PASTORS CONDEMN NEWS STAND TRASH

Four cases of bankruptcy were filed in federal court yesterday, two voluntary and two involuntary, involving out-of-town concerns and individuals. The largest of these failures was that of the Adams Bros. company of Elgin, lumber and box manufacturers. Assets of \$70,000 were listed. The Leaburg Mercantile company of Leaburg, names its assets as \$1500 and its liabilities as \$21,000. Voluntary petitioners were Fred T. Smith of Bend, with no assets and \$2000 liabilities, and William Downing of Wallawa, with liabilities of \$1500.

\$16,000 DAMAGE SUIT FILED—Poor foundations of an apartment house at 208 Fourth street had given way to the extent of causing a slope of several inches in the floor of the apartment occupied by Helen Iris Sutherland on February 9, 1921. Blaming this slope in the flooring for her fall, the woman recovers in a \$16,000 damage suit, brought in the circuit court yesterday against Fred E. Sharkey, owner of the building, that she slipped, upsetting a pan of scalding water, causing burns which kept her in bed for seven weeks and left her permanently scarred.

STRAFKAMMER IS JAILED—Jacob Petri, a longshoreman strikebreaker, was fined \$20 and sentenced to 10 days in jail yesterday by Municipal Judge Ekert on a charge of disorderly conduct. Testimony showed that when Policeman Blanchard went to the steamer T. J. Potter to arrest another man, Petri's conduct incited the others aboard the boat to overpower the officer and take his prisoner from him.

CHINESE TO BE SEARCHED

SPECIAL SQUAD OF POLICE SENT INTO DISTRICT.

District Attorney Declares That Tong Must Learn They Are Not Above Government.

Utilization of a "strong-arm squad" in Chinatown to comb the dens and search every oriental for concealed weapons in order to discourage a resumption of tong war activities is a result of the outbreak last week, was ordered by District Attorney Myers yesterday.

Captain John T. Moore of the day relief at the police station, acting chief in the absence from the city of Chief Jenkins, sent out the squad in addition to the officers employed in watching Chinese quarters for vice activities.

Police on this special mission traveled in pairs and subjected all orientals to a rigid "frisk" for weapons.

"If they object, refer them to me," declared the district attorney. "If they wish to declare warfare and resume promiscuous shooting and the like, this force will declare warfare on them," he continued. "The tongs are not more powerful than the city and state government and must find it out. The closing down of gambling halls following the former shooting was but the first step in a programme which may require the scattering of Chinese residents from their present haunts."

"I doubt that the shooting in this particular instance was done by a member of the Hip Sing tong, the organization which is powerful in its influence in the east and is trying to get a strong foothold on the Pacific coast. I am more inclined to believe that the killer was a drug addict inflamed with opium or morphine and desirous of collecting the head money, and everyone interested in warring tongs for deaths of members of opposing factions. So far as I have been able to learn, virtually all Hip Sing members have fled from the city."

PASTORS CONDEMN NEWS STAND TRASH

Sale of Suggestive Reading Matter Rouses Protest.

TRAFFIC HELD BANEFUL
Rev. Ward W. McHenry Is Elected President of Ministerial Association of City.

The Portland Ministerial association called on federal, state and city officials to use their influence to stop the sale of suggestive literature and magazines in a resolution adopted unanimously yesterday morning at the regular monthly meeting.

J. C. Meehan and O. W. Davidson, who had been appointed as a committee to investigate this question for the pastors brought in exhibits of matter, purchased at Portland newsstands. The ministers stated that this literature aroused their "utmost indignation and conviction that this traffic constitutes a most serious menace to the health and moral welfare of our young people."

Pastors Will Wage War.
 The pastors pledged their "unflinching efforts toward stopping this contemptible and destructive traffic by an appeal to public sentiment" as well as to the authorities.

The ministers did not extend official thanks to the Portland Baseball club for season passes tendered at the opening of the season by Rev. T. H. Gallagher presented a resolution of thanks, but Rev. W. L. Riley created a commotion by stating that he did not believe in Sunday baseball and had refused his pass on this ground.

Dr. E. H. Pence said he did not think it would be wise to take any action as an organization condemning the baseball club. The motion was tabled after more discussion and advancement of the same arguments.

School Proposals Indorsed.
 The ministers indorsed the school bond and tax levy and decided to call the attention of their congregations to the same Sunday. A. C. Newell, chairman of the board, spoke on the needs of the schools.

Rev. Ward W. McHenry, pastor of the Mount Tabor Presbyterian church, was elected president of the association to succeed Dr. Edward Constant. Rev. W. E. Brinkman of the St. James English Lutheran church was chosen vice-president, and Ray E. Cloem, executive secretary of the Portland Council of Churches, secretary-treasurer.

Judge Jacob Kanlier asked for support for the citizens' military training camp this summer at Camp Lewis. The pastors unanimously adopted a resolution giving their approval to the project.

DIVORCE HELD INVALID

CHILD BORN 11 MONTHS AFTER DECREE IS GIVEN.

Couple Who Live Together After Husband Won by Default Still Married, Says Judge.

The divorce decree which George Dennis obtained from his wife, Elsie, in the court of Circuit Judge Gatens in January, 1920, is of no value in the eyes of the law, the same judge ruled yesterday when Mrs. Dennis testified that she had never known the divorce and that the child whose custody she sought in a recent divorce action filed, was born in December, 1920, 11 months after the default order was entered in her husband's suit.

Mrs. Dennis brought suit on grounds of cruelty and her husband filed an answer setting forth in defense the award of a divorce of divorce to him two years ago. On the witness stand, Mrs. Dennis tearfully asserted that she knew nothing of the first suit except that it had been filed, saying that her husband told her right after the action had been started that he was sorry he had brought it and would have it dismissed. Instead of doing so, he obtained his decree by default, it is asserted, never notifying his wife and continuing to live with her.

Judge Gatens held yesterday that the couple were still married in the eyes of the law and gave Dennis time to file a supplemental defense setting out another defense, if he desired.

Dennis is reputed worth \$10,000. His wife asks \$75 a month alimony and \$25 a month permanent alimony.

Miss Mitchell will sail for China in August. During the past year she has been engaged in mission kindergarten work among the Japanese of Portland. During that time she has made her home with Bishop and Mrs. Washington at 686 East Taylor street.

WORK ON LIBRARY BEGUN
UNIVERSITY PARK COMMUNITY IS BUILDER.

Structure, Said to Be First of Kind in Northwest, Will Cost About \$3700.

Work on the superstructure of the new University Park Community library started yesterday. The foundation for the new building, which is situated at Lombard and Herford streets opposite the Portsmouth school, was completed last week.

The library is unique in that it is the first one in Portland, if not in the Pacific northwest, to be built by a community. The building is being constructed by the University Park Library association, an organization formed by residents to provide a community with library facilities.

As soon as the building is completed it will be leased by the Portland Library association, which will stock it with books and will provide a librarian. A five-year lease already has been agreed upon.

The building will cost approximately \$3700. It will be of the tunic-bungalow type, shingled outside, and will contain only one large room. An annex, to be built on the rear, will be used as a children's story room. Space will be left for the addition of a committee room later.

The committee in charge of the work consists of Thomas Willis, Mrs. Bessie Porter, E. J. Fully, George Mahoney, J. W. Stephens, Rev. John D. Rice, pastor of St. Andrew's church, Mrs. Emma Bayley and Mrs. Dora McPherson. It is believed that the library will not be stocked and open to the public until September.

U. S. FLEET ADVOCATED

URGENT NEED FOR MERCHANT MARINE CITED.

America Requires Ships to Hold Japan in Place, Says Head of Baltimore Company.

America must build a strong merchant marine and maintain it if she is to hold her place among the nations of the world, according to the chairman of the board of the Baltimore Steamship company, who was the principal speaker at the members' forum meeting of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

"We must maintain a large merchant marine to keep our promises to the other nations of the world that we will hold Japan in her place," declared the speaker. He called attention to the utter lack of ships flying the American flag prior to the war. Even during the war, he declared, the American flag could not do effective work without transporting supplies in foreign bottoms.

"We must have legislation that will insure a subsidy of some kind that will keep our flag flying on merchant craft," said Captain Stanton.

Dr. E. J. Cattell, city statistician of Philadelphia, also spoke.

ROCKPILE GETS FORGER
 Fourth Bad Check Issued to Pay Losses on Other Three.

Paroled by Circuit Judge Morrow on a forged check when he promised to turn over a new leaf and to make good the bad paper already passed, H.
