TWO BANKRUPTCY CASES FILED.—With liabilities listed at \$12,958.02 and assets scheduled at \$12,192.49, H. C. Long, manufacturer and furniture dealer of Portland, filed a petition in bankruptcy yesterday. His company is the Wahkema Furniture & Manufacturing company. John Spooner of Portland, head of the Irvington Park Flour company, also filed a similar petition. His liabilities are given at \$2619, with no assets.

EDUCATOR TO ATTEND CONFERENCE.—Ray Eugene P. Burke, president of Columbia university, will leave for Notre Dame next Sunday to attend the conference of the congregation of the Holy Cross. Burke is president of the college, chief among them being a new gymnasium building. During the first year of Burke's presidency the institution has made rapid advance, and a number of new courses will be added to the curriculum next year.

CLOTHING BUSINESS.—George Loewenson has purchased interests in the clothing firm of Samuel Rosenblatt & Co., Fifth and Alder streets, and has assumed the management of the business. The Rosenblatt Brothers store at 366 Washington street, corner of West Park, known as the Hart, Schaffner & Marx Clothing Shop, Mr. Loewenson is well known to many Portlanders, having conducted clothing business here in past years.

DAMAGES SUIT ON TRIAL.—Trial of the suit for \$25,000 damages against William and Wilbur Reid, warehouse operators, was begun in Judge Bean. H. A. Baker is plaintiff in the action and alleges he stored a large quantity of loganberries in the Reid warehouse last summer. Through negligence in the warehouse, the berries were spoiled.

SCHOOL TAX INCREASE.—The proposed tax and bond issue for school purposes was introduced in resolutions adopted by the Kiwanis club at its luncheon at the Multnomah hotel yesterday noon. Frank Wayne explained the measure and told of the urgent need for the funds provided for in the measure. What Oregon is doing in fish and game protection and the assets these natural resources are to the state was told by A. E. Burghardt, state game warden.

GOVERNMENT SEIZES CLAIM.—Fifty-nine cases of claims, held to be adulterated and not up to the requirements of the pure food act, fell under the displeasure of the government yesterday and federal agents caused the whole shipment to be impounded. The claims were arrested by United States Marshal Hotchkiss and will be destroyed, if the process of the federal authorities is carried through as planned.
