Arthur has rolled up 7123 votes. Crumpacker is third at 6000, the candidate running on a "right wing and beer" platform, is last with 1203 votes. From the start the contest is between McArthur and Kellie. The high candidates for the legislature are Adams, Brownell, Campbell, Hurlburt, Huston, Kirkwood, Kuhl, Kuhn, D. C. Lewis, H. A. Lewis, Lynn, Simmons, Woodward. For the joint senatorial district Clark leads Banks by 602.

Corbett is leading for state senator over Wilson.

Meindl has a lead of 1453 for joint representative.

Klepper, out of 16,000 votes counted, leads Bristol for state senator by 2925. He will probably be nominated.

Multnomah Vote Heavy.

Heavy voting marked the primary election in Multnomah county, as was expected, but the counting of the polls did not come until 6 o'clock last night, from which time it continued until the polls closed at 8 o'clock.

Chief interest throughout the day was centered in rumors as to the results being tabulated by the counting boards. Apparently there were leaks from some of the boards counting the ballots, and these leaks were from widely scattered precincts.

According to these reports, Oleott had a tremendous majority in some precincts, while Hall led heavily in others, the favorite being characterized by interest throughout the day.

This is the first time that the count has started before the closing of the polls, and much interest was attracted as a consequence. The counting boards began work at 10 A. M. and every time
