LAFOLLETTE IS FACTOR

Radical Would Attain Seat as
Chairman of Finance Commit-
tee; Result Self-Evident.

Published by permission of the Washington Post.)—However much the old guard republicans may have been jolted by the success of Brookhart in Iowa, the shock is mild compared to what they would feel if one other primary, coming this month, should go the same way. This primary is that coming North Dakota primary involving Senator Porter J. McCumber, who is chairman of the senate finance committee.

The point is that if McCumber should fall by the wayside, he would be succeeded under the seniority rule by the next man on the list. When it is realized that the next man on the list is La Follette nothing more need be said to picture how much meaning McCumber's fate holds for the conservative republicans. Robert M. La Follette in the seat long held by Penrose and before Penrose by Aldrich, that would be political revolution, indeed.

Primary Is on June 28.

The North Dakota primary comes on June 28. It is of interest within the state, but for the reason stated it is of even more interest from a national standpoint. This primary is a clear fight between the conservative McCumber and a thorough-going radical, Lynn J. Frazier. Frazier in North Dakota is reported by almost identically the same class of radical farmers and other restless elements that brought success to Brookhart in Iowa. Frazier has much the same sort of platform and is much the same sort of person, politically speaking, as Brookhart.

Frazier is a thorough-going representative of the non-partisan league, which has been the center of so much commotion in the northwest for more than 10 years. He and the league believe in the thorough going state ownership of industry, including mills, elevators and the like. Frazier is undoubtedly a strong candidate. He has been governor of the state, and in a recall election last fall got 107,000 out of 227,000 votes.

McCumber Is Conservative.

McCumber, of course, is a typical conservative republican. In the state he has avoided formal identification with the "farm bloc," although North Dakota is a state whose senator might normally be expected to be a leader of that bloc. McCumber also has avoided identification with the non-partisan league, although during many years of McCumber's senatorship the league has been more or less dominant in the politics of this state.

This North Dakota primary is very interesting and very important. If these were the good old days, every republican leader in the nation would be taking a hand, one way or another, in this North Dakota fight to prevent the most appalling of impieties, the presence of La Follette in the seat of the mighty were Penrose and Aldrich once drank deep of power.

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pared by treasury experts and is based on the theory that 75 per cent of the 4,458,199 veterans who would be eligible for compensation would select the adjusted service certificate option; 23 per cent farm, home and land settlement aid; and 2 per cent vocational training aid. Should all of the veterans select the certificate plan, the total cost would be \$4,488,645,975.

With reference to financing the legislation, Chairman McCumber's report said it was hoped that the reduction in governmental expenditures plus the payment of interest on the refunded foreign obligations would be sufficient to obviate the imposition of additional taxation.

Some ceremony attended the removal of the bill from the finance committee quarters in the senate office building to the Capitol. Senator McCumber was accompanied from his office and across the Capitol grounds by representatives of the American Legion and other veterans' organizations, while motion picture machine ground away.

Many former service men were present in the senate galleries to witness the formal reporting of the bill there.

In a Memorial day address at Minneapolis, National Commander MacNider of the American Legion announced that the Legion's bonus policy was a strictly "hands-off" one.

CHINA HAS ARMISTICE

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What will result from the armistice, Chinese officials profess inability to say, but they express hope that it will tend toward unification of the war-torn country.

Wu has 60,000 troops in the field north of Tien Tsin, some of them having marched long distances overland to take up their positions for Wu's intended drive against Chang's rear. His main force already has invaded Manchuria, crossing the border near Chinchowfu, Shantung province.

It is believed here that Chang, whose hold on his army is threatened by disorders in several parts of Manchuria, will endeavor to regain the sanction of the Peking government when that again begins functioning in major matters, to his retention of his office as military governor of Manchuria.

Legally Chang was stripped of his authority to hold this post May 6, at the behest of Wu, who immediately after his victory over Chang near Peking six weeks ago appealed to Hsu Shih Chang, the then president, to dislodge Chang. But Chang has continued to hold it in fact, and now is believed to desire the legal sanction to do so.

Noel L. Carpenter Expelled.

NEW YORK, June 8.—The expulsion of Noel L. Carpenter from membership of the New York Stock Exchange was announced from the rostrum when the exchange opened today. He was the floor member of the firm of Carpenter, Caffrey & Co., which was declared insolvent May 9.

and Are Entertained With
Some Unusual Stunts.

Portland has received the sixth Shrine hospital. Following the ground-breaking ceremonies, the contract will be let. As soon as the hospital is completed, any crippled child in the northwest, regardless of race, color or creed, whose parents are unable to defray the cost of medical attention, will be admitted for treatment.

Bands to Be at Ceremony.

Assisting Mr. Kendrick at the ceremony today will be the bands and patrols of Hella temple of Dallas, Texas, and Al Kader temple of Portland, three of the national hospital trustees—Dr. Sam Cochran of Dallas, Tex., Bishop Frederick W. Keator of Tacoma and Dr. Oscar M. Lanstrom of Helena, Mont.

Prominent Shriners from various parts of the country, including Clarence Dunbar of Providence, R. I., who is first ceremonial master of the imperial council of the Shrine, will attend the ceremony.

A parade through the business section of the city will begin at 1:30 this afternoon, after which the ground-breaking ceremony will be held. The general public has been invited.

Lulu Delegation Arrives.

The Lulu temple delegation of Shriners from Philadelphia, headed by Potentate and Mrs. W. Freeman Kendrick, arrived in Portland yesterday morning. The party was scheduled to leave its special car at 7:45, but the desire again to view Portland was too strong and at 7 o'clock the "boys and girls," as Potentate Kendrick called them, started to the Multnomah hotel. Mayor Baker, who arrived at the Union station about 7:30, found that the party had left, so he hurried to the Multnomah, where breakfast was served.

Columbia Highway Trip Taken.

Later the visiting Shriners were taken on a trip over the Columbia highway to Eagle creek, as guests of the Royal Rosarians. The trip was arranged by J. H. Dundore, prime minister of the Rosarians.

Everything went smoothly until the party reached a point just east of Crown Point. There a farmer's wagon had broken down and the farmer was attempting to make repairs. His wagon was standing across the road, and further obstruction was caused by an irate bull that the farmer's boy had been leading.

Mayor Baker, anxious to avoid any delays, hurried out of his car and requested the farmer to pull his wagon aside.

The farmer refused. Someone whispered that it was the mayor of the city of Portland that was making the request.

"I don't care who it is. He ain't the mayor of the whole world."

Bull Joins in Attack.

Unable to persuade the obstinate farmer by argument, Mayor Baker and Dr. S. M. Strohecker began to move the wagon themselves. The bull rushed at Dr. Strohecker and the farmer went after the mayor's son.

About this time a for-hire car driver, bringing a party of tourists to the city, took a hand in the argument by sending a hard wallop to the chin of the farmer.

Someone laughed about this time, and the nervous visitors learned that the entire argument was a hoax and that the farmer was George W. Joseph, state senator and a member of Al Kader temple.

Special "Eruption" Arranged. Another incident of the day was an "eruption" on Wauna point, near Eagle creek. The entire delegation of Shriners was just preparing to return to the city, when a loud explosion was heard, the dirt was seen to fly high in the air and soon thereafter ashes and small rocks showered on the party.

The "eruption" was arranged by Albert Weisenburger, forest ranger at Eagle creek, who transported 100 pounds of dynamite to the top of the point and sent men to set off the charge.

So realistic was this feature that quite a number of the eastern party were certain that it was the real goods, and it took much argument to convince them that it had been "faked."

J. Harry Lewis of St. Paul, Minn., publisher of the Crescent, almost "uplifted the beans" on the last stunt, when a moment before the explosion he asked just what stunt would be next.

SAN FRANCISCO GETS READY

Shriners Prepare City for Big
Celebration Next Week.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—Some 4800 miles separate Constantinople and Canton, but the two are to be brought together in resplendent miniature on the occasion of the golden jubilee celebration of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine next week.

The city is taking on the appearance of a colorful fragment of picture-book land for the Shriners. The center of the Shrine activity, the silken tents of a Bedouin encampment, gradually is assuming form in the great civic center and the square-cut severity of the big business buildings is giving way before the picturesque and colorful decoration scheme that is creating an atmosphere all its own. Minaret and clock are taking the place of electrolights and trolley standards, and already a big clock at Market and Third streets, one of the numerous "busiest corners in the world," is wearing a fez, set at a rakish angle.

Every artery of travel thrusting itself into the "hot hands" outside the bedecked city is filling up with the Shrine pilgrims.

RICKENBACKER HELD UP

LEAKING WATER LINE HALTS
TRANSCONTINENTAL FLIGHT.Stop Made at Niles, Mich.,
After Starting From De-
troit for Chicago.

NILES, Mich., June 8.—Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, who left New York yesterday on a transcontinental flight in an all-metal airplane, and encountered motor trouble shortly after leaving Detroit late today, landed here early tonight. Rickenbacker and his party plan to resume the flight at daylight tomorrow and hope to reach Denver by tomorrow night.

Rickenbacker was forced to land shortly after 8 o'clock tonight because of darkness.

It was the climax to a day of troubles, which began when lightning delayed the start from Detroit, injuring a mechanic and fusing parts of the machine. After starting for Chicago a leaking water connection on the motor necessitated a forced landing at Ypsilanti, Mich. A fresh start was made after an hour's time had been lost in making repairs, but darkness again interfered and it was decided to spend the night here and start again tomorrow morning.

Captain Rickenbacker is carrying a message from President Harding to the convention of Shriners in San Francisco. He is flying in a Junker all-metal plane and is accompanied by five persons.

Train Robbery Confessed.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 8.—T. W. Raish of Alamosa, held in jail here in connection with the robbery of a Denver & Rio Grande Western train at Alamosa, signed a confession here today, according to police authorities, admitting the robbery and firing the shots which resulted in the death of Express Messenger Gomez last February. Raish was a brakeman employed on that railroad, but had left off work for the purpose of robbing the express car, he said, stealing a ride on the train until he could gain access to the car as the train left Alamosa.

ROTARY ELECTION TODAY

OFFICERS NOMINATED AT
LOS ANGELES CONVENTION.Four in Race for President, W. C.
Coppock, H. J. L. Stark, R. J.
Knapp, R. N. Havens.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 8.—The nomination of officers occupied the closing hours of today's session of the 13th annual convention of the International Rotary clubs being held here. The election will be held tomorrow.

Those nominated for the office of president were William C. Coppock of Council Bluffs, Ia., present second vice-president; H. J. L. Stark of Orange, Tex., present third vice-president; Raymond J. Knapp of New York, president of the New York Rotary club, and Raymond N. Havens of Kansas City, Mo., ex-

international vice-president. Rufus P. Chapin of Chicago, who has held the office of treasurer for the last ten years, received the nomination for that office today without opposition. There were seven nominations for the board of directors from the United States, from which five will be elected.

Those nominated were Robert Patterson of Dayton, O.; Ralph E. Bristol of Ogden, Utah; Herbert C. Wilson of Worcester, Mass.; Adolphus R. Talbot of Lincoln, Neb.; Harry B. Craddock of Minneapolis, Minn.; John A. Turner of Tampa, Fla., and Ben C. Brown of New Orleans.

The directors from the Dominion of Canada will be Jeffery Lydiatt of Calgary, Alberta, who received the nomination without opposition. Alexander Wilkie of Edinburgh, Scotland, present director for Great Britain and Ireland, was also the only nominee for that office. The international president automatically becomes a member of the board and the ninth member will be selected by the board.

Under the new constitution, adopted at this convention, the board of directors will select the vice-presidents and secretary-general. The reports of several committees and addresses by prominent Rotarians preceded the nominations. Several resolutions were adopted today, principally those relating to business organization.

The convention divided into small groups tonight and attended reunion dinner parties designed to permit the discussion of Rotary work that could not be reached in convention.

LABOR BOARD SUGGESTED

Union President Proposes Body
to Be Responsible for Strikes.

CINCINNATI, June 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Creation of a national board of labor union officials, vesting with it all responsibility for strikes in the building trades industry, was suggested today by John H. Donlin, president of the building trades department of the American Federation of Labor at the department's annual meeting here.

"The whole nation," said Mr. Donlin in his annual report, "is tired of strikes and lockouts and disgusted with such institutions that make lockouts and strikes possible. The only way to minimize them is to minimize such authority as can order a strike or lockout. Those responsible for strikes in cities are always in the minority."

A national campaign for home building was suggested by Mr. Donlin, who also urged that international unions should exercise greater authority over local unions and

avored the building trades workmen joining with other basic units of the building industry in an organization created under the supervision of some governmental department.

GIRL ACCUSES GYPSIES

Nova Scotia Police Hear Tale of
Alleged Abduction.

SIDNEY, N. S., June 8.—Police authorities here have in custody a girl who says she is Rosa Miguel of Norfolk, Va., and who declared she has been a captive of a band of gypsies near here.

The young woman asserted that at the age of 12 she was kidnapped from her home in Norfolk and later forced to marry the son of the chief of the gypsy band. Later she was rescued, but she was found again in Philadelphia by the band and once more carried away. Her second abduction, she declared, was followed by cruelties.
