BOOTLEGGERS FINED \$250.—The impression of untruthfulness which Max Terletzky left with District Judge Delich when he said he had lived in Portland more than 20 years yet could recall no one who could vouch for that fact or his character, cost the bootlegger about \$250 yesterday. The arresting officers were not inclined to recommend more than a \$50 fine, but a penalty of \$250 was assessed against Terletzky at the end of the hearing. Terletzky was proprietor of the houseboat near Linnton raided by deputy sheriffs recently. He heaved a key of moonshine out of the window into the river, from which it was rescued by the officers, they testified.

ANIMALS KILLED IN MAY NUMBER 500.—Five hundred predatory animals, including coyotes, bobcats, bear and smaller animals, were killed during May, according to Stanley G. Jewett, chief of the predatory animal division of the medical survey. This is the record catch for any month in the history of the work. Of the animals killed, 175 were coyotes, which have been killing many deer. One hundred and thirty-four trappers did the killing. There were also 107 foxes, 114 porcupines, 88 badgers and 19 skunks. These, although not classed as predatory animals, work some damage to young livestock and vegetable growth.

OUTRAGE STAR IS EXONERATED.—Robert Fairman, Benson Polytechnic school football star, who was arrested last October on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, was found not guilty by a jury in the court of domestic relations yesterday. Fairman was accused of staging a wild party in his houseboat, attended by another student and 15-year-old girls.

DRUG FINDER IS SENTENCED.—In federal court yesterday Judge W. J. Verton sentenced Shakespeare Walker, north-end character, to serve 18 months in federal prison at McNeil island, following conviction on a charge of selling narcotic drugs. Walker got a five-day stay of execution in which to complete adjustment of his personal affairs before entering prison.

SPECIAL POLICEMAN FINED.—H. B. Burns, a special traffic policeman, was fined \$50 in police court yesterday on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. He was arrested Tuesday in a room at 638 Everett street after a drunken fight with Mrs. Mina Frischkorn, who was discharged from custody. Burns was dismissed from the police force the time he was arrested.

LIQUOR VIOLATORS PAY \$1020.—Eighteen persons were arrested and fined to pay fines of \$1050 in police court during May through the activities of Patrolmen Harms and Nutter of the day relief liquor squad. The two policemen confiscated three stills, 412 bottles of home brew beer and 248 pints of moonshine, as well as a large quantity of moonshine mash.

ROOM IS ROBBED.—Prowlers broke into the room occupied by J. Gelder and Charles Landy at 294 Eleventh street some time Tuesday night and stole a gold watch and \$2.50 from Gelder, and \$7 in cash from Landy. Entrance was gained by means of a pass key while both men were asleep. The robbery was reported to the police detective bureau yesterday.

ASTONISHING TO TOURISTS

New York Travelers Declare Scenery Along River Finest Witnessed on Trip of More Than 20,000 Miles.

HARRY HAYWARD and wife, from New York city, arrived in camp yesterday, having been on the road almost two years. Mr. Hayward is a sheetmetal worker and is indulging in a vacation which will exceed two years by several months. He and his wife have been pretty well over the United States, but never here before. He says he has heard from hundreds of people that our Columbia River highway was the finest scenic drive in the country, but he doubted it. However, he and his wife have driven over it and both say it is the finest drive they have taken on a trip of more than 20,000 miles.

The camaraderie of the highway evidenced by the glides of three families from Bremerton, Wash. The families are those of H. T. Carey, wife and two children; G. B. Wilkins, wife and daughter, and A. COUNTY'S FINANCES BAD

GENERAL FUND HAS DEFICIT OF \$42,500.

First Installment of Taxes Serve to Keep Multnomah Out of "Red" Only Few Weeks.

Campaign boasts of county commissioners concerning the healthy state of county finances were all that the Oregonian pointed out when it predicted that the heavy influx of first installment taxes would serve to keep Multnomah county out of the "red" but a few weeks.

In a financial statement for June 1, submitted to the board of county commissioners yesterday by Auditor Martin, it is shown that there is but \$2,637.59 in cash in the county general fund against which there are outstanding bills totaling \$42,500 with the next heavy tax collection date four months away.

The road fund, left over from last year, had a balance of \$24,462.83, against which the outstanding warrants total but \$4,333.25. The market road fund has \$34,396.66 on hand and motor vehicle license fund, \$44,462.31. Neither of these funds can be used by county commissioners for general county expenditures.

Because of the heavy tax collections in April, there was a balance on hand of \$405,508 in the general fund on May 1. Instead of proving available for current expenses, virtually all of it had to be used to retire outstanding, interest-bearing warrants. During May the county paid out from the general fund, \$42,500.83 and collected for that fund only \$20,767.15.

General Pershing Is Proud Swan Father.

Babies Make Appearance in Nest on Bank of Laurelhurst Lake.

GENERAL PERSHING at Laurelhurst lake is a proud father. At 10 A. M. the first baby swan appeared, all white except for a black spot on the head and a beak that resembled the udd of spades. Shortly after noon two more baby swans appeared and two more are expected this morning.

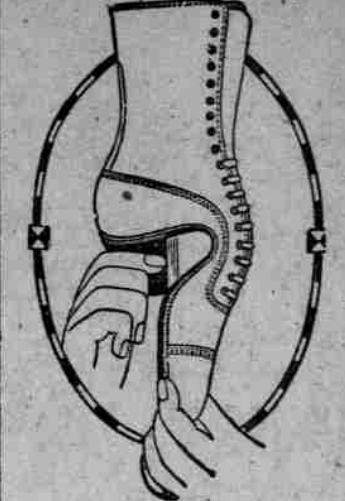
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
