gratifying.

\$6000 TO \$8000 ON HAND

Showing is Declared Never to Have Been Equaled Before—Achievements of Year Reviewed.

Reports for the year were submitted and election of five directors was completed and announced last night at the annual meeting of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

In the election balloting, which was started on Monday and was concluded at 9 o'clock last night, three regular nominees of the officially constituted nominating committee were elected directors, together with two of the men placed on the ballot by petition. Roy T. Bishop, nominee of the committee, received the high vote, 323 ballots bearing his name. Max S. Hirsch and R. H. Burnside, also on the regular ticket, ranked next in order. Clay S. Morse and A. C. Callan were the independent nominees elected to the board.

Chairman Is Re-elected.
Candidates who failed of election were D. A. Pattullo, Harrison Whitney and J. F. Clarkson, the latter a member of the regular ticket. John T. Douglar was re-elected chairman of the members' forum, there being only a few scattering votes for candidates whose names were written on the ballot.

The earlier portion of the meeting was given over largely to the programme, which came to the members over the newly installed receiving set and magnavox just obtained by the chamber. The programme consisted largely of musical numbers from The Oregonian station and a portion of the annual address of President Van Duzer of the chamber. The latter unfortunately was cut short because of trouble with the new apparatus.

Years Work Summarized.
W. D. B. Dodson, general manager of the Chamber, was called upon by O. W. Melick, president in the temporary absence of President Van Duzer, and summarized the year's work from the manager's angle. Manager Dodson stressed in particular the development of shipping of the state's latest agricultural resources. Citing the growth of California in population and agricultural wealth, he made particular plea that the Chamber of Commerce give thought to the problem of winning like development for Oregon.

President Van Duzer on his arrival at the meeting spoke briefly by way of summarizing achievements of the year. He held high praise for the various committees and concluded by calling for brief reports and recommendations from heads of committees and departments.

Reports Are Gratifying.
Most gratifying among the reports were those on finances and membership. It was shown that, despite a year of industrial depression, the Chamber had come through with between \$6000 and \$8000 of the budget allowance unexpended, showing a surplus never to have been equaled in previous years. On membership it was shown that the year had also brought an appreciable increase in the number of new members more than offsetting an unusual number of lapses and withdrawals caused by business conditions.

The meeting concluded with a buffet luncheon in the dining room, there being pleasant entertainment of music by the Pacific Telephone company orchestra. Announcement of the vote on directors was made during the luncheon.

Portland's industrial development during the year as to shipping and raw materials produced in the environs, and a statement of the policies which should be followed in the year now starting, were comprehensively reviewed by Mr. Van Duzer.

A "spirit of eternal vigilance and external effort" was urged upon the incoming officers in the light of the supremacy in Pacific coast shipping in order that the advantages gained during the last year will continue to accrue to Portland in the future.

Shipping Grows Steadily.
In this respect President Van Duzer said: "The continued growth of shipping in the port has been the outstanding improvement during the past 12 months. Our greatest shipping year in all the history of the city has been recorded. A growth beyond our expectations has been realized. Portland and Columbia river ports are no longer in an apologetic mood. The competitive struggle is bitter in the northwest and will be. This is a tribute to the superb strength of the port and its hinterland, to the careful plans that have been laid years ahead, to the most excellent terminal construction work done in the harbor and to a new spirit that animates the loyal exporters of this immediate district."

"While our progress has been most excellent, the chamber would not indulge on thought that might lead the community into a sense of security with reference to its shipping situation. If we are to continue to grow, if the products of the Columbia river basin are to move through this port in increasing volume, it will be so only if we maintain a spirit of eternal vigilance and external effort."

Full Share Still Sought.
"No port on the Pacific leads us in volume of local originating tonnage. We have not as yet secured our proportion of transcontinental or trans-Pacific freight. This cannot be accomplished at once, but by increasing work and fair competition we have the right to expect that the possession of out-bound cargo in such abundance will be the means of attracting both transcontinental and trans-Pacific imports and exports in proportionate volume. To this we must work unceasingly that Portland may take the position which by nature should be hers."

Light for Channel Traced.
"The Chamber of Commerce must strive incessantly for better channel conditions between this port and the sea. Most excellent work has been done and is being done by the Port of Portland and the United States engineers' department. The minimum

30-foot channel has been maintained in excellent manner during the past year with deeper water available most of the time. If the project now before congress passes, which is for a 30-foot minimum depth, with a 500-foot width of channel from Portland to the sea, we feel that through the co-operation of the two agencies before referred to we can expect vastly better channel conditions in the immediate future.

"We must keep abreast of our competitors on waterfront terminal facilities. If not exceed them. Our work to date has been far-sighted. Terminal No. 4 at St. Johns, completed and operated by the commission of public docks, is one of the most advanced and modern large units for cargo handling to be found in the United States. Although we seem at times to build ahead of the current business, such work attracts greater volume and, directly and indirectly, adds immeasurably to the wealth and strength of the port and city."

Aide from stressing the importance of shipping to Portland President Van Duzer emphasized the importance of fostering industrial developments.

ROADHOUSE EVIL TACKLED

RESORTS IN COUNTY OUTSIDE CITY MAY BE REGULATED.

District Attorney Says Dancing Can Be Curbed Under 1 A. M. Closing Regulations.

Roadhouses in Multnomah county are subject to regulation by county commissioners and the 1 A. M. closing rule regulating dance halls outside the city limits may be applied to the resorts—at least so far as terpsichorean amusement is concerned. This was the opinion of Stanley Myers, district attorney, communicated yesterday to Martin L. Pratt, chief deputy in the office of Sheriff Hurlburt, in reply to a request for an interpretation of the law so that the sheriff's men might know just how far they can go in regulating the roadhouse evil. Under this ruling, it is very likely that an early arrest will be made by deputy sheriffs and a test case brought in the courts.

If the resorts cannot have dancing after 1 o'clock in the morning and only can serve meals and light drinks, there will be nothing to attract the night life from Portland, which drifts out to the roadhouses when everything shuts down within the city limits, in the opinion of Mr. Pratt, who has been detailed to the investigation of the situation by Sheriff Hurlburt.

Under the opinion, prepared by Deputy District Attorney Mowry, it is held that any place where "public dancing" is allowed can be regulated by the commissioners outside the city limits of Portland. Dancing in the public dancing "if the public in general and without discrimination is permitted, either conditionally or unconditionally, to take part in it," holds the opinion.

The ruling does not affect hotels nor inns where dancing is permitted only to patrons who have rooms therein.

ASTORIA OFFICIALS SUED

Claim Against Property Declared in Contempt of Court.

ASTORIA, Or., April 28.—(Special.)—A motion was filed in the circuit court this afternoon by the state of Oregon, rel. Esther B. Hering against the mayor, members of the council and attorney of the city of Astoria asking for an order directing the defendants to appear and show cause why they should not be punished for contempt of court. The motion recites that causing reassessment proceedings to be commenced by the council to defray the expense of improving Niagara avenue, between Seventh and Eighth, the defendants have willfully disobeyed and violated the decree of the circuit court entered on March 2, 1921, in the case of John R. Brobst and others against the city, a decree which held that a decree against the plaintiffs property. The motion is accompanied by an affidavit by Attorney Frank C. Hesse, reciting the proceedings in the court's ruling in the Brobst case. Judge Bakin granted the motion and made an order directing the defendants to appear in court at 2:30 on May 5.

INDIAN CLAIMS ARE UP

Right to Present Bills Against Government Is Requested.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—Request for congressional authority to permit the Indians of California to present claims against the government to the court of claims for adjudication was made today before the house Indian affairs committee. Speakers for the Indians, including Frederick G. Collett, executive representative of the Indian board of cooperative work, and Gladys Cole, representative of the California Indian, declared the claims were just and the government owed it to the Indians of that state to permit them to go before the court of claims with their case, to be decided there "as a matter of course."

Mr. Collett testified that the Indians of California had been neglected by the government because they were peaceful.

Student Play Draws Throngs.

TUALATIN, Or., April 28.—(Special.)—The Tualatin high school players presented "Deacon Dubbs" at the gymnasium Friday night. The performance drew the largest crowd in the history of the school. Many cars from Newberg, Durham, Sherwood and Astoria were parked on the school grounds. This attendance was due to a novel advertising stunt. Six cars, decorated with streamers, were in the cast of the play, all in costume, among the players, Margaret Vienne, Annie Douglas, Tricie Johnson, Gladys Cole, Mae Giberger, Arthur Gould, Jack Saum, Marvin Snyder, Martin Verweest and Carvel Wilcox were conspicuous for their clever work. 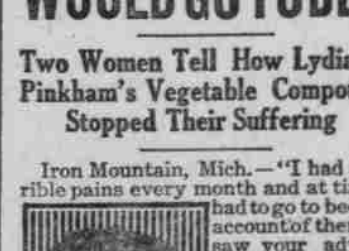

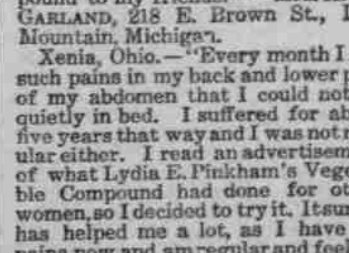
