Features will be courses in woodcraft, cabin building, camp cookery, athletics, Bible study, first aid and forestry. Health conditions at the camp have been declared ideal by R. W. Sipple, health inspector of the Portland city department. Leaders will be George Graves, Max Pierce and Paul Irvine of the Oregon Agricultural college; Haddon Rockey, University of Oregon, and Harley Stevens of the University of California.

Y. M. C. A. TO END FACTORY MEETINGS—Religious meetings conducted by the Y. M. C. A. in Portland factories and lunch halls during the last year will be ended for the season at a big rally to be held soon. Portland citizens who participated in the meetings will attend. The services in the plants consisted of a 20-minute sermon, and music. Automobiles to carry speakers were furnished by business men. The work of the Y. M. C. SALEM, Or., May 7.—(Special.)—Abe Evans, who is in the state penitentiary here awaiting execution for the murder of a laborer in Wasco county, attempted to commit suicide by hanging today.
