

## DRYS TO DEMAND BAN ON SHIP BARS

Representative Bankhead to Force Issue to Vote.

## RECORD BALLOT WANTED

Alabama Has Plan to Deny Subsidy to Vessels Selling Liquor on High Seas.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—Regardless of house action on the Edmunds proposal to fine ships of whatever registry on which liquor is sold on voyages touching American ports, Representative Bankhead, democrat, Alabama, announced today that he would force a vote on his amendment denying any part of government funds under the ship subsidy bill to American vessels on which liquor selling was permitted.

In the event the bill is reported under a rule permitting amendments, Mr. Bankhead said his proposal would be presented in that way.

"But if the rule prevents," he said, "there will be a motion to send the measure back to the merchant marine committee with instructions to add the straight provision that ships selling liquor cannot share in the federal compensation. The ship liquor question, therefore, will go to the house for a record vote, no matter what may be done with the final proposition."

Controversy Believed Settled. This interpretation was taken as settling for the time being the controversy over liquor on government ships precipitated by Adolphus Buch III, the St. Louis brewer, when he wrote President Harding that the government was engaging in the bootlegging business by permitting sale of alcoholic beverages on shipping board vessels.

Solution of the problem, Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the Anti-Saloon League, declared tonight, "lies in excluding all ships that sell liquor from American ports."

Legislation to this end is being considered, he said, asserting that by putting both American and foreign vessels on an equal footing with respect to liquor, the competitive feature of the question would be removed.

The new regulations were not drafted with the question of settling the question of liquor on shipping board vessels, it was said, and in fact were written before that question arose. As drawn, however, he said, they would apply equally to American and foreign ships, permitting intoxicating sea stores within the three-mile limit under the customs regulations which provide that while in American ports all liquors on board a ship must be sealed up.

New Rules in Effect. Amending the former regulations, the new rules were issued "pursuant to an opinion of Acting Attorney General Nebeker, dated February 4, 1931, affirmed by Attorney General Daugherty June 30, 1931, and the decision of the United States supreme court in Oregon vs. Walker and the Anchor Line v. Aldridge, rendered May 15, 1932."

The new regulations, which became effective today, provide for the seizure of beverage liquor when in transit through the United States.

"It is unlawful," the regulations said, "to transport liquor for beverage purposes, including in-transit shipment from one foreign country to the same or another foreign country, in or through American territory, either by land or water, and even though not landed in this country, and such liquor so transported in or through American territory will be subject to seizure, and the persons transporting it subject to prosecution. No permit for such transportation can be issued."

Sea Stores Exempted. After providing for the transportation of non-beverage liquor, the regulations stated that "liquors properly listed as sea stores and liquors shown by the shipping papers and vessel's manifest to be and actually destined to a foreign country and going forward on the same vessel as that on which they arrive, are exempted from the provisions of this section and will be subject only to customs regulations."

KATO UPHOLDS PACTS NEW PREMIER STANDS BY ARMS TREATIES.

Faith of Japan to Co-operate With World Powers to Cut Armament Is Pledged.

TOKYO, June 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Admiral Tominaga Kato, Japan's new premier, today pledged the faith of Japan to co-operate with the other world powers for further reduction of armaments, and the maintenance of the new era of peace which he said had been ushered in by the Washington conference.

The premier, outlining the cabinet policy regarding China, which with the remainder of his statement had been carefully considered by the cabinet before being made public, asserted it was Japan's "earnest hope that China soon may emerge from the unfortunate internal conditions now obtaining there and quickly achieve tranquillity and unity by the efforts of her own people."

"In China's welfare Japan is interested, not only sentimentally, but also materially," Premier Kato continued. "The welfare of Japan to a considerable measure is dependent on the peace and prosperity of her great neighbor."

"The principles of concord and co-operation, which were promoted by the powers at Washington, especially in regard to China, are fundamental policies for Japan," he concluded.

"In brief, Japan's foreign policy, from which this cabinet will not depart, is to co-operate with the powers in the spirit as well as to the letter of the covenant of the league of nations and the treaties and resolutions signed at Washington, with the view that concord and friendship may continue and develop among the nations and that reduction of armaments may steadily progress to relieve the difficulties and burdens of mankind," Premier Kato said.

The newly appointed director of Japanese statecraft declared that "with the successful conclusion of the Washington conference, a new

Mrs. Myriam A. Ferguson, wife of ex-Governor James E. Ferguson of Texas, who was impeached during his second term of office, has been ticketed for the United States senate.

Ferguson, the "stormy petrel" of Texas politics, decided not to take any chances of being ruled ineligible to run for the senate, so he solved the problem by getting his wife to be a candidate. The result is that when the state democratic committee meets in Austin the committee members will find applications by husband and wife for the same office as United States senator.

If Ferguson's name is not allowed to go on the ticket on the ground that he is disqualified because of his impeachment, his wife will make the senate race—and in this event Ferguson will campaign for her and, if elected, he will act as her private secretary.

SHRINERS ON OCEAN TRIP STEAMERS H. F. ALEXANDER, MATSONIA START VOYAGE.

Nobles and Wives Taking Special Trains From San Francisco Homeward Bound.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Two steamships filled with Shriners bound for Honolulu on a visit to the home of the new imperial pot of Honolulu, left here at noon today. They were the H. F. Alexander, formerly the Great Northern, and the Matsonia, which was used as a transport in war service, and the Matsonia, a shipboard vessel. A few Shriners also were on the Nile, which left later in the day.

All but two members of the imperial divan of the Mystic Shrine, Benjamin W. Rowell of Boston and David S. Croeland of Montgomery, Ala., were in the party, whose trip will be a continuation on a smaller scale of the festivities that have marked Shrine week here.

The bands, patrols and chanters of Islam temple of San Francisco and Al Matsonia temple of Los Angeles, and the patrol of Aloha temple of Honolulu, will contribute to the gaiety of the trip, which will be held also by the sailing at sea of Kille Coleman, a member of Islam temple, to Miss Helen Hurwitz of San Francisco. Music by radio from the main land is expected to be a feature of the ceremony.

A stay of several days will be made in Honolulu and the volcano of Kilauea also will be visited. The party will reach San Francisco about July 1.

Special trains began taking the Shriners and their wives back to their homes last night, and by tomorrow only one train will be left—that of Al Bahr temple of San Diego. It is scheduled to leave tomorrow.

The historical Masonic pageant given last night will be repeated tomorrow night.

A large crowd saw the imperial party off, and the dock was festive with Hawaiian leis hung around the necks of the departing Shriners. Five airplanes and a tug which carried Mayor Rolph acted as an escort to the H. F. Alexander and Matsonia as they steamed toward the Golden Gate.

## ELECTION IN IRELAND TAMEST ON RECORD

One Precinct in Dublin Invaded by Raiders.

## DAY OTHERWISE QUIET

Publication of Constitution Evokes No Expression of Opinion From Mr. de Valera.

DUBLIN, June 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—The universal verdict tonight was that, with the exception of one instance in Dublin, Ireland never had such a tame election as that which took place today to choose members of parliament.

In the city, raiders headed by Rory O'Connor of the irregular republican army made off with the documents and tally sheets of the national university polling precinct. Elsewhere in the city and county of Dublin the day was devoid of incident. The voting was somewhat more brisk than had been expected. A large number of women cast their ballots at the polls. The general estimate tonight was that about 50 per cent of the voters on the register exercised the franchise.

The publication of the constitution evoked no expression of opinion from Eamon de Valera, leader of the republican faction. Mr. de Valera declined to speak concerning it on the ground that he had not had time to read the document.

Public Meetings Banned.

BELFAST, June 16.—A proclamation issued in Belfast tonight bans all processions, meetings, fairs and markets within three miles of Belfast on the Fermanagh side of the border.

## VEHICLE LAW ATTACKED

Certificates of Necessity Held to Be Unconstitutional.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 16.—(Special.)—Constitutionality of the certificate of public convenience and necessity section of the state motor vehicle law was attacked in superior court today by Attorney Guy E. Kelly, who appealed from the decision of the department of public works denying the J. F. Hickey Motor Car company of Tacoma a certificate for passenger service between Tacoma and Aberdeen.

Mr. Kelly stated that the issuance of a certificate of necessity creates a monopoly, that the act is retroactive in effect, and that it extends to certain operators privileges and immunities not extended to others.

MISSING FARMER FOUND W. D. Felter Is Put in Charge of Brother From Brandon, Or.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 16.—(Special.)—W. D. Felter, farmer who has been missing from his home on the Tracy road five miles from Vancouver, has been found. Mr. Felter was walking along the North Bank highway near Fishers when met by Barry Ragus, deputy sheriff.

Mr. Felter said he did not know where he had been except that he had worked a couple of days in the pulp mills at Camas. Apparently he had not had enough to eat. He was brought to Vancouver and given in charge of his brother, W. W. Felter of Brandon, Or.

HANDSHAKE IS REFUSED Knight of Columbus Prefers Fine to Klansman's Friendship.

H. F. Coyle preferred to stand a \$20 fine in municipal court yesterday morning for fighting rather than shake hands with A. F. Weaver. Coyle is a member of the Knights of Columbus and Weaver is a Ku Klux klansman. The two were principals in a fist fight at the entrance of the Y. M. C. A. Thursday.

According to the testimony introduced in court Weaver requested Coyle to sign a petition on the initiative for the school measure. Coyle refused, and the fight was on, first with words and then with blows. It lasted until Patrolmen Ragus and Gladwin arrived at the impromptu ring and blew the whistle for the long first round.

When the case came up this morning Judge Ekwall heard the testimony and then ordered the combatants to shake hands and forget it. Weaver was willing, but Coyle was not.

"I'll not shake the hand of a man who says I'm not a loyal American citizen, if I have to lie in jail until I rot," he declared.

Then Judge Ekwall affixed a \$20 fine, which eventually was suspended, although Coyle still refused to shake hands.

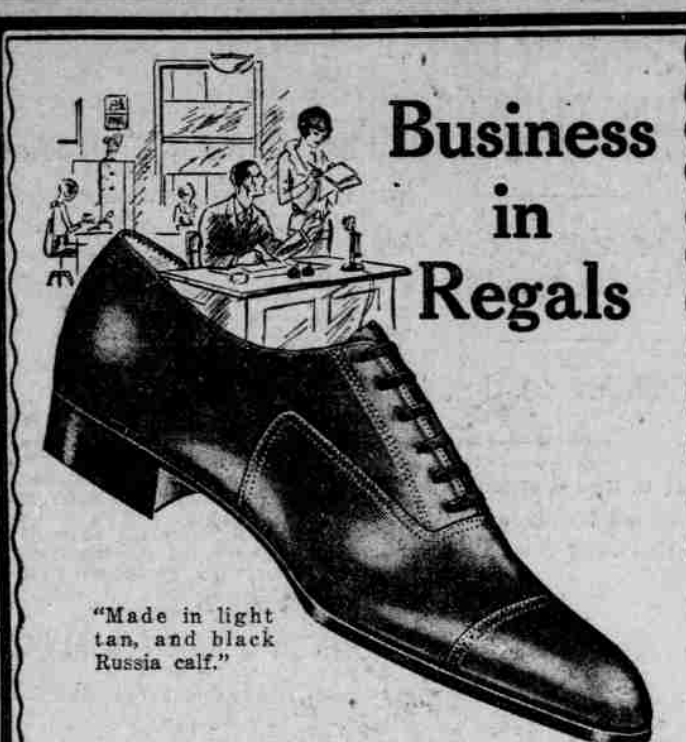
