DINACRON. Woodward speaking in a city-wide speaking campaign, to rouse interest in the proposed \$4,000,000 bond issue, and tax levy for Portland schools, William Woodward, school director, is almost daily addressing gatherings of parents and taxpayers, and has announced several dates for the near future. The election will be held June 17. Director Woodward will speak tomorrow at 8 P. M., at Linn school; Friday, at 8:30 P. M., at Highland school; Saturday, at 2 P. M., at Latta school; Monday, at 2:30 P. M., at Alameda school, and Monday night at 8 o'clock before the central labor council.

WHISKY RUNNER FINED \$150.—The apparently candid assertion that he was merely the tool in a bootlegging transaction of first magnitude drew a light fine yesterday for T. F. Page, truck driver, recently arrested near St. Helens while conveying an entire truckload of whisky. Judge Wolverson imposed a fine of \$150. The owner of the confiscated liquor has not been arrested. Trial dates for other federal cases were set as follows: Isay Krichewsky, charged with violating the liquor law, July 25; Tom Martin, charged with violation of the outside fishing law, passed at the last session of the legislature, when he arrested T. Kaemulano last week for having in his possession fish taken by troll during the closed season. He was fined \$50 and the salmon was confiscated and sold. Mr. Larson also arrested the Anderson Fish Company for having fish taken by troll and delivered to the Oregon side of the river. This case will come up for trial at Astoria later.

STARK OPTOMETRIST MEET.—The Oregon Optometric association will hold its annual meeting Monday and Tuesday, Dr. Charles Sheard, editor of the American Journal of Physiological Optics, will be the principal speaker at the convention. He will arrive with his wife Saturday and will be taken over the highway. Monday and Tuesday, Dr. Sheard will speak at the chamber of commerce and the Rotary club and Tuesday night will be the honor guest at a dinner in the crystal room of the Benson hotel.

CHOICE OF FINE OR JAIL ALLOWED.—Clay Johnson was given his choice in municipal court yesterday morning of paying a fine of \$100 or serving five days in jail. Municipal Judge Ekwall proposed the sentence and Johnson right off the bat said he would take the fine. Then he withdrew to consult four women who were with him. After the consultation he changed his mind and paid the \$100 fine.

RADIO CLUB ORGANIZED BY ST. JOHNS.—Further evidence of the widespread interest in wireless telephony was furnished last night by the organization of a radio club at St. Johns. The meeting was held at the St. Johns Y. M. C. A. The purpose of the club is to spread radio enthusiasm and information among the residents of the Peninsula districts. A number of stations are in operation on the Peninsula.

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FIRST DECORATION IN PLACE FOR FETE

Ropes of Green and Blooms Grace Sixth and Alder.

SCHEME FULL OF COLOR

Committee in Charge Inaugurates Most Imposing Street Plan Yet for Rose Carnival.

The first Rose Festival decoration, installed yesterday at Sixth and Alder, give a hint of the gay and colorful street dress soon to be donned for the annual fete. From the center of the street crossing, ropes of greenery and roses extend to each corner to huge baskets of roses, moss and green. The roses are artificial, but are so cleverly designed that they look real. Similar decorations will grace many of the principal downtown corners. This scheme of decorations is new and has been worked out by Clay S. Morse, chairman, assisted by three other directors—Fred W. German, H. W. Kent and W. C. Culbertson and a large committee.

Decorations Harmony Desired.—"We hope the merchants will co-operate with us by putting up decorations, which will harmonize with those now on display," said Mr. Morse. "We trust also that we may have added financial backing to make possible the carrying out of our idea in many downtown streets. The scheme is artistic and carries out splendidly the spirit of the festival."

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WAR CRAFT DUE JUNE 18

DESTROYER DIVISION COMING HERE FOR FESTIVAL.

Battleship Connecticut to Join Six Naval Hounds, Steaming North From San Pedro.

The United States destroyer division No. 31, comprising the six standard type oil-burning war craft, John Francis Burns, Farragut, Percival, Chauncey, Fuller and Somers, assigned to come to Portland for the Rose Festival, will arrive in Portland harbor on Sunday afternoon, June 18. The definite time of the division's arrival was given in a letter from Commander L. M. McNair, in charge of the division, received by Lieutenant Kerr of the navy recruiting station here.

The six destroyers are now at Bremerton and will steam out of Puget sound on Saturday, June 17, for the trip down the coast. The battleship Connecticut, now at San Pedro, will arrive on either Sunday afternoon, June 18, or Monday morning, June 19, possibly reaching a point off the Columbia river in time to meet the destroyer division from the north and head the parade of war craft in through the harbor entrance and up the Columbia and Willamette rivers to Portland. Rear Admiral Chase of the Pacific fleet will come north on the Connecticut, with Commander G. L. P. Stone, officer in command.
