

EVIDENCE SHOWS BANK-RAID WENT

Testimony Introduced at
Trial of Governor Small.

JURORS, BAILIFF FIGHT

Trouble Starts When Panel Votes
11 to 1 to Go to Ball Game.
Case Appealed to Judge.

WAUKESHA, Ill., June 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Vernon S. Curtis, co-defendant with Governor Small on charges of conspiracy to defraud the state, objected to having the Grand Jury, which the state alleges was a fictitious institution for the manipulation of public funds, listed as a bank in a bankers' directory, according to evidence today at the trial of Governor Small.

Through Marshall H. Jackson, of Dwight, and Mr. H. Jackson, representative of a Chicago bank supply house, the state brought out that Mr. Curtis asked the witness to call up the bankers' directory publishers, after they had made inquiries about the new bank, and tell them that "was not going to be engaged in banking business."

Bitter Battle Forecast.
One ledger, a rubber stamp, 500 time certificates of deposit, 500 demand certificates of deposit, 500 deposit slips, 500 letterheads and 500 envelopes constituted the equipment ordered from him for the bank, Mr. Jackson testified.

The most bitterly fought battle of the trial was forecast for tomorrow when just before adjournment tonight James H. Kilgore, assistant attorney-general, notified the court that the state regarded witnesses subpoenaed from two Curtis institutions at Grant Park and Governor Small's own bank, the First Trust and Savings of Kankakee, as necessary and asked the court to call them as its witnesses, in order that the state might cross examine them later. The proposal developed a lengthy wrangle between the state and defense.

Jury and Bailiff Have Split.

The week end was culminated by another split between the jury and their bailiff. It developed when court met today. The trouble started Sunday when the jury voted 11 to 1 to attend a ball game at Antioch, and the 12th man, August Larsen, a Dane, held out for a Viking club picnic. The 11 appealed to the judge to lock Larsen up while they saw the game and when he declined and ruled that Larsen should accompany the majority, Larsen developed a headache and the jury played home. The bailiff took them for a walk and the jury decided to go fishing but the bailiff declined to walk to the end of the half mile highway, and the disgruntled jurors finally were forced to fish in shallow water at the shore end.

Jurors Present Petition.

Today the jurors presented a petition to Judge Edwards asking for more hours in court. They objected to the working day selected by the lawyers, 10 A. M. to 4:30 P. M. They proposed starting at 9 A. M. and working until 5 P. M. The attorneys and court agreed to a compromise of 9:30 A. M. to 4:30 P. M. with one hour for lunch instead of an hour and a half.

Al Kader Temple Stages

**J. L. PHILLIPS GIVES UP
ALLEGED WAR CONTRACT
CONSPIRATOR ARRESTED.**

Examination Is Waived and Release Is Obtained Under Bond of \$25,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—John Lewis Phillips, republican state chairman for Georgia, for whose arrest a warrant was issued late Saturday on complaint of the department of justice, alleging conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with a war contract for the disposal of surplus lumber, surrendered to a deputy United States marshal on his arrival here today from Philadelphia.

He was immediately arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitt, who issued the warrant, waived examination and was released in \$25,000 bonds for action of the grand jury.

The warrant for Mr. Phillips' arrest, sworn to by Marcus Borchert, special assistant to the attorney-general, and John W. Cram, assistant attorney-general, was issued while the special grand jury was still conducting its investigation of the lumber disposal contract made by the war department with the firm of Phillips & Stephens, acting as agents for the lumber interests. No indictment has yet been returned by the grand jury and it is understood that witnesses were still being heard.

**OIL WELL TO BE TESTED
VALUE OF LOWER COLUMBIA
STRIKE HELD IMPORTANT.**

Directors of Company Decide

Upon Survey at 3850 Feet

to Safeguard Interests.

ASTORIA, Or., June 5.—(Special.)—At a depth of 3850 feet, the 64-inch casing in the Lower Columbia Oil & Gas company's well will be pulled, Boreen or perforated casing will be set and the water will be bailed out, so that a complete test of the amount of oil and gas in the hole can be made and the value of the find determined.

RAIL HEARING TO OPEN

Wenatchee Southern Construction

Down Columbia at Issue.

WENATCHEE, Wash., June 5.—(Special.)—Officials of the Wenatchee Southern railroad have been notified by the interstate commerce commission that a hearing will be held here tomorrow on the railroad's application for a certificate of necessity to permit the construction of the road down the Columbia river to Pasco. The application has been officially opposed by the Great Northern railway.

J. N. Teal, Portland attorney, has been retained by the Wenatchee Southern to represent it at this hearing.

Stockholders of the railroad have voted unanimously to increase the capital stock from \$50,000 to \$400,000. A bond issue of \$400,000 also will be authorized if the decision of the interstate commerce commission is favorable. Construction of the road is declared to be assured if a certificate of necessity is issued.
