Gossip about expected loans to central European countries to purchase supplies, including grain, was current during the advance in prices. More at-tention, however, was attracted to mes-sages telling of a renewal of export de-mand at the soaboard and asserting that vessel room to Europe was being en-gaged for shipments from Chicago. Be-sides, Chicago interests were credited with actively closing spreads between the May delivery here and in Winnipeg. Shorts in the wheat market scrambled for the limited offerings available dur-ing the last half of the day. Earlier the buils were at a disadvantage for the time being, inasmuch as deliveries here on May contracts were heavy. 71.000 bushels and receipts in Chicago totaled 398 carloads. In addition, raintoads west of here had ordered wheat shipments runhed to Chi-cago, and were guaranteeing a 24-hour schedule for such shipments from points on the Missouri river.
