The entire Roumanian royal family are traveling in state to Belgrade early for the wedding of Princess Marie to King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia.

Arriving at Save quay in Belgrade, the royal party will be received by King Alexander and the mayor of the city, who will present King Ferdinand of Roumania with a golden tray bearing bread and salt as a pledge of Slav amity and hospitality.

The honeymoon of Alexander and Marie will be spent at one of the royal castles of Jugo-Slavia. The princess is receiving hundreds of costly and quaint gifts. Among the latest presents was a flock of rams with golden horns from her Albanian admirers.

ization and take members into the Western Progressive association, the grange membership had lost only about 4900 during the year and there still were prospects that the aim of "25,000 by 1925" adopted two years ago, would be realized.

Resolutions were drawn up in committee meetings this afternoon. Among those planned was one objecting to the "30-19" school taxation bill on the score that it would increase school expenses. Another sought to give farmers the right to shoot Chinese pheasants at any time they are found on the farms.

When the resolutions concerning it are reported out of committee delegates are likely to engage in the only heated arguments of the session. Eminent speakers are expected from both the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college are here not to do any lobbying, of course, but they are more or less active in support of their respective means a lot to their institutions.

Liquor Sentences Approved. There was one, for instance, attaching jail sentences to all violations of the Volstead act. Its approval was unanimous. Another recognized the Bob White quail as a friend to man because he is an insect and will seek water from a well and declared for no open season against him. Not a grange turned a thumb down on Bob White.

Resolutions were reported in and carried favoring exclusion of Japanese and Chinese as well as total restriction of immigration from Europe for three to five years.

Hood River Pomena Reported. A resolution opposing a sales tax, the measure was carried. Favorable action was also taken on a resolution reported by the committee on agriculture asking for a law to compel fertilizer manufacturers to label all containers with the per cent of each constituent, the amount of animal and mineral matter and nature of the filler.

Mill Opens for Work. BEND, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—The sawing of 25,000 feet of line lumber daily started today at the McKinley-Hampson mill at Bull Springs, ten miles west of Bend. The lumber will be hauled to Bend for shipment.

Berry Pack to Be Large. SALEM, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Heads of Salem canneries, which today handle their first fruit of the season, estimated that the 1922 berry pack will approximate 600,000 cases. Work has begun on strawberries and gooseberries. The payroll of fruit workers for the season will not fall below \$600,000, managers said.

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3 KLAN OFFICIALS IN RAID INDICTED

34 Alleged Members Accused in Los Angeles.

THREE CHARGES MADE

Bail of Kleagle Baker Fixed at \$10,000 and Others at \$1000; Klan May Be Probed.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 7.—Three high officials and 34 alleged members of the Ku Klux Klan were indicted by the Los Angeles County grand jury today on five counts of felony charges, in connection with a raid at Inglewood, near here, on April 22, last.

The Klan officers were: William S. Coburn, grand goblin of the Pacific domain, and supreme attorney of the order; G. W. Price, king kleagle, for the state of California, and N. A. Baker, kleagle, or organizer for the county of Los Angeles.

Baker is under arrest here, while Coburn and Price are understood to be somewhere in the east. Six other persons were indicted, each as "John Doe." The charges are false imprisonment, two counts; kidnapping two counts and assault with intent to commit murder one count.

Bail was fixed for each of the defendants in the amount of \$10,000, except in the case of Nathan A. Baker, self-admitted leader in the raid, in whose case it was set at \$10,000. He is in custody in the psychopathic ward of the county hospital owing to a mental breakdown.

An attorney for the klanmen announced that the other indicted klanmen would appear in the superior court here tomorrow and in view of this no warrants were issued.

The attorney afterward explained that the appearance tomorrow would not so far as he knew, include Coburn and Price and that Baker's condition probably would make it impossible for the kleagle to appear.

Walter Mosher and Rueger are under \$10,000 bail on complaints charging assault with intent to commit murder, filed in the superior court soon after the raid. It was stated at the district attorney's office these complaints would probably be dismissed.

The Inglewood raid was directed at Fidel and Mathias Elduayen, proprietors of a licensed winery. The Elduayens were taken from their home at night, bound and carried to the police stations at Inglewood and Redondo Beach, at both of which places the authorities refused to accede to a demand by the captors that the prisoners be locked up as bootleggers.

While the raid was in progress Frank Woerner, deputy marshal of Inglewood, appeared upon the scene and ordered the raiders to disperse. He emptied his pistol into the crowd. Constable M. H. Mosher, Walter Mosher, son of the constable, being dropped. The constable died about an hour later.

Coburn and Price appeared in Inglewood after the raid. At the Inglewood police body, they testified that they received a report that a raid was in progress and went to the scene to ascertain whether any klanmen were mixed up in the affair.

It was stated at the district attorney's office that further evidence would be presented to the grand jury which might lead to a report covering the entire scope of the klan in California and elsewhere.

BOYS HELD AS BURGLARS Youths Picked Up as Vagrants. Have Jimmies in Pockets.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 7.—(Special.)—Harry Wilson, 18 years old, and George Procer, 19, were arrested at 2 o'clock this morning at Broadway and Sixth street on a charge of vagrancy. When searched the young men had two jimmys in their possession.

Later investigation showed that the filling station of J. E. Anderson at Main and Twelfth streets and the National bakery at 709 Main street had been robbed of about \$10. Wilson said he and Procer had committed the burglaries.

RAIL EXTENSION, REPORT Southern Pacific Expected to Run Trains to Newport.

NEWPORT, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—It is reliably reported here that the Southern Pacific Railroad company is seriously considering running passenger trains into Newport in the near future. Some of the railroad officials spent some time here last week looking over the proposed location for the depot. There are 30 or 40 men doing extensive repair work on the Yaquina. Northern that connects with the Southern Pacific at Yaquina and runs through the northeastern part of this city.

Reports have it that the depot will be located near the ball park, one mile east of the postoffice. Property has taken a jump in value this week along the line of the proposed terminal.
