

CABINET OFFICIAL
LAUDS MR. HARDINGPostmaster-General Tells of
Executive Victories.

ECONOMIES ARE CITED

Administration Declared to Have
Saved More Than Billion
by Budget System.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 14.—The "accomplishments and economies" effected by the present republican administration were detailed by Postmaster-General Work here tonight in an address which it was learned authoritatively had been approved by President Harding. The postmaster-general, speaking before the Pennsylvania state convention of postmasters, declared he represented the "unshrinking" criticism of the president and his cabinet in the face of what he described as "unparalleled accomplishments" since the republicans came into power. The administration now in office came into control "pledged to install business methods in government," he said, and he added, "the achievement of this objective is the outstanding accomplishment of the executive branch thus far."

"Economy in the handling of government funds after the lavish expenditures of previous years which reached the high-water mark of \$27,000,000,000 in 1919, became a necessity," declared Dr. Work.

Expense Cut Cited.
"In 1920 the expenditures had been reduced to \$6,500,000,000 by the cessation of the war and the economy of a republican congress; in 1921, present business methods further reduced the operating appropriations to \$4,730,000,000 and for the fiscal year about to close it has been brought down to \$3,909,000,000, and we are not through yet."

Establishment of the budget system alone, which had been repudiated by the democratic party already had saved more than \$1,000,000,000 of the people's money," Dr. Work asserted, adding that "indefinitely the number of government employees had been reduced by over \$5,000 since January, 1921."

As a result of business economies, the postmaster general further declared, liberty bonds, which at low ebb had fallen more than 15 points, are now selling at par. The veterans' bureau has been reorganized and a half billion dollars is being expended this year for the relief of ex-service men.

"The farmer has benefited by the emergency tariff law and the people generally have already found their taxes reduced."

War Expenses Cut.
"Our military and naval expenditures have been cut to the bone and our foreign relations, which were sadly muddled following the armistice, have been gradually settled in a dignified manner. The arms conference promises to be one of the greatest achievements of history."

Patience and hard work now occupy the time of official Washington, the postmaster general declared.

"To paraphrase the language of Kipling," he added, "the government is keeping their heads when some of those about them are losing theirs and blaming it on them. The sensible people of the country will not be beguiled by false promises raised by critics for election purposes. The effort of critics to belittle the real issue is pitiable in face of the fact that on the leaders of their party rests the responsibility of the very conditions about which they complain."

NEW WAGE CUT COMING

Slash for 350,000 Railroad Men
Expected Today.

CHICAGO, June 14.—Wage cuts affecting some 350,000 railroad workers, not embraced in the two recent wage slashes, are expected to be announced tomorrow by the United States railroad labor board, the Chicago Daily Tribune said today.

"The decision," it was said, "will apply to clerks, signmen, stationary firemen and others and marine department employees." It is the third and last of a series of reductions between \$150,000 and \$180,000 off the annual payroll of the carriers, all three of the reductions taking effect July 1. In all, some 1,300,000 workers are covered in the three orders.

TURKS SLAY CHRISTIANS

1300 Women and Children Said
to Have Been Massacred.

LONDON, June 14.—Charges that 1300 Christian women and children were taken by the Turks from Samson on the Black Sea, to the interior and massacred near Kavak two weeks ago, are contained in a telegram received by the Greek defense committee here.

The message was from Archbishop Melitios Metaxakis, Greek patriarch of Constantinople.

Harding does not wish the bonus bill to be considered ahead of the tariff bill. That means that it cannot be passed in time to aid McCumber in the North Dakota primary.

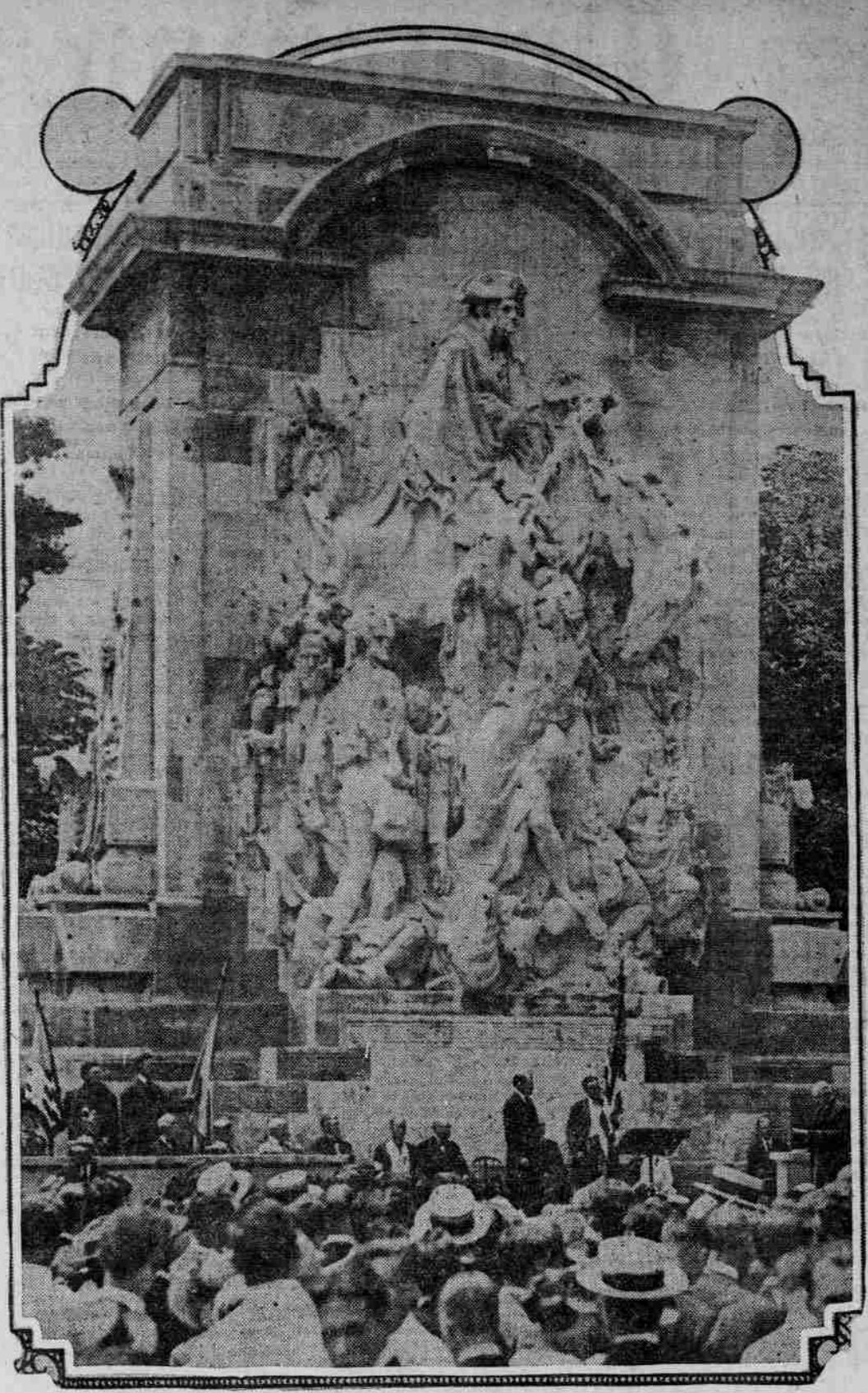
Even if President Harding had not taken this position on the bonus bill it could not possibly be passed during the next 10 days. The number of senators who are opposed to it has increased constantly, until it amounts very close to a full third of the senate.

Long Debate Wanted.

Most of the 20 or more senators who are opposed to the bill want to debate it thoroughly. The aggregate of the time they will take would alone be enough to make it safe to predict not only that the bonus bill will not pass before the North Dakota primaries are held, but also that it is not likely to pass during the present session of congress.

But the worst blow to McCumber's bonus bill, as to his reappointment in North Dakota, comes from his own colleague in the senate, Senator Ladd has cried down the McCumber bonus bill in derogatory terms and has proposed an alternative measure of an altogether different nature. It may reasonably

BRITONS WANT LUSITANIA

ENGLISH CRUISER TO CHASE
ANY YANKEE SALVAGER.

British Concern Has Contract to
Raise Sunken Vessel and No
Outsiders Are Wanted.

LONDON, June 14.—(Special cable.)—If any American tries to salvage the Lusitania he will be chased off by a British cruiser.

So says Sewell Collins of the Ayres Salvage & Towing company, limited, which asserts it has a contract with the Liverpool & London War Risks association for raising the liner.

Mr. Collins, speaking for Captain Landi, head of the Ayres company, explained his firm has a three-year contract and an option on a further extension of time, if necessary, but it expects to begin operations within a few weeks.

"The War Risks association," Mr. Collins declared, "is really the British government, during the war all there taken over by the government were insured by the War Risks association. So the Lusitania is still government property and the Ayres company has signed a contract for salvaging her."

"Captain Landi believes he can raise her in a few months, weather permitting. He has studied conditions and is confident he can bring her to the surface."

An American company butts in, it will not even get port base facilities. The fact that the Lusitania is outside the three-mile limit makes no difference. The Lusitania is not in the same category as the Titanic because the Lusitania was under government control when she was sunk and has never been surrendered."

Captain Landi says the Lusitania is resting on a shell bottom and has not been affected appreciably by ocean currents.

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SHOALS HELD HANDICAP

APPEAL MADE FOR REMOVAL
OF SUSLAW SANDBAR.

Senate Commerce Commission Is
Asked for Fund to Enable
Expansion of Milling.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14.—Appeals were made Tuesday to the senate commerce committee for an appropriation which would permit removal of the shoals of Suslaw River, Oregon, which, the committee was told, had resulted in handicapping river traffic with the consequent holding up of milling operations in the district.

E. B. Adams, secretary to Senator Stanford, republican, Oregon, told the committee that army engineers had estimated the river improvements sought would cost about \$45,000.

With that expenditure, he said, the output of timber would be greatly increased and the selling price materially lessened. As the river now stands, according to the witnesses, vessels of the maximum draught of 12 feet can enter and leave only with the tide, while, if the shoals were removed, vessels of 19 feet could be accommodated.

The government has spent approximately \$265,000, with an equal appropriation by the local district, in construction of jetties in the river for aid to navigation. The more important logging and milling operations, however, are located some miles above the jetties and are cut off from the deeper water by the sand bars.

Mr. Adams asserted that as a result of the proposed dredging lumber could be transported to open water about \$2 a thousand feet cheaper and shingles at 30 cents a thousand below the present water rates.

The matter will be considered at a later meeting of the committee, Chairman Jones announced at the conclusion of the hearing.

CHURCH RIVALS OUTINGS

Open-Air Services With Basket
Lunch Proving Popular.

PRINEVILLE, Or., June 14.—(Special.)—An innovation that is proving decidedly popular with churchgoers has been instituted by Rev. M. R. Gallaher, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church of this city. Not long ago Rev. Mr. Gallaher noticed that the attendance at the church services was falling off perceptibly. Incidentally, he noticed that many of his most ardent church workers were frequently absent from church when parties left early Sunday morning for a day in the outdoors.

The pastor at once announced that the services of his church would be held in the open and a basket lunch follow them.

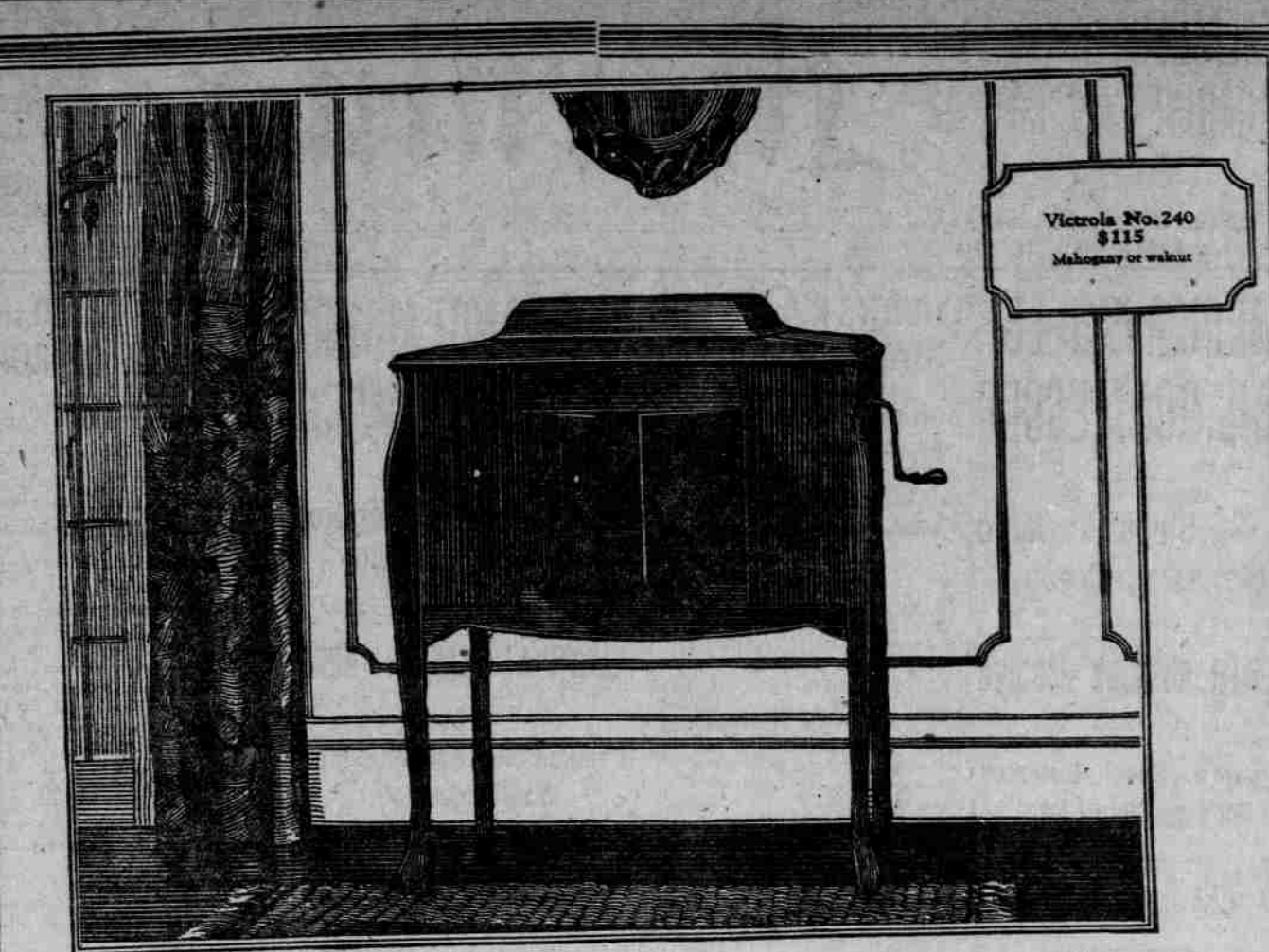
