

## POWER DELEGATES MEETING IN BOISE

Portlanders Give Talks at Hydro-Electric Session.

### O. B. COLDWELL SPEAKS

George L. Myers Also Makes Address at Fifteenth Annual Convention of Association.

BOISE, Idaho, June 7.—(Special.)—With the most representative assembly of power and hydro-electric delegates ever assembled in Boise, the 15th annual convention of the Northwest Electric & Power association was opened here today by W. R. Putnam of Boise, president of the association.

The opening session was featured by the address of George E. Erb, president of the Idaho public utilities commission, on the subject "Observations," in which he told of the important relations between the people, the commission and the public utilities.

O. B. Coldwell of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, spoke extemporaneously, touching upon the problems of the industry, the feeling of responsibility for the management and operation of the public utilities, and their appreciation of the duties imposed upon them.

Portland Man Speaks. George L. Myers, assistant to the president of the Pacific Power & Light company of Portland, spoke in the afternoon on the justification for state regulation. In developing this point he went back historically on the progress which has been made in lighting, starting first with the candle, then gas, oil and finally electricity.

The formation of companies to distribute these various commercial necessities including water and other things, led to the necessity for regulation, and the necessity for the regulation of not only rates but service, experience has shown that there are shortcomings in regulation, he said, but these probably will be remedied in time.

Public Meeting Held. A public meeting was held at the Plenary theater last night, at which President Smith of the national association, Robert Sibley, editor of the Journal of Electricity, E. V. Kaykandall, of the department of public works of Washington, and M. H. Aylesworth, executive manager of the national association, delivered addresses.

Chief Peder Jim Burke and five other braves of the Umatilla tribe, decked out in their elaborate robes of beaded buckskin, feathered war bonnets and complete Indian regalia, will come to the Rose festival as the guests of Eric V. Hauser, president, who has arranged to have canvas wigwams pitched on the roof of the Hotel Multnomah for the accommodation of his red-skin guests.

Roy C. Bishop, director of the Pendleton round-up, who is to be a guest of the festival regatta, in a letter to Mr. Hauser, received yesterday, said that Pendleton will be substantially represented at the festival. The Indians will bring their fancy beaded saddles and bridles, and mounted upon cayuses, to be chartered in Portland, will add a gay note of color and interest to the festival pageantry and other events. The party of braves will be personally conducted on the trip by Glen R. Busby of the Union Pacific, who also possesses an elaborate and very expensive Indian regalia which he will wear in the grand floral pageant with the Pendleton round-up delegation.

The coroner's jury at the inquest over the death of Susan Weir last night found that she had been killed by the blow of a hammer in the hands of her son, Walter Weir, and recommended that he be held for the grand jury for further investigation.

Funeral services for Mrs. Weir, who was 76 years old, will be held this morning at 10 o'clock in the chapel of Snook and Wheelock, Belmont and East Thirty-fifth streets. Interment will be at Oregon City.

## 19 TO BE SUBPENAED

Extra Witnesses to Be Called for Russell Hecker Trial.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Nineteen extra witnesses in addition to the legal limit of five allowed under the statutes will be subpoenaed by the state in the prosecution of Russell Hecker, 19-year-old youth who is to be tried here for the murder of Frank Bowker, Portland musician. Hecker, who en-

tered a formal plea to an indictment charging him with first degree murder, is held in the Multnomah county jail pending trial here on June 27.

## BAR ALIENS, IS DEMAND

FRATERNAL SOCIETIES SEEK TO AMERICANIZE TRADE.

City Council Asked to Refuse License to Foreigners to Do Business.

Resolutions demanding that licenses to conduct business in the city be granted by the city council only to American citizens were adopted last night at a meeting of the Oregon Federation of Fraternal Societies, held in the Knights of Pythias building, Park and Yamhill streets. The action was aimed especially at alien proprietors of soft-drink establishments, fruit stands and market stalls.

A communication from City Commissioner Barbur, stating that the city attorney would be requested to draft an ordinance compelling all contractors on municipal work to employ only citizens, was read at the meeting. Action also was taken in the matter of alien ownership of land.

Reports from several persons were made regarding negotiations with business and manufacturing firms in Portland, relative to the employment of foreign labor. A letter from Secretary of Labor Davis was read, highly commending the aims of the organization.

A resolution was adopted asking congress to eliminate manufacturers who employ alien labor from benefits under the proposed new tariff law. C. E. Yeager presided. About 100 delegates were present.

## TRAVELERS ARE GUESTS

Surprise Party Given for Oregon City Folk.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Mr. and Mrs. Richard Petzold and daughters, Misses Erna and Agnes, who will leave Saturday for a year's European trip, were guests at a surprise party at the parish house of St. Ignace on Thursday night.

The family had been guests for dinner at the Kraxberger home and the surprise guests arrived at 7 o'clock, soon taking possession of the parish house, adjoining the Kraxberger home. The programme was devoted to social time and several addresses were made.

Among those speaking were Rev. Mr. Kraxberger and Mr. Petzold. Vocal and instrumental music and a banquet were features. The parish house was prettily decorated with roses.

## NEWLYWEDS ARE OUSTED

Tajima and Bride Ordered Deported to Japan.

Immigration officials yesterday received an order for the deportation of Shinsuke Tajima and his bride to Japan. The arrived here about six weeks ago. Tajima, who was employed on a boat which visited Portland, had mailed ahead to himself here several obscene postcards. For this he was arrested when in Portland. Meanwhile his bride proceeded to Los Angeles on the boat and it was necessary for the immigration officials there to send her back here.

Her husband was in jail here, charged with a felony, was barred from landing at the southern port. The pair had counted on becoming residents of this country. Now the whole tangle is to be solved by shipping both back to their native land.

## NEW SCHOOL UNDER WAY

Sweet Home Will Have Modern Building for Children.

SWEET HOME, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—A contract was let Saturday for the erection of a new school building at Sweet Home, to cost more than \$5000. The building will contain three rooms, and will be of modern construction, with seating capacity for about 120 scholars.

The contract for the building was let to C. L. Depp of Lebanon, as the lowest of five bidders, the bids ranging from \$3800 down to \$5144. Work was begun on the building Friday.

## RECOUNT IN PRIMARY UP

STATEMENT IS ISSUED BY CHARLES HALL.

Candidate for Nomination as Governor to Await Official Count Before Taking Action.

Following announcement of the official vote on governor in the republican primaries, Charles Hall of Marshfield will act. In a statement issued by Senator Hall yesterday he said that his friends believe and claim that the legal votes cast made made the republican nominee. The deduction drawn from Senator Hall's statement is that he will institute a contest and demand a recount in various precincts in several different counties.

Following is Senator Hall's announcement, the first signed statement he has issued since the primaries of May 12:

"After primary day the unofficial newspaper returns on the republican nomination for governor were conflicting. Since then many well authenticated reports of gross irregularities, errors, miscounts, etc., throughout the state have accumulated to such an extent that my friends believe and claim that the legal ballot naturally cast in the ballot boxes have made me the public nominee for governor."

"In the meantime, until the official count and reports are announced, I shall continue to investigate the facts reported and hereafter determine my course in the light of such facts."

"I shall be glad to confer with my friends at headquarters, which are being maintained at room 287 Multnomah hotel."

(Signed) "CHARLES HALL."

Until Senator Hall takes the initiative, Governor Olcott and his friends probably will do nothing for only when Senator Hall outlines what he considers errors and irregularities will the Olcott forces know what they have to meet. It is presumed that if Hall shows a list of irregularities, friends of Olcott will promptly point out other irregularities and ask for the elections to be counted in various precincts.

The irregularities of which Senator Hall spoke in his statement are supposed to refer to ballots thrown out by election boards in Coos county—Hall's home—where, it was said, ballots were considered invalid because electors voted for two county commissioners instead of one; and precincts in Multnomah county where ballots were not counted because electors voted for representatives in the legislature instead of for 13. Hall supporters also complained that persons changed the party affiliation on primary day from the democratic to the republican ranks, and voted the republican ticket. That the democrats did not vote for Hall.
