

AMERICA OBJECTS TO SOVIET TERMS

Russia Must Begin Own Reconstruction, Is Decree.

POSITION STATED FIRMLY

Government Outlines to Associated Press Stand Taken Regarding European Conferences.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 17.—Any question of the recognition by the United States of the Russian soviet government lies beyond the time when restoration of productivity in Russia shall have been set in motion by that country itself, according to an authoritative and plainly spoken outline of the attitude of the American government obtained today. Refusal to participate both in the Genoa conference and in the proposed commission consideration of Russian affairs at The Hague, it was added, was based on the conviction that such a restoration could not be hoped for under the terms outlined in the Russian memorandum of May 11 at Genoa.

In the meantime it was expected the United States is ready to embark with other powers on any purely scientific investigation of conditions in Russia with a view to recommendations as to steps necessary for the commercial, financial and industrial revival of that country; but it will have no part in any such deliberations which even imply a recognition of the soviet regime and would thus tend to "perpetuate delusions among the Russian people."

Effect Is Felt. In the American view the Russian Genoa memorandum, from which it appeared the proposal for the sessions at The Hague was an offshoot, would have exactly that effect in Russia. The memorandum, addressed to by Mr. Hughes in declining the invitation to The Hague stands as an "impossible barrier to the establishment to any relations with Russia." It was said. If it was in the minds of the Russian delegates that loans and other forms of credit might be established in the States without there first having been set up within Russia such conditions as would warrant investments there on a sound economic basis, they are laboring under a complete delusion and no good purpose would be served under the American view, by entering upon discussions at The Hague which could never reach a happy issue while the attitude indicated in the Russian memorandum remained unchanged.

It has been said repeatedly by American officials who have a hand in guiding the policies of the government, that recognition of the soviet government by the United States and other countries will not set afoot the economic rehabilitation of Russia.

Secretary Hughes indicated this clearly when he informed the Genoa group in his recent note that remedies for Russia's problems must come from "within" the Russian government.

Administration officials generally are wholly confident that the American people would never approve recognition of the soviet regime and indicate their belief that the assembled delegates at Genoa should by now fully understand the fixed nature of the American policy of standing wholly aloof from any international arrangement that might have the appearance of moving toward such recognition.

There seems to have arisen some misunderstanding in European capitals, nevertheless, and the very pointed reaffirmation of the American position here today undoubtedly was designed to clear away the least misapprehension in Genoa or any feeling that later conversations might induce the United States to enter a discussion resting in any way on the present Russian attitude.

and brought several requests for other numbers. Her first solo was "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia," a general favorite with radio fans. It was followed by another violin solo by Pauline Wolf, "Der Sohn der Haide" (Keller Bela).

J. Ross Fargo, tenor, completed the list of soloists. Mr. Fargo, who is both a concert singer and an instructor, leaves Portland shortly for the east, where he will study and give a series of concerts in Atlantic coast cities during the summer. His first number was "Sonia" (Speaks).

May Van Dyck Hardwick accompanied on the piano six of the seven artists, and her playing was no small contribution to the success of the long programme. Accompanying five vocal soloists and one violinist in a total of 11 selections, she was at the piano the greater portion of the two hours of broadcasting and played an astounding and difficult variety of music.

After the first round of single solos the artists then finished their series of three by singing two in their second turn. Mrs. Vernon J. Hucks's group came after Mr. Fargo's first solo. She sang "Jean" (Spross) and "Call Me no More" (Cadmian), and then Walter Hardwick finished his series, singing another negro spiritual, "Standing in the Need of Prayer" (Reddick) and "Armourer's Song" from "Robin Hood" (De Koven).

Maurice Lepiat, violinist, played

himself into the hearts of thousands of listeners. He did not play until after the tenth announcement, and then his rendition of "Meditation" from "Thais" (Massenet), played with exquisite fire and feeling, was a triumph. He was accompanied by May Van Dyck Hardwick, and at the end of the solo, before those in the tower room of the Oregonian building could applaud, the sound of handclapping was wafted up from the street, where a crowd of listeners had heard through the magnavox in Meier & Frank's window. Lepiat's second number, Wieniawski's "Polish Dance," was received in the same way.

The remaining numbers on the programme, all of which were accompanied by May Van Dyck Hardwick at the piano, follow in the order given: "Winnifred Campbell, soprano—"By the Waters of Minnetonka" (Lieurance), with violin obbligato by Maurice Lepiat, and "In the Gloaming" (Harrison). Maurice Lepiat, violinist—"Hymn to the Sun" (Rimsky-Korsakov), played by request, and "Obertass" (Wieniawski). J. Ross Fargo, tenor—"I Hear You Calling" (Mehal), and "Farewell" (Russell). Maurice Lepiat, violinist—"Andante" (Leimert) and Chopin's "Nocturne in E flat."

CLASSIC MUSIC BROADCAST

High-Class Programme Given Out From Oregonian Tower.

Four prominent local musical entertainers presented a high-class programme from the Oregonian radio tower yesterday from 3:30 to 4 o'clock. It was praised by a number of radio fans who called up immediately after the conclusion of the programme. The entertainers were Ralph Osborne, organist at the Peoples theater; Idah Lidyard, well-known local vocalist; Joseph Sampietro, violinist at the Peoples theater, and Jessie Sams Baker, piano accompanist.

The nine solos were all classical and were well received by the listening hundreds sitting in their homes everywhere about the city and outlying districts. The violin numbers rendered by Mr. Sampietro and the vocal selections by Idah Lidyard seemed to carry extremely well, as phone calls were received reporting them from towns 30 and 40 miles from Portland.

This afternoon, beginning at 3:30 o'clock, the Multnomah orchestra will broadcast five popular numbers from The Oregonian radio studio. They will play under the direction of Louis Shurtliffe. The numbers will be: "Bamboo Bay," "Let 'er Go, Love," "South Sea Isle," a saxophone and violin solo by A. F. Yar and Louis Shurtliffe; "Swanee Bluebird" and "Nobody Lied." Schooner Constructed at Marshfield in 1904.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—Officials of the Northern Commercial company, owners of the auxiliary schooner Ozmo, reported sinking off Cape Blanco, said that the vessel carried the following officers and men: Captain John Worth, J. The schooner is a three masted vessel of 285 tons, constructed in 1904 by K. V. Kruse at Marshfield, Or. The schooner's auxiliary power is an oil engine.

CAMERON CASE DROPPED

Charge of Perjury Against Senator Thrown Out by Court.

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 17.—Federal Judge Van Fleet today sustained the demurrer of Ralph H. Cameron, United States senator, republican, of Arizona, to an indictment which accused the senator of perjury. The indictment was ordered dismissed.

The senator was charged with having omitted campaign contributions totaling more than \$25,000 from a sworn statement of campaign receipts in the 1910 election. Harry Williams of Philadelphia was mentioned as having given \$15,000 of the amount.

MANDATE APPROVAL BY AMERICA IS NEAR

Agreement With French Over Syria Practically Made.

CONDITIONS TO BE MET

Balfour Tells Council England Is Disappointed Over Protests on Palestine Matter.

GENEVA, May 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The United States and France are about to reach an agreement on the French mandate for Syria, according to information reaching the secretariat of the league of nations. It is understood the American government's approval is subject to certain conditions which apparently will be met.

France is expected to ask the approval of the mandate by the council of the league at the special meeting to be held not later than July 15 at which the British mandate for Palestine is to be discussed.

Britain Is Disappointed. Lord Balfour told the council that Great Britain was greatly disappointed that the present session had failed to register consent to the terms of the mandate over Palestine upon which the allied powers had long ago agreed.

In some quarters, he continued, it was feared that the British mandate might affect some religious organizations unfavorably. Great Britain was amazed, he said, that such a baseless view should be expressed over the transfer of Palestine from a Mohammedan to a Christian power.

England Declared Liberal. No country had been more liberal than Great Britain dealing with religious feeling in its territories, declared Lord Balfour, and in no country had Catholics received fairer treatment than in England. All England would do in Palestine would be done in the full noonday sun of public opinion.

Palestine, continued Lord Balfour, would be no financial asset to Great Britain. Furthermore, the country needed money to make itself supporting and the delay over the mandate was seriously embarrassing the administration by discouraging those who might desire to extend loans.

ARAB POPULATION AROUSED

People Regard Proposed Constitution as Humiliating.

JERUSALEM, April 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—The publication locally of the drafted text of the proposed constitution for the state of Palestine and its municipal councils had been received with signs of indignation on the part of the Arab population without distinction of religion or political creed.

Organizations all over Palestine, as soon as import of the text became known, began sending strongly worded protests to Premier Lloyd George, to the council of the league of nations and to the leading members of the British parliament.

The draft confers upon the British high commissioner here the sole power of decision in all matters relating to the management of local affairs, the council being left with a consultative duty only, except in the making of roads and the establishment of hospitals.

The Arabs seem to be at a loss to understand the reasons which prompted the British who hold a mandate in Palestine, to adopt an attitude which they regard as humiliating.

AUTOISTS TO ORGANIZE

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION PLANS TO FOSTER UNIFORM LAWS.

Effort Toward More Just Taxation Will Be Launched; Committee to Choose Name, Officers.

CHICAGO, May 17.—Representatives of 243 automobile clubs and more than 200,000 motorists from various states met here today to organize a national association to protect the interests of motor car owners throughout the country.

According to plans drawn up today the organization expects to check traffic driving, create uniform driving regulations, effective uniformity of automobile legislation, obtain more just taxation, relieve congestion of the large cities and sponsor other laws in which motorists are interested.

A committee consisting of representatives from New York, Illinois, Iowa and Colorado was named to effect a permanent organization, organize and
