

## HUGHES WEDDING SETS SOCIETY AGOG

Secretary of State's Daughter  
Weds Today.

OFFICIALDOM IS INVITED

World Diplomats, Cabinet Members,  
Congressmen and Department  
Heads Asked to Attend.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 9.—(Special).—President and Mrs. Harding will hurry back from the visit to Senator and Mrs. Joseph S. Frelinghuysen at Stratton to attend the first cabinet wedding of his administration. Reception of Miss Catherine Hughes, daughter of the secretary of state and Mrs. Charles Evans Hughes, to Chauncey Lockhart Waddell, which will be performed at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in Bethlehem chapel, Washington cathedral.

Following the ceremony there will be a large reception at the Pan-American union building.

### Location Is Sanctioned.

There seems to be some surprise and much interest in the fact that Secretary and Mrs. Hughes will give the wedding reception at the Pan-American union building, many seem to be under the impression that it is a very unusual thing for them to entertain there and that some special permission has to be procured from the Latin-American diplomats for the occasion. The secretary of state, both the late Philander C. Knox, Robert Lansing and Mr. Hughes, and their wives, have frequently entertained there in the past, bearing, of course, all the expenses of their unofficial parties, as have many of the envoys of the republics to the south of us.

Any of the members of the governing board of the union can entertain in the building, officially or unofficially, and the secretary of state heading the diplomatic corps is chairman of the governing board, the highest position in the union, and has therefore all the privileges of the board, which includes the ambassadors or ministers of the countries represented in the union, the governor-general of the pan-American union and the secretary of state.

### Every Official Invited.

All of the official world, diplomats, cabinet members, all of congress and their families, heads of government departments and everybody else in official life here are asked to the wedding. So it is really an official function. Secretary and Mrs. Hughes would certainly not have had such a large company if they had not felt that their official position demanded it; the entire family is said to prefer a quiet wedding.

This building is strictly under the domain of the pan-American countries and is about the only one large enough to accommodate such a wedding party as Secretary Hughes' official position makes it necessary for him to entertain.

As the seating capacity of Bethlehem chapel is limited the company asked to the ceremony is small and includes a very few of the intimate friends of the two families, the diplomatic corps, official persons, near relatives, and out-of-town guests. Right Rev. Alfred Harding, bishop of Washington, assisted by the Rev. W. H. Abernathy, pastor of the Calvary Baptist church, President Harding's church, officiate. The secretary and Mrs. Hughes are members of Dr. Abernathy's church while Miss Hughes is identified with the Episcopal church, having become a member while attending the cathedral school.

### Relatives to Be Attendants.

Miss Hughes will be attended by Miss Elizabeth Kirkland of Nashville, Tenn., as maid of honor and the matrons of honor will be Mrs. Charles Evans Hughes Jr. of New York, sister-in-law of the bride, and Mrs. J. R. Dunlap, Akron, Ohio, sister of the bridegroom.

The train bearers will be the grandchildren of the secretary and Mrs. Hughes, Charles Evans Hughes Jr. and Master Stuart Hughes. Mr. Waddell will have as best man Gerald Possenden Neal of New York and the ushers will be Charles Evans Hughes Jr. of New York; Ralph Dunlap of Akron; James Alexander of Athens, Ga.; Dr. Byron Blaisdell of Hartford, Conn.; Kenneth Gaston and Ralph Rollard of New York, assisted by Whitney Young, also of New York.

Secretary and Mrs. Hughes will entertain at dinner tomorrow evening at Wardman Park hotel, in compliment to the members of the wedding party and the out-of-town guests, among whom are Mr. and Mrs. Charles Evans Hughes Jr. of New York, brother and sister-in-law of the bride, who are staying with Secretary and Mrs. Hughes, and the bridegroom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Waddell of Greenfield, O. All of the other guests from out of town will stay at Wardman Park hotel, where Mrs. Hughes reserved a large number of suites for them. They are expected to arrive here tomorrow. Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Willis of Harrisburg, Pa., are motoring to Washington for the wedding and will be guests while in Washington of Mrs. Willis' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kaperstein, at Stoneleigh court. ### Home to Be in New York.

Mr. and Mrs. Waddell will make their home in New York. He is a member of the class of '18 of the Harvard university and served in the air service during the war.

Among the many handsome wedding presents sent to the young couple perhaps the most interesting was sent by President and Mrs. Harding, a pair of bedspreads of unbleached muslin covered with a pattern of knotted candle-wicking and edged with deep, hard-tied fringe. The design, of roses, shamrocks and thistles, is the oldest found in the North Carolina mountains and was probably brought to this country during the latter immigration about 180 years ago. This pattern, typifying England, Ireland and Scotland, was found on a spread more than 100 years old, and Miss Hughes' spreads are copies of it. Mrs. Harding purchased the spread from the Southern Industrial association, of which she is honorary president.

## BONUS MYSTERY SOLVED

BANKER BELIEVED TO HAVE  
KEPT APPLICATIONS.

Ex-President of North Bend Institution Accused of Plot to Use Discharge.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 9.—(Special).—By linking together facts and dates connected with the disappearance of Loy E. Carlin, ex-president of the North Bend State Bank, North Bend, Wash., with \$15,000 in liberty bonds and securities of the bank, the veterans' compensation division of the state auditor's office has solved, in part at least, the mystery of 25 bonus applications from North Bend veterans, missing for more than a year and finally delivered to the bonus division May 10, 1922.

The applications were received by Carlin to be forwarded to the King county auditor in April, 1921. He apparently wrote the letter of transmittal, which he wrapped with the applications, and then decided to hold them up. The package containing the letter and applications was mailed at Seattle, May 9, 1922, according to the postmark. There were no stamps on the package, and it bore no return address. Carlin's letter of April 29, 1921, was in the package however. Carlin left North Bend one day before the package was mailed at Seattle, and is believed to have gone to Mexico.

The theory of Paul R. Hagelberger, head of the bonus division, is that Carlin, planning as far back as April, 1921, for his getaway when things became too warm, planned to use some veteran's discharge, bearing a description fitting his own, as a passport, probably assuming the name on the discharge. Apparently he changed his plans at the last moment, because so far as the department has been able to learn, all of the missing applications and discharges were accounted for in the package received.

## 500 GOLDFISH PROBLEM

How Best to Catch Aquatic Denizens Puzzles School Board.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 9.—How best to capture 500 goldfish in the pools of Manito park, that they might be sold to a local hotel for the amusement of the school board, was the question for the Spokane school board at this week's session. Superintendent of Parks Duncan informed the board that the little swimmers were too swift to be snared with dip nets, and that the last time it was necessary to catch them the pools had to be drained and three employed to corral the goldfish, which hid in shallow puddles. The problem was solved by affixing to sell the fish to the hotel if the hotel management would undertake to catch them.

## FUGITIVE IS ARRESTED

Reputed Burglar Who Talked Way to Liberty in Custody.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 9.—(Special).—Bryan E. Warner, who talked his way out of the prosecuting attorney's office at Spokane after his arrest for the burglary of the Wentworth clothing store, on March 14, has been arrested at Butte, Mont., and Governor Hart today issued a requisition for his return to Spokane for trial on a charge of second degree burglary.

Warner, when taken before the prosecuting attorney, said he would tell the whole story of the burglary but asked to be permitted to go home to talk to his mother first. He was permitted to go and did not return.

## DEATH PROBE ORDERED

Grand Jury Directed to Inquire Into Killing of Policeman.

SEATTLE, June 9.—The King county grand jury today was instructed by Presiding Judge Hall of the superior court to make a "full, complete and thorough" investigation into the death of Patrolman Charles O. Legate, whose body was found in a garage near his beat March 17, under circumstances which authorities said indicated "either murder or suicide."

A coroner's jury, which recently probed the patrolman's death, re-

turned a verdict that Legate committed suicide.

Charges, developed at the inquest, of corruption in the Seattle police department must also be thoroughly investigated, Judge Hall instructed the grand jury.

## RADIO SERVICE TO STOP

Circuit Between Alaska and Siberia Ordered to Discontinue.

SEATTLE, June 9.—The naval radio circuit operating between Alaska and Siberia, will be discontinued June 15 and no messages will be accepted in the United States for transmission to the Siberian port after that date. It was announced today by Milton H. Anderson, district communications superintendent of the 13th naval district.

The circuit was opened last July. Discontinuance was ordered by the navy department, it was stated, because of the light traffic handled and the difficulty in obtaining guarantees for the tolls.

## MINER IS ELECTROCUTED

Coal Digger Killed While Repairing Broken Trolley Wire.

SEATTLE, June 9.—John Singbush, 33 years old, employed at the Black Diamond mine of the Pacific Coast Coal company, was electrocuted at the mine last night while repairing a broken trolley wire at the 800-foot level, according to word received here today.

Singbush's wife and daughter are said to be living in Calgary, Alberta.
