

# WAR GRATTERS FACE TRIAL IN U. S. COURTS

Attorney-General Finds That Prosecution Is Justified.

## ACTION STIRS UP ROW

Daugherty Accused of Trying to Hush Up Matter and Threatened With Impeachment.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 9.—In a detailed statement concerning the prosecution of war fraud cases, prepared at the request of the president and transmitted today to the house, Attorney General Daugherty declared that examinations so far completed disclosed in each instance "sufficient indication that a crime has been committed to warrant submitting them to a grand jury."

Presented on the eve of a republican caucus, called to consider a legislative proposal including a republican resolution for investigation of charges of alleged laxity in prosecutions by the department of justice, the attorney general's letter provoked a partisan row, in which Representative Garrett, the democratic leader, broadly intimated that it was intended to another the proposed investigation.

Representative Mondell, the republican leader, to whom Mr. Daugherty's letter was sent by the president, did not indicate in reply to a question on the floor as to whether it meant that the resolution already given privileged status by the rules committee, ever would be heard from again.

**Mr. Daugherty Attacked.**

Taking issue with the attorney general, Representative Woodruff, republican, Michigan, declared the former was requested six months ago to appeal to congress for half a million dollars to clear up his wartime docket, and that he never acted until republicans had assailed the department in the house. Mr. Woodruff reiterated that unless the attorney general allowed the courts to decide the pending case against the Lincoln Motor company "on its merits, I will move his impeachment in the house of representatives today."

The member asserted that a republican congress could not "face the country in an election unless it clears up war fraud cases which smell to high heaven."

Charging that "little or nothing" had been done by the former administration to bring war robberies to light, Mr. Daugherty wrote the president that the country would soon have reason to know that "influential personages in the government had knowledge of these transactions," were in a position to make disclosures, and were personally interested in concealing them.

**200 Cases on Hand.**

The department, he said, was handling upward of 200 war fraud cases, and if recoveries were obtained in all, the total would reach \$100,000,000.

It was a terrible thing, the attorney general said, to charge a citizen with robbing his own government, and for that he had given the department upon a painstaking investigation of all cases involving charges of criminality. It was regrettable, too, he declared, that public attention "has been so strongly focused on these cases on the eve of their prosecution."

Given a special fund of \$500,000, and with the passage of pending bills for 23 additional judges and an additional grand jury in the district of Columbia, Mr. Daugherty said the work of clearing the dockets would be accelerated. Two cases of the "first magnitude" were ready for prompt submission, he said, adding, however, that investigation showed others "lurking in the shadows" and involved in the unlawful transaction, and that principals and individuals in other parts of the country might soon be indicted.

**Daugherty Defends Acts.**

Mr. Daugherty reiterated what he said recently concerning the case of the Lincoln Motor company involving "alleged irregularities in connection with the adjustment of a contract with that company for the manufacture of Liberty motors." Tracing the various stages of the litigation, Mr. Daugherty said that after hearing counsel for the receiver and others interested he had concluded that the matter should be submitted to judicial determination, and accordingly the claim was filed with the time allowed.

In this connection the attorney general sent to the president a letter from Federal Judge Turner from the eastern district of Michigan referring "to the recent newspaper notoriety" and "the shadow of a doubt" which had been cast upon the matter, and which has happened or failed to happen up to this time in protecting the government's interests.

At the conclusion of the reading, Mr. Mondell said that the attorney general's wisdom would be complied with, "to the end that all who defrauded the government will be brought to justice."

## DESTROYERS ARE PROMISED

Warcraft Are to Be in Portland During Rose Festival.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 9.—(Special.)—A squadron of destroyers or several large naval ships will be dispatched to Portland for the Rose Festival, according to assurances given today by Secretary of the Navy Denby to Eric V. Hauser, president of Portland Rose Festival association, and his associates, now in Washington. In addition, President Harding has announced that he will designate some men of national prominence to represent the White House at the festival. Just who will be the president's representative is not known, but the announcement is expected within a short time. Because of the prolonged session of congress President Harding indicated to Mr. Hauser that he preferred to have members of the cabinet remain in Washington next month. However, should any member find it necessary to travel west on official business at the time of the festival Portland will be almost certain of the opportunity of acting as host. It is known that the Secretary of Agriculture Wallace has been contemplating a trip to the Pacific coast and it is hardly possible that he may arrange his itinerary to include the festival. All of the members of the cabinet have received invitations to attend, as have Vice-President Coolidge, General Pershing, "Uncle Joe" Cannon and other notables.

When Mr. Hauser called on General Pershing today in company with Whitney Boyce of Portland, the famous warrior expressed a keen desire again to visit Portland, especially during the festival. He explained, however, that his chief assistant was absent from Washington and would not return until July 1 and it would be impossible for him to leave his desk until after that time.

Frank Branch Riley, who is in Washington to fill a number of lecture engagements, joined Mr. Hauser today in his official visit at the national capital. Mr. Riley is delivering an illustrated lecture, called "The Future of the Northwest," and attracting capacity audiences wherever he is speaking in this city.

Mr. Hauser plans to leave Washington tomorrow night for New York, where he and his party will pass a number of days before returning to Chicago, thence to St. Paul, where he will pass a day, after which he will return to Portland.

Davison, banker and philanthropist. Present, too, were men and women of the American Red Cross to pay tribute to the man of affairs who during the war had directed the organization's efforts to clear the spark of the dying.

The Red Cross wreath, occupied the place of honor at the altar, the Red Cross flag, and the church was overflowing in the tiny Long Island church, a group of Red Cross nurses stood with bowed heads on the church steps, and the simple Episcopalian ritual and a delegation from the Red Cross war council officially represented the "greatest mother in the world."

J. P. Morgan, head of the banking house in which Mr. Davison had been a partner, presided over the service, to which only the nearest relatives and closest friends were admitted. About the chapel were massed men and women internationally prominent who had come by motor or special train for the ceremony. At the graveside for the final rites were only the closest friends.

# KLAN QUIT BY SHERIFF

LOS ANGELES OFFICIAL OUT TWO WEEKS AFTER ENTRY.

## CITY CHIEF OF POLICE RESIGNED SAME NIGHT HE JOINED, OFFICIAL RECORDS SHOW.

LOS ANGELES, May 9.—William L. Traeger, sheriff of Los Angeles county, and Louis D. Oaks, chief of police of Los Angeles city, resigned from the Ku Klux Klan last year after brief memberships, according to Klan records which became public today in connection with the grand jury investigation of a raid at Inglewood on April 22. The sheriff quit the Klan two weeks after he was admitted. Oaks, then a sergeant of police, resigned the same night he joined, the records showed.

Both Traeger and Oaks after the Inglewood raid, issued orders that any of their subordinates who were members of the Ku Klux Klan must resign from the Klan or give up their official positions.

The name of Joe C. Burke, attorney of Santa Ana, appeared on an application blank for membership in the Klan, also made public today. This is the name of the United States district attorney for southern California. The application blank bore the endorsement that the applicant had been rejected.

District Attorney Burke was in Fresno today and was reported to be on his way here late this afternoon, without having been informed of the discovery of the application blank.

Application blanks on which appear the names of 13 Los Angeles men were also made public. These include police and fire department officials, attorneys and private detectives. There was nothing to indicate the applicants had been accepted or rejected.

Three witnesses were called before the grand jury today who had previously been asserted, took part in the Inglewood raid, which resulted in the death of Constable Mosher, a raider. They were N. A. Baker, "leagle" of the Ku Klux Klan, H. A. Waite and L. L. Bryson. Bryson is a former deputy constable of Huntington Park.

## Threats Charged by Wife.

SALFEM, Or., May 9.—(Special.)—Mrs. Alice Shultz, in a divorce complaint filed in the Marion county circuit court here today, charged that her husband, Fred A. Shultz, threatened her with butchery knives and firearms upon several occasions, and has been cruel and inhuman in his treatment toward her during their married life. Mrs. Shultz also charged that she and her three minor children.

## ROAD TRAFFIC DIVERTED

Tourist Travel to Come Routed Away From Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 9.—(Special.)—As a result of the closing of the main highway from Ridgefield to Woodland, a distance of six miles, most of the tourist travel may go into Portland over the Columbia river highway. Traffic will cross the Columbia at Kalama to Goble and will not pass through Vancouver.

However, the county commissioners of Clatsop and Clallam counties have provided a detour and a ferry at Pekin ferry landing, which will make a round trip with ten cars every 40 minutes.

There is a steep hill just east of the ferry landing and the commissioners have provided a team to assist cars not able to make the grade.

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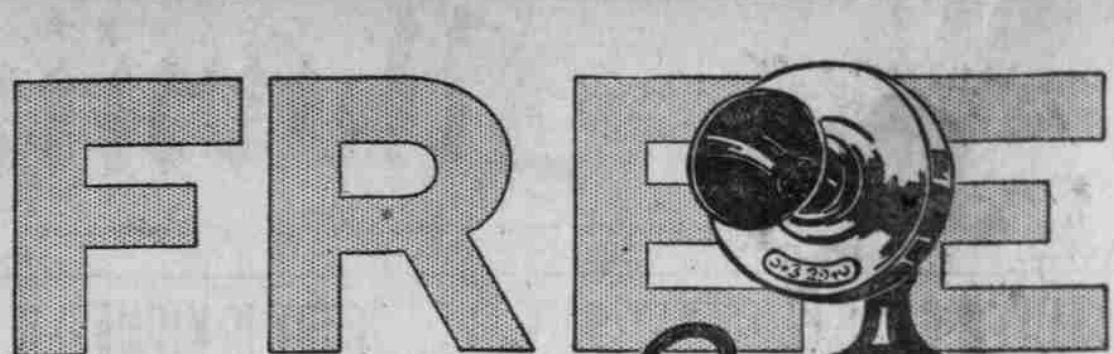
