

STATE GUARDSMEN REACH CAMP LEWIS

Citizen Soldiers Complete
Orderly Mobilization.

MORE THAN 1900 ENROLL

Men From All Walks of Life Snap
Into Routine of Summer Mil-
itary Training.

CAMP LEWIS, Wash. June 15.—(Special.)—Without a man on sick report, an article of luggage lost, or an empty stomach in camp, Oregon citizen soldiers completed today an orderly mobilization, taking more than 1900 men from all walks of life to Camp Lewis and Fort Worden, Wash., for two weeks of military training.

Four special trains left Portland this morning and one at midnight Wednesday, the former carrying infantry, artillery, machine gun, howitzer and engineer units to camp, the latter taking coast artillery companies to Seattle, where a boat was taken for the Puget sound fort this morning.

Trips Without Event.
The trips were without event, the entourage of the Adjutant-General White being concise, but comprehensive, and carried out to the letter. The largest train, composed of 18 cars, from the moment it was "spotted" on the tracks in the Portland yards, reported Captain Harry Brumback, howitzer and engineer units to camp, the latter taking coast artillery companies to Seattle, where a boat was taken for the Puget sound fort this morning.

Guides Meet Every Outfit.
Guides met every outfit and conducted the men direct to their barracks where cots were in place, kitchens in operation and grounds cleaned up. Major Joseph V. Schur, quartermaster corps, and his assistant, Captain Frank Watters, were responsible for the handling of supplies in a manner commended highly by commanding officers. Assignment of quarters and preparation of brigade and regimental headquarters were under direction of Captain Thomas E. Egan.

WU IS CROWDING CHANG
A critic of the movement to camp, given tonight by Colonel White, officers and men were complimented on the improvement over last year in the training and discipline. Colonel Creed C. Hammond of Portland, commanding officer of the 162d infantry, O. N. G., as senior line officer in camp, was designated in charge of the encampment by the adjutant-general this evening. His command will include engineers, field artillery, coast artillery, and units of the 162d and 163d regiments. Colonel White relinquished the personal command assumed last year in the encampment, desiring to supervise activities in a more general manner.

Drills to Start at Once.
Colonel Clarence E. Dentler, regular army, senior instructor of the O. N. G., announced that the regular drill programme will get under way tomorrow, all units participating. Battalion commanders will be held to strict accountability for the instruction in the units under their command, he said. The 7th infantry, regular army, encamped with the 4th infantry at this encampment, will furnish an inspecting officer for each battalion, who also may be utilized to assist in the training.

Next in command of the 162d infantry, under Colonel Hammond, is Lieutenant-Colonel Mosherberger of Woodburn. Major Eugene Libby of Portland is commanding officer of the 163d infantry. Major C. E. Gjedsted of Salem of the coast artillery, Major J. C. Booth of the field hospital corps, Captain James S. Gay of Battery A, Captain George E. Sandy of company A engineers, Major James Dusenberry of Salem is senior artillery instructor, stationed at Fort Worden.

First call for reveille in camp will be at 6:15 to conform to the calls of the regular army divisions stationed here. This is 15 minutes later than originally was intended by the guard instructors.

Grumbler Not to Be Tolerated.
Colonel White served notice on the officers in a brief talk tonight that the grumbler will not be tolerated in camp. Saying that such a man either is physically or mentally deficient, the adjutant-general gave instructions to eliminate him from company rolls wherever he appeared.

Due to the fact that neither officers' sabers, as now required under new uniform regulations, nor the new double strap Sam Browne belts can be obtained at camp at quarter-master prices, which are about one-third those charged by private concerns, Colonel White is not requiring that they be purchased at this time.

887 TO FINISH COURSES

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION
EXERCISES END TONIGHT.

Of Total 344 Are Boys and 541
Girls—Jefferson High Leads
in Number of Graduates.

Portland high school graduation exercises, beginning with those of the High School of Commerce, held Wednesday evening at the Lincoln high school, and the Girls' Polytechnic school, held last night at the same school assembly, will be concluded tonight when the remaining six schools—Benson, Polytechnic, Franklin, James, John, Jefferson, Lincoln and Washington—end their terms.

Fifty-five girls and 14 boys graduated Wednesday evening at the exercises of the High School of Commerce. At the Girls' Polytechnic exercises, held last night at the Lincoln high school, 79 girls received their diplomas from Frank L. Shull, school director. Rabbi Jonah B. Wise delivered the commencement address. The subject on which Dr. Wise spoke dealt with the function of education in the selection of life work. He emphasized the fact that education is the only means of getting away from certain results of ignorance and inexperience. Education is necessary, according to Dr. Wise, in order to build a real future.

The exercises in all the schools will begin at 8:15 o'clock. The fol-

lowing will speak at the various schools: Professor E. D. Ressler, Oregon Agricultural college, at Benson; Dr. J. J. Staub, Sunnyside Congregational church, at Franklin; Dr. Joseph Boyd, Christian church, at Jefferson; Rabbi Jonah B. Wise and A. C. Newell at Lincoln; Dr. B. Earle Parker, First Methodist Episcopal church, at Washington; Dr. W. T. McElveen, First Congregational church, at James John.

Including 148 students graduating from the High School of Commerce and the Girls' Polytechnic who already have received their diplomas, a total of 887 young people will finish their high school work when tonight's exercises in the six remaining schools are concluded. Of this total 344 are boys and 541 are girls.

Jefferson high leads in the number of graduates, with 223, including 123 girls and 84 boys.

CAR SPACE IS PROVIDED

BIG CROWD EXPECTED AT
CASCADES SUNDAY.

Provision Made for Parking of
5000 Autos at Dedication of
Pier for Bridge of Gods.

Workmen have arranged parking space for 5000 automobiles at the Cascades to accommodate spectators Sunday at the dedication of the big pier on the Oregon side that is to help support the modern Bridge of the Gods, which is being constructed to connect the highways of Oregon and Washington at that point. The Portland Ad club, which has charge of the affair, had made provisions for the parking of automobiles in a systematic manner, and as many have indicated their intention to spend the day in the vicinity, the parking was arranged with view to accommodating picnic parties.

George Allen of the Bridge of the Gods corporation, was busy at the Dailies yesterday, as he was reporting a large number of Indians to the pier dedication Sunday and providing for their comfort during the day. The Indians are to take an important part in the ceremony, which is to start about noon. One of the oldest of the Indians, a chief, is to deliver an oration in his native tongue, which will be translated for the benefit of the whites, after which there will be the ceremony of shooting an arrow into the water, signifying that the white man's crossing is to be placed there, and there will be an Indian dance with participants in full costume, accompanied by a tom-tom band.

TROOPS CUT OFF FROM BASE AND SURROUNDED.
Chang ignores overtures for
Peace and Orders Attack on
Manchurian Chihli Front.

TIENSIN, China, June 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Chang Tso-Lin's army on the Manchuria-Chihli front has been surrounded by General Wu Pei-Fu's troops, driving along the railway toward Mukden, according to unconfirmed advices received here.

The report received here stated that General Wu's forces occupied the railway in the rear of the Fengtien army two stations to the north of Shanhaiwan, thus cutting off General Chang's men from their base.

General Chang Tso-Lin's alleged treachery in attacking the Chihli front after he had made overtures for a truce is explained by his friends with the statement that he had asked for and had been promised the issuance of a presidential mandate that both sides cease firing. Chang, by this means, hoped to save his face after his crushing defeat before Pekin at the hands of Wu.

In the confusion following the resignation of Liang Shih-Yi as president and the assumption of that office by Li Yuan-Hung this promise is said to have been forgotten and General Chang, angered at the delay, ordered his troops to attack.

DR. SUN YAT SEN IS INVITED
Head of South Republic Asked to
Aid Reunion Movement.

PEKIN, June 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Wu Pei-Fu, China's military genius, who has turned his energies toward the reunification of his country, has invited Dr. Sun Yat Sen, president of the republic of South China, to come to Pekin and aid the reunion movement.

Dr. Wu Ting Fang, former minister to the Washington government, who was offered the premiership by President Li Yuan Hung, has not yet replied.

EX-OREGONIAN IS FREED

Newspaper Man Serving Term
for Robbery Is Paroled.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., June 15.—Richard Gray, ex-Portland, Ore., newspaper man, serving ten years' sentence in the Missouri state penitentiary for first degree robbery, was paroled by Governor Hyde today. Gray was sentenced in July, 1917, and has served almost half his term.

He had "aided in suppressing the dope habit in prison, and in publishing the prison newspaper, the 'Clarion,' his parole recommendation said. He plans to return to Oregon, where he will work as a newspaper man.

Auto Hits Woman, Driver Held.
SALEM, Ore., June 15.—(Special.)—Fred Lacy of Salem was held in the city jail here tonight after an automobile driven by him had hit and injured Mrs. Elvira Gleason, about 60 years old, who resides near Salem. The buggy in which Mrs. Gleason had been riding was badly damaged. Physicians said they could not yet determine whether Mrs. Gleason was injured internally. She received severe cuts on the face and head. Police say that Lacy was drunk and that he was driving on the wrong side of the street. A charge of driving while in an intoxicated condition was filed against him.

NAVY CLASS EDITOR GETS HOT REPRISAL

Secretary Roosevelt Scores
Treatment of Classmate.

REPRIMAND ON RECORD

Annapolis Graduate Told Conduct
Causes Doubt as to Ability
to Serve as Officer.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—Acting Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt officially reprimanded Ensign J. L. Olmsted, editor of the "Ensign," the year book of this year's graduating class at Annapolis, for "cruel and unwarranted" treatment of Leonard Kaplan, a fellow member of the class.

Secretary Roosevelt told Ensign Olmsted, whose home is in Des Moines, Ia., that he had been guilty of "an action which casts a grave doubt as to your possession of those qualifications essential to any officer in the United States navy," and added that "the department will require from you in the future evidence of a fundamental change in your attitude toward your comrades in the service."

Others, especially the associate editors, the naval secretary asserted, undoubtedly were guilty in some measure for the affront to Kaplan, which consisted in performing the page in the year book containing his photograph and biography so that it might be removed. But, added Mr. Roosevelt, the primary responsibility rested on Ensign Olmsted.

Race Feeling Doubtful.
When asked for a copy of the reprimand, Acting Secretary Roosevelt made public at the same time, a statement in which he expressed the belief that no racial antipathy was behind the treatment of Kaplan. "A most serious note in this incident at the academy," Colonel Roosevelt said in his statement to the newspapers, "was struck by the query of certain people's mind as to whether the action had been taken on racial grounds. Feeling as strongly as I do how un-American any such distinction as this would be, I have gone most carefully into this phase. I am happy to say that I am convinced that, had though this incident was, no such motive was behind it."

Reprimand on Record.
"The traditions of our country have always been exemplified by our navy. We pride ourselves that in the service there are no distinctions of race or creed."

The reprimand automatically becomes part of Olmsted's official navy record. Ensign Olmsted is attached to the battleship Wyoming.

PACKER GETS JUDGMENT

Berry Operator Wins Suit Against
Storage Company.

Damages of \$23,000 were awarded to H. A. Baker, prominent loganberry packer, by a jury in United States court yesterday in his suit against the National Cold Storage & Ice company of Portland. Baker charged in his complaint that 338 50-gallon barrels of fruit, which he stored with the company in 1920, spoiled because of lack of proper refrigeration. The jury rendered its decision after deliberating a few minutes.

Mr. Baker operates packing plants at Salem, Or., and Sumner, Wash. His home is at the latter place. He was one of the first in the northwest to pack loganberries in barrels and ship them in cold storage to eastern consumers. He was represented by Omar Spencer.

SCOUT CHIEF ARRIVES

Director Haddock Seeks Site for
Distributing Center.

Arthur Haddock, director of supplies for the Boy Scouts of America, arrived in Portland last night on a tour of inspection of the Pacific northwest, preparatory to the establishment of a distributing center in this territory for scout equipment.

There is a strong probability, Mr. Haddock said, of contracts being entered into whereby Boy Scout equipment for the Pacific coast district will be manufactured on this coast rather than in the east. At the present time, he said, there are 430,000 boys enrolled in the organizations, and there are 150,000 volunteer workers.

NORTHCLEFFE IS SUED

2 DIRECTORS OF ASSOCIATED
NEWSPAPERS PLAINTIFFS.

Napoleon of Fleet Street Said to
Be in Switzerland Resting
After World Trip.

LONDON, June 15.—(Special Cable.)—There was a sensation in the political world as it was reported that the Napoleon of Fleet Street, following the public announcement that two directors of the Associated Newspapers, Ltd., which includes the Daily Mail, had issued writs for libel against Lord Northcliffe, the one director is Walter G. Fish and the other is Sir Andrew Cair, vice-chairman of the Associated Newspapers, Ltd.

The reports tonight were that Lord Northcliffe and Cecil Harmsworth, brothers of Lord Northcliffe, either had gone or were about to go to Switzerland to see Northcliffe, who is now there with Wickham Stead, one of the editors of the London Times. Northcliffe has not been well and it was said a specialist may be accompanying the brothers there.

There are rumors, too, that Lord Northcliffe recently obtained a divorce from his wife, and that he returned from his world tour, Northcliffe announced the withdrawal of all his newspapers from the Newspaper Proprietors' association because he did not agree with its proposed policy to reduce wages later this year. T. M. Kerrigan, commissioner to succeed Fred Williams, is expected to arrive here tomorrow.

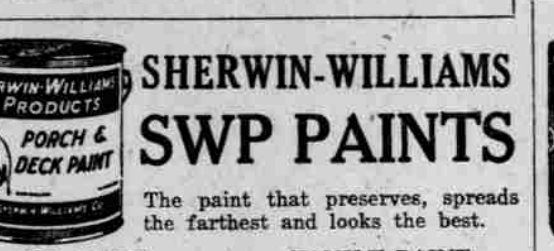
