I think some uncooked strawberry preserve recipes have been given since your letter was written. The recipe given above for sunshine strawberries is sometimes called "uncooked jam."

Raspberries may be similarly treated as in both the above recipes. A little currant or lemon juice greatly improves them.

CITY LIGHT PLANT AHEAD

Tacoma Makes \$660,037 Profit in 1921, Says Report.

TACOMA, Wash., June 4.—(Special).—Tacoma's light department made a profit of \$660,037.24 in 1921 and \$574,867.39 in 1920. The present surplus is \$3,536,341.87, according to the report issued today by the department, the second since the 1918-19 period.

The bonded debt of the plant is now \$1,242,000, including the issue of the \$300,000 additional bonds to buy the Cushman site in 1919. During 1920 the operation revenues were \$1,107,335.19, and for 1921 were \$1,132,220.21, as compared with \$788,456.16 for 1918.

Since 1918 the use of city power for heat and light has jumped annually about 10 per cent each year, and at the close of 1921 about 95,000,000 kilowatt hours were being used, according to the report.

Lumber Mills Operating Steadily.

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 4.—(Special).—Lumber mills are operating in all sections of the state, according to Charles Furman, special agent of the United States department of commerce, who visited the Aberdeen branch office of the department Saturday. New industries are springing up in the state, greater optimism among business and working men and prospects for good crops indicate that Washington is thriving and developing.

According to Mr. Furman, Grays Harbor is one of the busiest lumbering districts on the coast.

Household Problems by Lillian Tingle

PORTLAND, Or.—Miss Tingle: Will you please publish the recipe for sun-cooked strawberry preserves? Thanking you, A. RABBER.

I hope the following is what you want. If the sunshine should fall you one day set the berries in the warming oven.

Sunshine strawberry preserves—Wash and hull fresh, perfect berries. Lay on platters and sprinkle with ½ cup sugar and 2 tablespoons currant juice or berry juice, with a little lemon juice. Put in layers in large baking dish and bake in a rather slow oven about 40 minutes.

Put into sterilized glasses and seal with paraffin, like jelly.

Following is "semi-sunshine" method, which comes to be recommended, though I have not used this exact formula personally. A little more sugar might be allowed if desired.

Baked strawberry preserves—Wash and hull the berries. For each quart prepared berries allow 1 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons currant juice or berry juice, with a little lemon juice. Put in layers in large baking dish and bake in a rather slow oven about 40 minutes.

Put into sterilized glasses and seal, or spread on platters, allow to

Problems of Dressmaking by Madam Richet

PORTLAND, May 22.—Dear Madam Richet: I have a Burgundy satin dress which is as good as new. I wore it three years. It is made like I have outlined picture.

Underneath of same light-fitting two-piece full skirt, with panels on side waist braided in front and lower corners front and back. The style is really not so bad; only the sleeves. I am a fine sewer, but whenever I make over a dress I never like it.

I am 5 feet 3 inches and weigh 120 pounds. Dark hair and eyes and very pale. In Burgundy being worn at all. Would you advise me to have it dyed a dark blue? I do not look well in blue. Could I use the panels on the waist some way? The over-bust has two and three-inch slashes in front and back to want it "fussy," as I cannot wear plain clothes.

Could I combine it with something to make a long waist and the sash with "bow"? Will think you for any suggestions. Or would you advise to leave it as it is and have it dyed? Thanking you in advance, Yours truly, MRS. L. M. R. Rose City Park.

MRS. L. M. R.: Your material is good, likewise the color, and as long as you feel that the blue is not becoming I would advise you to keep it as it is as far as the color is concerned. As for a style would ask you to please see the model as shown in the May Elite, page 28, No. 1782, and skirt there shown. Have the upper portion of the four-lard with the same tone and figures which harmonize with the Burgundy. Trim the back line and the sleeves as pictured. The type will give you a complete change and after three years in the same line I am sure you will welcome the change.

The foulard will produce the more "fussy" trim you mention as wanting.

DRAINAGE REPORT MADE

ASSISTANT STATE ENGINEER BACK FROM TRIP.

Meadows District North of Upper Klamath Lake Declared Good for Dairying.

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SALEM, Or., June 4.—(Special).—The Meadows drainage district, which lies north of Upper Klamath lake and which includes an area of approximately 27,562 acres, is being developed in three units, and two of these are now practically completed, according to Charles E. Stricklin, assistant state engineer, who has returned to Salem from an inspection tour in which he visited six projects.

The reclamation of the Meadows project is accomplished by constructing dykes and drainage canals and will require three pumping plants. These plants necessarily will be operated from two to four weeks each year for the purpose of removing surface water and lowering the water table. Water for irrigation purposes will be taken from Wood river. The soil of the district is a deep peat loam and a large area already has been seeded to bluegrass, timothy and clover. It is reported that 5000 head of cattle will be pastured on the project this season.

"The Meadows district," Mr. Stricklin said, "is especially fortunate in being able to get an abundant supply of artesian water at a depth of about 200 feet. This will make it a desirable dairying section. It was estimated that project will cost about \$550,000."

Railroad Work Nearly Completed.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 4.—(Special).—The rehabilitating and re-railing of the O.-W. R. & N. company's line between this city and Baker, which is a large part of the \$1,500,000 in improvements being made to the roadbed of the second location this year, has been largely completed. All the halting between Union Junction and Baker has been completed and between Union Junction and this city a crew of more than 200 men is rushing the work.

Interest Cut Helps Farmers.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 4.—(Special).—The one-half per cent cut in interest on federal farm bank loans will result in an annual saving of about \$3000 to farmers now having loans, and whose applications have been approved. The amount of loans carried by the Grande Ronde Federal Farm Loan association is \$583,000 and a large part of the ap-

plications for loans amounting to \$185,000 have already been approved. Charles Reynolds, secretary of the association, has announced.
