

MR. HALL ANSWERS SENATOR PATTERSON

Willingness to Discuss Campaign Issues Expressed.

PHONE RATES COMPARED

Cosco Candidate for Governor Intimates Rival Is Trying to Drag in Side Issues.

Answering Senator I. L. Patterson's challenge to debate whether the Cosco & Curry telephone system is a part of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph system, Charles Hall, president of the Cosco & Curry company, says that he is willing to discuss the relative merits of the two systems, but that he is not willing to discuss the public school education, business, not political, methods of the affairs of state.

Mr. Hall's reply to Mr. Patterson follows: "Upon my return to Portland today I find a letter to me dated May 10, signed by your manager, W. E. Burke, courteously offering me time at your pre-arranged meeting to debate with you the question of the extent of my stock ownership in the Cosco & Curry telephone company. I find that this letter and a statement accompanying it has been given by your manager, Mr. Burke, to the press as good campaign material.

Rate Rise Discussed

"Is that the one issue you are prepared to debate before the people of this state? Are there not questions of much greater importance than the personal business or domestic affairs of the candidates? It is hardly fair to attempt to divert upon a side issue the attention of the people whose business and necessities should be our first concern. Shall we leave the vital issues to follow a harrying chase across the path, as old-line politicians have frequently done, or shall we adhere straightforwardly to a consideration of the issues that affect the very life and welfare of all the people? The discussion of side issues may be good old-line political tactics, but it is not a fair method for to observe the chairman of the ways and means committee submitting to the legislature the statement of the proposed heavy taxation budget, and yet promising to take a cut in the legal salary of the governor, and a drop in the budget of extravagance and economic inefficiency?

"It is not known to you, Mr. Burke, as well as to you, Mr. Patterson, that the Cosco & Curry telephone company is a part of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company? Look it up, Senator.

"But, if the telephone rate question is an issue, then I am the logical man for governor, since the principle of service, reasonable rates and fair treatment in the management of public utilities are the issues that have been demonstrated in the affairs of the company which I am directing, may well be extended to the public service generally throughout the state.

Relations Held Friendly

"The rates of the Cosco & Curry telephone company are among the lowest of the companies operating in towns of similar size. The increase of rates according to this company some two years ago, was met without opposition and with the full consent of the cities affected, they realizing the necessity of maintaining the quality of the service and the financial stability of the company.

"The stockholders and management of the Cosco & Curry telephone company are gratified not only that the character of service rendered to the people in the community served by the Cosco & Curry telephone company has been so good, but that the relations existing between the people served and the company have been so friendly and mutually helpful.

"My attitude toward telephone, street car and other utility rates is that such rates should be no more than what would insure efficient public service and an adequate return on the legitimate capital invested in such utilities.

"If in spite of the above, you still doubt that the Cosco & Curry telephone company is an independent company, controlled by me, let me say, further:

Common Stock Controlled

"I am the controlling stockholder in the Cosco & Curry telephone company, as will be seen by an analytical examination of the statement contained in your Mr. Burke's letter. A majority of the directors are elected by the holders of common stock only, and I am the controlling holder of common stock. Our preferred stock, as your counsel will advise, is in the nature of a security issued by the company, and is given the protection of a majority only of the directors.

"Don't you realize, what the people of this state are beginning to realize, that a government whose practical experience in mercantile, financial, political and other business has enabled him to give good service at rates lower than those complained of in Portland and elsewhere, and yet insure a satisfactory return to the investor, is specially trained and fitted to help the people of the state to obtain better service and lower rates, and at the same time guarantee fair treatment to all the public, subscriber and investor alike? The rates of my company are a matter of public record, and I am perfectly willing that they be compared with those of other companies rendering similar service. In the meantime, I include some comparative rates that may interest you. Will you see that these are published fairly and as widely as was your manager's challenge to debate this matter before your own meetings?

Opponent Is Welcomed

"If you care to discuss at some of my meetings real issues, such as public school education, business, not political, methods in the affairs of state, or the like, mentioned in my statement of principles, I shall be glad to welcome you there."

Household Problems

DAYVILLE, Or., April 20.—Madam: Please publish a list of the common foods containing albumen. Thanking you, SUBSCRIBER.

If I understood the purpose underlying your question or how much chemical knowledge you have, I might be able to answer more intelligently and intelligibly.

In general the albumens are defined as simple proteins, soluble in pure water and coagulable by heat. The white of an egg consists of almost pure egg-albumen and water. Egg yolk also contains albumen. Albumen is abundant in milk. These two foods with the juices of meat are perhaps richest in the albumen, although small amounts are present in some other of the animal protein foods and in some vegetables. In general the albumens are more abundant in the animal foods, such as blood, etc., while the globulins predominate among the proteins of the animal tissues and of plants. If you care to explain why you ask this question, perhaps I can be more helpful.

If so, you will find such lists (too long for this column) in Rose's "Feeding the Family," obtainable from the state library.

Dear Miss Tingle—Will you kindly tell me what vegetables contain iron, and in general way the method of cooking them to retain the iron?

Spinach and egg yolks are among the foods richest in iron. Other green leaf vegetables, asparagus, cabbage, carrots, string beans and celery, are moderately rich in iron; so are lean meat, dried beans and lentils and whole grain cereal foods and dried fruits. But practically all fresh vegetables and fruits contain some small amount of iron.

You can find a complete detailed statement in a table in the appendix of Sherman's Chemistry of Nutrition. For practical purposes, however, the list would not be very significant to you.

In cooking vegetables any method is most satisfactory that retains their juices and does not involve longer cooking than is necessary to soften the cellulose.

Hence steaming (in a vessel that will catch and retain the juices for utilization in dressing the vegetable)

OREGON LAW URGED TO CURB NARCOTICS

Measure Making Possession Felony Proposed.

CONFERENCE HELD HERE

Governor Olcott, Mayor Baker, Harry D. Smith and Jesse E. Flanders Are at Meeting.

Oregon, as a leader in the anti-narcotics crusade, will be urged to enact a law making it a felony for any person not properly licensed to have in possession narcotic drugs or paraphernalia commonly employed in using narcotics. A measure embodying these stringent provisions is to be drawn at once, as a result of a conference held yesterday by Governor Olcott, Mayor Baker, Harry D. Smith, federal agent in charge of narcotics work in the northwest, and Jesse E. Flanders of the federal prohibition squad. These men, together with Chief of Police Jenkins, conferred on the subject in the mayor's office.

Mr. Smith voiced enthusiastic praise of Oregon and its state and city officials for taking an active stand in moving for more stringent control of the narcotics evil.

"The fight that has been waged from here," said Mr. Smith, "has been the biggest factor in winning approval of the Jones-Miller bill by the house of representatives. This bill, if it is put through the senate, will go far toward curing weak spots of the Harrison narcotics law."

Conference makes itself felt. The permanent summer institute site for the Epworth league of the northern districts of the Oregon conference will be at Falls City, Or., according to announcement yesterday by Bishop Shepard of the Portland Area Methodist Episcopal church. A long-time lease has been taken on a plot of ground, adjacent to the city and athletic parks. Falls City is in Polk county, west of Salem.

This site will take the place of the institute site at Jefferson, which has been used for five or six years. The facility will be announced later. The Methodist committee, which personally inspected the property, was composed of Bishop Shepard, Dr. E. C. Hickman, Dr. W. W. Youngs, Ralph M. Speelman, Dr. E. E. Gilbert and Dr. B. E. Kirkpatrick. Permanent dwelling structures will be erected on the site and it is expected that the city will assist in the erection of a tabernacle.

The Epworth league members of Portland district will meet in annual convention today and tomorrow. After luncheon at the Y. M. C. A. the convention will open at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Century-Wilbur church. The afternoon will be devoted to conferences and then the delegates will motor to the Friendly Center mission in Albina. The institute banquet will be at 6 o'clock at the church and the night meeting will start at 7:30.

Bishop Thomas Nicholson of the Chicago area will arrive tomorrow morning and will be the principal speaker at 3 o'clock at a mass meeting at the tabernacle. Third and Irving streets. The public is invited. Bishop Nicholson is in the west to attend the annual meeting of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church and Wednesday of next week. He has not been in Portland since the Methodist bishops' convention here last spring.

Control of the narcotics evil in Portland has strengthened and improved to a marked extent in the last six months, Mr. Smith told the conference. He had ascertained this fact from personal investigations made about the street at night. Drug peddlers have largely been driven to cover and have become extremely cautious, he said.

Mr. Smith reported that narcotics control will be an important topic of consideration at a big session of police department heads in San Francisco, June 19. He urged that Chief Jenkins be sent to the conference and the mayor indicated that he would make an effort to have the chief attend.

Yakima Session Discusses Drugs. YAKIMA, Wash., May 12.—Canon W. H. Eide of Seattle, at a special conference on narcotics at this forenoon's session of the Washington social service workers, declared that the city of Yakima, if it is an average northwest community, had 400 drug addicts.

He declared that the anti-drug war was the most vital issue in the United States today.

Huge Black Bear Slain

ELGIN, Or., May 12.—(Special.)—A black bear weighing about 400 pounds and measuring 6 feet 3 inches, was shot by Frank Hallgrah on the west side of the foothills west of town. The skin he brought in, but he was compelled to leave most of the meat, being unable to carry it to town.

Judge Wolverton sentenced Watts to serve four months in jail and pay a fine of \$100.
