

LIQUOR SMUGGLERS BATTLE WITH POLICE

One Man Shot and Believed
to Have Been Drowned.

MOVIE COLONY INVOLVED

Truck Being Used to Haul Contraband Said to Have Been Engaged by Picture Company.

LONG BEACH, Cal., May 16.—One man was shot and believed drowned, four men arrested and a launch and two trucks, together with 122 cases of liquor, were seized here early today, following a battle between police and liquor smugglers at the harbor here. The trucks were said by police to have been engaged by a motion picture company and police assert belief that the contraband liquor was intended for Hollywood.

Jess Atkinson, Long Beach patrolman, was fishing at the Long Beach harbor in the early morning hours when he noticed several men wading through the surf to a launch and staggering ashore under heavy loads. At his call a machine load of policemen arrived shortly thereafter and found six men engaged in bringing cases of liquor ashore, two on the beach, two at the trucks and two wading out to the launch.

They attempted to escape, and in giving battle to the officers one of the men was shot and he was seen to plunge into the ocean, apparently wounded. Officers believe he would be unable to stem the current and probably was drowned.

Vincent Cervantes, Nick Ursick, C. Edwards and Dan Coen were arrested. The sixth man escaped. Coen was operating a high-priced car and told the police he was the son of a wealthy Los Angeles merchant. Police say they found evidence that the trucks had been in the employ of a motion picture producing company near Los Angeles, and investigating into their ownership was begun. The liquor was apparently brought in from Mexico. Police believe the launch, named Hollywood, was bringing the liquor from another craft off here. The arrested men refused to reveal the name of the wounded man.

CLEANUP TO BE EXTENDED

Two Weeks Are to Be Devoted Instead of One.

Portland's clean-up campaign will be extended to cover next week as well as this week, it was announced yesterday. The primary election of Friday causes something of an interruption in the campaign and largely for this reason two weeks instead of one will be devoted to it, according to announcement made by Building Inspector Plummer, in charge of details of the cleanup observance.

The Chamber of Commerce was one of the first organizations to get behind the campaign. Appointment of a committee to co-operate with the city council's committee was announced yesterday. Members of the chamber committee are Mrs. J. J. Jolly, Dr. George S. Brethling and A. E. Jackson. This committee held conference during the day with Fire Marshal Grenfell, whose force has an active part in the clean-up drive.

quiet, during which the police have been checking up a vast amount of evidence seized last week in raids on a number of union headquarters, the arrest of more than 150 labor leaders and the indictment of eight of them, including Mader, president of the building trades council, in connection with the slaying of two patrolmen by four bombers, who escaped in an automobile.

Two new arrests were made during the day following reports that a confession implicating several persons had been made by John Miller, owner of the death car from which the policemen were shot.

Whole procedure Revealed.
Miller, according to State's Attorney Crowe, has revealed to the police the entire procedure of labor terrorism, telling of orders for bombings and slayings carried out by strong-arm mercenaries, who received their order from three of the leaders now under arrest.

The same mercenaries, it was believed, had been used to intimidate both union men and contractors, their leaders collecting tribute from both sides while posing as labor leaders. It also was charged that they had engineered robberies, the proceeds being used to finance the reign of gun and bomb terrorism which culminated in the assassination of the two policemen.

SHOE MAKERS CALL STRIKE

Union Workers in Cincinnati Are to Walk Out on Saturday.

CINCINNATI, May 16.—A strike of union boot and shoe workers in Cincinnati beginning next Saturday morning was authorized tonight by the general executive board of the union. It was announced tonight following a four days' session. Six thousand workers will be affected by the strike, union officials said.

The last offer of the manufacturers to prevent a strike was for a 10 per cent wage reduction. It was announced. It was said the workers' refused to accept.

TRIAL HAS ABRUPT END

JAPANESE LIQUOR SMUGGLER
PLEADS GUILTY.

Mokaku Goyota Is Fined \$100 and
Sentenced to Four Months in
Jail; Deportation Later.

The trial of Mokaku Goyota, Japanese liquor smuggler, came to a dramatic and sudden end yesterday in United States district court, when the defendant changed his plea from not guilty to guilty just as Allan Bynon, assistant United States attorney, was arising to address the jury.

A fine of \$100 and sentence of four months in jail was imposed. Mr. Bynon announced the Japanese would be deported as soon as the jail sentence was completed.

Goyota was a sailor on the Japanese steamer Kaian Maru.

When the vessel docked at St. Helena last April he and a companion attempted to sell some whisky to three disguised deputy sheriffs in the hold of the ship. When the officers flashed their badges Goyota and his companion, S. Shematini, attacked them with knives, and in the en-

QUICK PROSECUTION OF FRAUDS ASSURED

House Passes Bill Providing
Funds for Purpose.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL BUSY

Reorganization of Justice Department and Establishment of Special Bureau Now Under Way.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 16.—The house bill providing \$500,000 additional for the department of justice for prosecution of fraudulent war contracts was passed today by the senate and now goes to President Harding for signature.

Reorganization of the department to provide a separate bureau for prosecution of war fraud cases is under way. The bureau probably will be established outside of the department. It was said, in order that its work may be expedited as much as possible.

At the same time Attorney-General Daugherty has ordered other administrative changes looking to the speeding up of the department work. These include segregation of the business of the department under each of the assistant attorney-generals, according to classification, and the creation of a docket revision. Under the latter an organization would be set up for the compilation of a complete record of lawsuits the government has an interest in as rapidly as a move is made either by the United States attorneys throughout the country or by the assistant attorney-generals, so that at a moment's notice the exact status of a case may be made available in Washington.

The "general manager," Mr. Ely, will have this in charge and will arrange with the various officials actively connected with the government's cases who will report their every move as soon as it is made.

Every federal building in the country, said Mr. Daugherty, will be furnished with a card indicating the duties of the various assistant attorney-generals and the classes of cases they handle, so that the public will be able to take up directly with the proper official the particular business it is interested in.

There was no opposition and little discussion of the bill, which was urged by the president and Attorney-General Daugherty. Upon receipt from the house the measure promptly was given unanimous approval by the senate appropriations committee and was put through the senate by unanimous consent.

SHOOTING VICTIM SERIOUS

Pneumonia Feared by Doctor Attending Man Wife Wounded.

THE DALLES, Or., May 16.—(Special.)—The condition of Willard C. Helyer, who is in The Dalles hospital with a bullet hole in his right lung as a result of an altercation with his divorced wife Sunday morning, was reported today as serious by attending physicians. Helyer was suffering from a cold at the time of the shooting, and there was still danger of pneumonia.

Mrs. Helyer was still at liberty today. If Helyer dies, charges will be preferred against her. Otherwise the shooting will be investigated by the grand jury. It was said today.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 16.—(Special.)—John P. Kiggins, mayor of Vancouver, is to leave May 25 for a

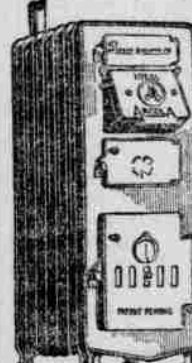

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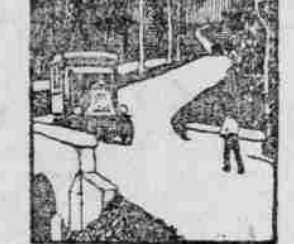
