HOUSE MEASURE SLIGHTLY AMENDED BY SENATE.

Proposal to Put Compensation of All Branches on New Basis Now Goes to Conference.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 22 .- The senate today passed, after only a brief debate, the house bill fixing a new basis of pay for officers and enlisted personnel of the army, navy, marine corps, coast guard, coast and geodetic survey and the public health service. Two amendments were added and the measure now goes to conference with the house for adjustment of the dif-

Provisions of the bill are effective

July 1, upon which date the present war-time basis of pay and allow-ances automatically expire, and which would have been supplanted by the 1908 schedules had not action been taken on the revision bill.

Chairman Wadsworth of the special committee in charge of the bill declared it was written on an entirely new plan which, he asserted, was the first effort to put the pay of the Washington street was raided by the

nearly \$16,000,000 in 1923, as compared to the present rates of pay, but would cost approximately \$1,000,000 more than the 1908 basis, computed on the present strength of the services affected. In writing the bill, Mr. Wadsworth

In writing the bill, Mr. Wadsworth said, the joint commission which conducted an extended inquiry into the subject sought to equalize and adjust the rates of pay so that the compensation of officers and men alike would be computed on a combination of length of service and rank. The chairman said it guarded against what he termed "stagnation in promotion," so that an officer or man automatically would receive an inautomatically would receive an in-crease in salary after given periods of years, while at the same time, ac-cording to the senator's explanation, the government would be protected against the evils of "too rapid pro-motion" and the consequent rapid in-

\$25,000 DECLARED EXTORTED BY SHOOTING VICTIM.

Millionaire Son of Head of New York Baking Company Says \$75,000 More Was Asked.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., May 22 .-Blackmail levies totaling \$25,000 were forced from Walter S. Ward of New Rochelle, millionaire son of the head of the Ward Baking company of New York before he shot and killed Clarence Peters, ex-sailor of Haverhill, Mass., it was declared, following his onfession and arrest today.

This, with the announcement of Sheriff Werner that he expected to have under arrest within 24 hours two alleged accomplices of Peters in the velopment tonight.

The shooting, according to Ward, occurred after Peters and his two sileged accomplices had threatened to kill him, his wife and their two children if he did not pay an addi-tional levy of \$75,000.

After surrendering himself to Sheriff Werner today, Ward, who is 31 years old, is alleged to have declared that Peters, whom he had known several years, and two companions known to him only as "Charlie Ross" and "Jack," had been blackmalling him for the last six weeks. He said they had forced from him various sums. Sheriff Werner said tonight these totaled approximately \$25,000. Lest Theyday, Ward mately \$25,000. Last Tuesday, Ward is said to have declared, he met Peters by appointment near New Rochelle. This followed the receipt of a letter and numerous telephone calls from the trio, demanding a final payment of \$75,000.

Coroner's Jury Says Woman Fired

Shot That Killed Wesley Howarth.

SEATTLE, Wash, May 22.—A coroner's jury which today investigated the death of Wesley Howarth, shot diuring an alleged brawl in a hotel here yesterday, returned a verdict finding that Howarth was killed "by Manshigled Sound in Howarth's apartiment after the shooting, was held pending further investigation by members of the prosecuting attorney staff.

In a dying statement to an attorney yesterday, Howarth was alleged to have said he shot himself accidentally. Hospital attendants testified today that he later repudiated the statement, telling them Mrs. Farley shot him.
