

INTENT TO INJURE STATE BANK DENIED

Federal Reserve Governor Is
Witness in Brookings Case.

PROCEDURE IS DESCRIBED

J. U. Calkins Tells of Insisting
That Par Be Paid on Paper
by Oregon Institution.

That there was no sinister purpose behind the acts charged against the federal reserve bank of the 12th district in relation to the Brookings state bank was the testimony of J. U. Calkins, governor of the federal reserve bank for this district, star witness for the defense in the suit being tried in federal court in which the Brookings institution asks a permanent restraining order against the federal reserve regional bank.

Everything that was done, according to Governor Calkins, was done merely in carrying out the functions of the bank and in accomplishing the purposes for which it was organized. It was not picking upon the little bank in Brookings, nor was it trying to embarrass it, although these things were charged in the suit.

Witness Is Cool.
Governor Calkins, upon conclusion of his testimony, underwent an extended cross examination. The witness was cool and definite in all his answers and he frequently corrected the plaintiff's attorney in quoting his earlier replies.

Governor Calkins testified as to the usual functions, practices and methods of the 12th federal reserve system, over which he presides. He said the only possible object in the collection methods pursued with the Brookings bank was to carry out the ordinary practices of the banking system.

The Brookings bank, it was said, did not fall into line with the par collection campaign of the federal reserve system, a campaign, it was said by the witness, that extended from the time of the system's organization. When checks were sent to the Brookings bank for payment by the federal reserve bank, the officers of the local bank insisted upon a collection charge being paid, which the reserve system had no authority to do, it was said.

Drafts Two Times.
Checks presented to the bank over the counter by agents for the federal reserve system were in two instances, at the request of the Brookings institution, paid by drafts, but in such a situation the reserve bank assumed responsibility for the paper in case of loss. Mr. Calkins approved these acts of his agent, he said.

A rule was made by the reserve system, however, that the Brookings bank must pay its obligations by cash daily to an agent of the reserve system, and this practice was followed. Governor Calkins issued a letter notifying the bank of the order and he announced notice was given so that the bank might "save itself embarrassment." Plaintiff to the action, through counsel, sought to show yesterday that the motive of the reserve system was to cause the Brookings bank for its failure to fall into line with the system's par collection campaign.

Bank Gets Revenge.
The Brookings bank had its revenge, though, in a way, for it was shown yesterday by cross-examination of George W. Wood, secretary and chief owner, that he paid the

federal reserve agent in the most inconvenient currency he could accumulate. At one time \$4500 was paid in \$1 bills and again \$1300 in silver dollars. At one time the reserve system agent took away from the bank \$9 pounds of money and these acts put the reserve system to considerable expense in shipping the funds out.

Cross-examined as to the possibility of loss by the reserve system in accepting exchange at par from the bank, Governor Calkins said he has had at no time any reason to suspect the solvency of the Brookings bank or to speculate concerning its status in any way whatever. He testified that his officials were not liable for losses, should they arise, provided they exercised due diligence, but if they were negligent, they were liable.

Witness Is Quizzed.
"You claim you acted in good faith with the small country banks, and particularly with the Brookings State bank when you sent out your order that cash only would be received from the Brookings bank, no matter how much embarrassment it might cause the bank," quizzed Thomas Bennett, counsel for the Brookings institution.

He did not say so, replied Mr. Calkins. "Our letter was plain and stated the notice was given to save the bank embarrassment. All instructions to our agents were to use discretion and to so conduct themselves that they would conform to the interests of state banks, as well as to carry out the functions of the reserve system."

Governor Calkins occupied the witness stand nearly all day yesterday and probably will be recalled this morning.

CAVES DRAW TOURISTS

Forestry Bureau Gets Queries in
Regard to Oregon Scenery.

Many visitors will flock to the Oregon caves this summer, according to C. J. Buck, assistant district forester, who has just returned from a trip to the caves. He said that the caves are attracting attention all over the United States and that the forest service received many queries about them.

The new automobile road leading to the caves will enable more tourists to visit there this summer. Grants Pass will stage a grand rally June 25, when the road will be opened. E. A. Rowley, guide, has made a great improvement in the method of going through the caves. He has replaced the wooden ladders with steel and the passages have been made larger.

DOCK WORKER KILLED

J. Hamilton Is Fatally Injured
by Lumber in Ship's Hold.

J. Hamilton, a dock worker, 45 years old, was fatally injured yesterday when he was crushed by lumber in the hold of the vessel Louis Nelson, which was loading at the Inman-Poulson dock. The injured man was removed to Emanuel hospital, but died just before he arrived there. The body was sent to the morgue.

Hamilton lived at 328 Second street, where a widow and one child survive him. The coroner has not yet decided whether or not an inquest will be held.

Knights Postpone Outing.

The annual outing of the Knights of Columbus has been postponed to July 16 and will be held at Estacada. The Knights of Columbus band in its new uniforms will accompany the special train, which will leave East Morrison and Water streets at 10 A. M. and will give a short concert prior to the departure of the train. A programme of athletic events, with appropriate prizes for the winners, will be a feature. Dance music will be provided by Van Perre's six-piece orchestra. A. B. Cain is chairman of the general committee, which is divided into subcommittees.

ADVENTISTS FLOCK TO ANNUAL SESSION

Tent City on East Side Is
Thrown Open.

HUNDREDS ON HAND

President of Western Oregon
Conference Gives Address at
Opening Meeting.

The tent city constructed for the Seventh-Day Adventists at East Sixteenth and East Gilliam streets was thrown open yesterday morning to the hundreds of arriving delegates to the annual session, and by late last evening nearly 1000 delegates from the district comprising the western conference were safely housed. The 300 small tents are expected to be filled within the next two days and an additional 500 guests will be quartered elsewhere in the city, according to the estimated attendance.

The conference session opened at 8 o'clock yesterday with the welcoming address of Elder G. A. Roberts, president of the conference. Following the business session, preaching services were conducted by Elder W. P. Hilgert of Albany. Preaching services again at 2:30 in the afternoon, concluded by a second conference session at 4 o'clock, a departmental meeting and preaching at 8 o'clock last night made up the afternoon programme. Elder B. J. Cady of McMinnville delivered the sermon at the afternoon meeting.

Main Pavilion Used.
The preaching services and conference sessions are being conducted in the main pavilion, which is 93 feet by 123 feet and has a capacity for 2000 persons. In addition to the main pavilion there are seven departmental pavilions, in one of which is housed a large cafeteria. The various departments are the educational, the missionary volunteer, Sabbath school and the home mission. A kindergarten is also being conducted with daily services in both the German and Scandinavian tongues.

The opening session drew by far the largest attendance of any opening day in the history of the conference and the officials predicted that the attendance this year would exceed that of former years. The programme for today will be practically the same as that of yesterday, although the speakers have not been announced yet.

OREGON TROOPS IN CAMP
Advance Units to Prepare for Units Due to Train.

TACOMA, Wash., June 12.—(Special.)—Detachments of the Oregon national guard arrived at Camp Lewis yesterday to prepare the way for the units who come June 15 for a two weeks' course of training. This will be the first summer encampments of guard and reserve troops here.

Idaho guardsmen will be in camp July 9, as will also field artillery units of Washington and Idaho. California artillery guardsmen will be in camp July 15 to July 29.

Washington guardsmen going into a tent camp at Murray July 2 to 23 include the 161st infantry; troop B, 58th machine gun squadron; company L, tank corps, and 147th ambulance company.

OREGON WOMAN SOUGHT

Seattle Wants Mrs. Braden to
Run Fruit Show.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., June 12.—Mrs. Winnie Braden of Portland, custodian of the Oregon state agricultural exhibit, has been invited to assemble the exhibits and take general charge of Seattle's fruit show this year. Officers of the incorporated Pacific Northwest Fruit exposition got together a few days ago with the state development bureau of the Seattle chamber of commerce for a discussion of plans.

It was decided that this year's show should be held in an up-town location. This will necessitate the use of a smaller building and will restrict the size of the display.

Highway Contract Awarded.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 12.—(Special.)—The Lewis county commissioners let the contract yesterday for clearing, grubbing and grading four miles and 700 feet on the Park highway, east of Chehalis, extending from the end of the paving, one mile east of Ethel, to the foot of the hill in Salicum valley, to George A. Banderet of Seattle for \$24,829.80. There were three other bidders—Gibson, Medley & Graham, Chehalis, \$59,000; Clyde E. Brown, Centralia, \$48,617.58, and Hendricks & Olson, Chehalis, \$34,965.

Church Edifice Projected.

RAYMOND, Wash., June 12.—(Special.)—The trustees of the First Baptist church of this city have voted to construct a new church edifice on its property at the corner of Ninth and Dwyer streets. An estimated cost of \$10,000, and have arranged for immediate drawing of plans and specifications.
