

ALLIED PROPOSALS HANDLED TO RUSSIA

Final Approval Reserved by
French Delegates.

BELGIANS ARE ABSENT

Memorandum Is Dispatched With-
out Signatures—Paris Party
Late for Afternoon Session.

GENOA, May 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The committee of 109 has set to work in earnest to finance the scheme.

The Ad Club Folies, which was given so successfully at the auditorium recently, has been chosen as the means of raising the money, and the entire show will be put on at the auditorium on the night of Friday, May 12, under the auspices of the committee, with the original cast in the production. The Ad club has consented to do the piece again to further the cause of the Chamber boosters.

It is felt by the committee of 109 that the sending out of the members' forum luncheon programme Mondays so that the development message will reach far and wide is a matter of considerable importance. Not only that, but other talks at the Portland Chamber as well as special messages that will tend to fix the state together in strong bonds of development for a common cause will be sent broadcast from time to time as occasion arises, and it is the belief that this work will be one of the most progressive steps possible in carrying out the work of the organization and extending it very widely.

It is believed that at the forthcoming show of the Folies it will be quite possible to fill the auditorium to the doors with members of the Chamber and their friends. An announcement of the show will be made next Monday noon at the members' forum luncheon, and plans will be introduced to impress it upon the membership.

THE BELGIANS did not attend the meeting of the committee on Russian affairs this afternoon and the French delegates came late. The memorandum was dispatched without the signature of the Belgians.

Sub-Committee Is Astonished.

It was rumored that the French did not understand that the meeting was fixed for 4 o'clock, and they arrived at 4:30. It was clear they had remained away for further consideration as to whether they would stand by the Belgians. The committee was astonished at the sub-committee by announcing that the French delegation could not approve the memorandum without further discussion at Paris.

Premier Lloyd George expressed great amazement at this, saying that M. Barthou had told him this morning that the matter had been settled. M. Barthou explained that his action was based on messages received from Paris after M. Barthou had been in conference with Premier Poincaré and the French cabinet.

Tariff Regulation Is Problem.

How to regulate customs tariffs in European countries is a matter being calculated to restore Europe to its pre-war strength, was the most important subject before the sub-committee on economic matters, whose problems are so numerous that it will be unable to report its decision at tomorrow's plenary session of the economic conference.

The British representatives on the sub-committee have come out squarely in favor of the most liberal nation treatment in customs matters.

Low Customs Favored.

Sir Philip Lloyd George, the English authority, argued before the committee that the produce or manufacture of any European country should have the advantage in every other European country of the lowest rate of customs duty imposed in that country on similar goods coming from any other foreign country whatever.

"Europe's machine," he said, "has broken down and it will never run again until the cardinal fact is recognized that trade is mutual—that you cannot sell unless you buy."

Sir Philip declared that if the delegates left Genoa determined to negotiate an endless chain of special treaties differentiating country by country, Europe would remain disorganized; but if they were determined to carry out the adoption of the most favored nation treatment, he was convinced that Europe would be saved economically.

Consortium Takes Shape.

The proposed international corporation or consortium which the powers are organizing to help all distressed countries in Europe, is now taking definite shape, the British delegation to the economic conference announced. It has been agreed that it was said, by the adoption of a number of smaller European states.

Lord Inverforth, chairman of the organizing committee which has been developing the project at Genoa, has obtained subscriptions from Canada, Czechoslovakia, Holland, Japan, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland, each of which will subscribe from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

The powers which initiated the consortium were England, France, Belgium, Italy and Germany, each contributing \$5,000,000, making a total capital of \$25,000,000, but the inclusion of other states will reduce the proportion of the big powers to \$1,000,000.

In reply to questions today a British spokesman said that if the United States came later the total capital would be increased beyond \$25,000,000. All subscriptions must be ratified within 30 days and every country subscribing at least \$500,000 will be represented on the board.

TARIFF TO PROTECT ALL INDUSTRY URGED

Head of Woolgrowers Asks
Farm Bloc to Act.

PRESENT SYSTEM DECRIED

Political Tariff Tinkering, Entail-
ing Frequent Changes, Held Han-
dicap to Nation's Interests.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., May 2.—Members of the "agricultural bloc" in both branches of congress received word today from Frank J. Hagenbarth, president of the National Wool Growers' association, that he had urged the members of the association to advocate the immediate passage by congress of the pending tariff bill with a provision which will assure the formulation of a permanent scientific tariff based on American production and conversion costs.

In a general letter to representatives and senators, Mr. Hagenbarth declared that one of the most vital needs of American agriculture was a permanent and expert tariff to take the place of the present political tariff system that entails a change of policy with every new administration.

"It is a strange commentary on our American business sense and continuity of thought to know that the history of tariffs shows their average life to have been approximately four years," Mr. Hagenbarth said. "How is it possible under such shifting conditions to maintain stable industries, particularly during a period when the values of the competing countries of the world are at subnormal levels?"

Specific Tariff Urged.

"To my mind one of the greatest fundamental needs of agriculture, industry and commerce is a permanent specific tariff that will afford proper protection to the American farmer, the American workman and to the capital invested in every form of enterprise."

"Equitable protection of these three factors in our economic life can be obtained only by a tariff which is based on expert findings directed by a skilled and non-partisan tariff commission. In this manner the tariff

and at Cleveland have been working on the case for three years, it was said.

Robert Braun, chief of Allegheny county detectives, and Red Cross officers recalled the story surrounding the death of the woman's fourth husband at Dornont, a suburb, in 1919. The man, named Stuart, was in perfect health when the time of the marriage, they said, and in a few months he died under mysterious circumstances. Braun declared that an autopsy failed to disclose the cause of death, because it was performed after embalming, but a Red Cross investigator said that an analysis of the vital organs disclosed symptoms of poisoning. This poison, it was announced, could have resulted from certain illnesses.

Widow Charged With Murder.

BOSTON, May 2.—Mrs. Carrie N. Hubbard was arrested late today, charged with the murder of her husband, William B. Hubbard, at their home in the Roslindale district. Hubbard, who was manager of a garment manufacturing company, was shot in the left breast. After the shooting Mrs. Hubbard called Dr. Alfred Sawyer, who pronounced her husband dead.

which she was said to have informed them she intended to go away with Hunnicutt.

The robbery of the Brown Mercantile company is said, by circumstantial evidence, to the door of Hunnicutt himself. Mrs. Zolterdun admitted that she had met him in a Portland lodging house in January, 1921. Although the burglary was committed in May she professed to know nothing of it. She said that Hunnicutt had moved to St. Helena last October and that acquaintance had ripened since that time.

However, although the woman, who was apparently sincere and truthful in her statements, could not say positively that it was her lover who stole the jewelry and watches, the circumstances that he was in possession of some of the loot and that he was thoroughly familiar with all details of the burglary, have convinced police that he is the man to charge with larceny and they are confident they have evidence enough to bring him before the grand jury for indictment on it.

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would be taken out of politics and the causes which have led to the present unfortunate condition, in which industry is arrayed against industry and class against class, would be removed.

"I believe the ad valorem system of tariffs, under the most favorable conditions, is ineffective either for purposes of revenue or for protection. Specific tariffs based on production costs of agricultural products or conversion costs of manufactured materials would accomplish expertly what for generations we have tried ineffectually to accomplish with ad valorem tariffs—that is the protection of American labor and the factory, and the farm and in the factory."

Job One for Experts.

"The Frelinghuysen bill provides for a tariff commission under the control of the secretary of commerce, which, aided by advisers and representatives from labor, agriculture and industry, would draft an expert tariff measure for congress to debate upon and pass. In this way congress would have before it facts assembled by experts working for the common good of the country and not the pleas of special interests."

"I regard the general proposal contained in this measure as one of the most important suggestions yet advanced toward providing this country with an expert tariff that would effectively protect American agriculture and industry without being prohibitory to imports."

"It should be passed with any amendments that are necessary to increase its effectiveness as part of the present pending tariff measure, and the tariff measure itself should be made into a law with the shortest possible delay, because agriculture, industry and labor in this country today stand in the most urgent need of protection that will permit them to organize against foreign competition, which must be regulated if it is not to destroy our prosperity."

BONUS DEMURRER FILED

Arguments in Suit of Veterans to
Be Heard Today.

SALEM, Or., May 2.—(Special.)—The attorney-general's office today filed a general demurrer to the complaint filed recently by Edwin Steven Woodford against the world war veterans' state aid commission. This suit was instituted by Mr. Woodford to compel the bonus commission to base its loans to ex-service men on the full 75 per cent of the appraised value of the property offered as security.

Judge Bingham today announced that the arguments for and against allowing the demurrer would be heard tomorrow morning. Joseph Benjamin, attorney-general, will appear for the state.

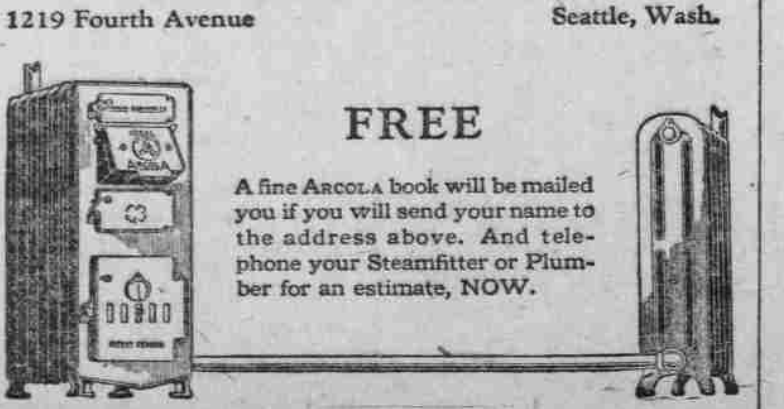
