

THE HAGUE OPENS ECONOMIC SESSION

Rehabilitation Again Is Before World.

RUSSIAN PROBLEM UP

Interest Centers on Harmonizing of Powers on How to Approach Soviet Delegation.

THE HAGUE, June 15.—The economic rehabilitation of Europe, and the re-establishment of Russia in the family of nations were before the world again today as the principal powers resumed the discussions abandoned at Geneva a month ago. All Europe centered its hopes today in the new conference, which is dedicated principally to the problem of Russia. Failure of the efforts at Paris to organize an international loan for Germany undoubtedly has served to augment the pessimism obtaining in many quarters concerning the prospects of the present gathering in making definite agreements with soviet Russia on such vital matters as credits, the treatment to be accorded to property held by foreigners, and the payment of the Russian debts.

Holland Envoys Presides. Determination was evident among the delegates gathered for the preliminary meetings to make every effort to accomplish the results which the Geneva conference failed to achieve.

The representatives of the principal countries except Russia assembled in the peace palace at 2:30 this afternoon, and there began their labors of studying the programme which will be presented to the Russian delegation at the joint meetings to open on June 26.

Foreign Minister van Karnebeek of Holland delivered the opening address as temporary president, welcoming the delegates to the Netherlands and voicing Holland's sincere wishes for the success of the conference.

Chief interest centers in the harmonization of the attitudes of England, France and Italy on how to approach the soviet delegation officially, for France shows a disposition to adhere tenaciously to her Geneva demand for suitable guarantees from the bolsheviks before official pour parlers with the Russian delegates again are inaugurated.

France Holds Objection. France objects to the soviet memorandum submitted to the conference on May 11, which attacked the capitalist systems of the other countries and charged these nations with doing many things—confiscating property for example—equally drastic with the bolshevik measures to which they objected. The French would like to see this memorandum drawn by the soviet before official pour parlers with the Russian delegates again are inaugurated.

Great Britain and Italy apparently are ready to pursue a more conciliatory policy. The preliminary meetings beginning today, therefore, promise to be most important.

Sessions to Be Secret. All sessions today were secret. The Dutch foreign minister refused to admit newspaper men to the opening session and said they should not have been admitted to the grounds, as the sessions are all to be secret.

The visiting delegates appeared to be helpless in the situation. Many of them expressed annoyance over the attitude of the Dutch government, which has apparently decided to exert every effort to avoid publicity.

Reports received by members of the Russian conference here say Marquis Della Torretta, former foreign minister of Italy, is likely to be appointed ambassador at Washington, replacing Vittorio Rolandi Ricci.

England Ratifies Question. Sir Ernest Pollock, attorney-general of Great Britain, delivered an address in which he said the British government had asked if the hearing in the cases now before the court touching the competence of the international labor office in agricultural affairs and the question of the nomination of Dutch delegates to the international labor conference was in accordance with the covenant of the league of nations.

Dr. Leader answered that the court intended to grant a hearing to the representatives of any nation or organization which expressed a wish for one. If it did not do so there would be general indignation and motives would be assailed in the public sessions, the first of which will take place June 28.

Other countries represented are: Great Britain, Albania, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Latvia, Lithuania, The Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Rumania, Yugoslavia, Sweden, Switzerland and Czechoslovakia.
