GRAND JURY INDICTS FIVE.—Assault and robbery and threatening with a dangerous weapon were charged against Willis Harrison and Conrad W. Myers in a joint indictment returned yesterday by the Multnomah county grand jury. The men were alleged to have entered the room of Louis Eggers, on North Sixth street the night of May 2, and to have held up Eggers and taken \$5.50 from him. The indicted men were arrested at the time, hiding in some bushes near the scene of the holdup. They have been in custody since their arrest. The only other indictments returned yesterday were against K. P. Mikesell, for forgery of a small check, and against Elmer N. Duvall and Lida Bowles for lewd cohabitation. Mikesell and Duvall are in jail. The Bowles woman is not in custody having become a mother a few days ago.

BIBLE SCHOOL TO OPEN.—A daily vacation Bible school under the joint supervision of the First Methodist Episcopal church, South, Union avenue and Multnomah streets, and the United Presbyterian church of the Stranger, Grand avenue and Wasco streets, will open for two weeks' session June 25. The Bible school is an annual study course and this year will have a corps of seven instructors, under the direction of the superintendent, Rev. S. Earl DuBois, pastor of the United Presbyterian church of the Stranger. More than 100 children of primary and high school ages are expected to attend.

BOND AND TAX ISSUE FAVORED.—Members of the Westmoreland Community club and residents of that section of the city are strongly in favor of the proposed bond measure and tax levy for the Portland schools to be voted upon Saturday, according to C. N. Hanson, president of the club. A membership campaign for the club is now being carried on in Westmoreland and the membership committee in addition to soliciting new members is also urging that the school measures be given a favorable vote. The Community club has endorsed the measures.

REPORT PROPRIETOR SENTENCED.—The jury in the case of R. D. Stuart, proprietor of the resort at Fifteenth and Lovejoy streets which achieved notoriety in a recent police raid found him guilty of the sale of intoxicants. Deliberations of the jury, on which there were three women, covered about two hours. Stuart waived time of sentence and Circuit Judge Phelps immediately gave him a fine of \$250 and 60 days in jail. This was identical to the same sentence Stuart had drawn in the municipal court.

FIGHTING STRIKER IS SENTENCED.—A \$150 fine and a jail sentence of 30 days were meted out yesterday to George Thompson, charged with assault on a policeman, charged with attacking B. W. Calkins, strikebreaker, on a streetcar at East Sixty-fifth and East Gilliam streets Saturday. Municipal Judge Elwell said he felt the time for leniency toward the strikers was over. They have had every opportunity to mend their ways, and henceforth I shall not deal lightly with them when they appear in court on fighting charges," he declared.

BOY FOUND IN RIVER.—The Williams river yesterday gave up the body of John Walsh, who was thought to have committed suicide about two weeks ago. Fishermen on the fireboat George L. Williams found the body floating at the foot of Hoyt street. Identification was made by papers found in the clothing. Deputy Coroner Falk took charge of the body. Walsh was 27 years old and lived at 222 1/2 First street. He was thought to be unmarried and has a brother living in Tillamook.

HONOLULU RESIDENT HERE.—George T. Armitage, executive secretary of the Hawaiian Tourist association, Honolulu, was a Portland visitor yesterday. He said that while last year there were not steamers enough between the Hawaiian islands and the mainland to accommodate tourist travel, additional boats will be put on this year and it is expected to provide ample accommodations for everyone.

COMMUNITY CLUB TO BE REARRANGED.—Residents of the Westmoreland district are planning to reorganize a community club at a meeting held last Monday night at the Evangelical church. The question of prohibiting the construction of flats and apartment houses in the addition was also discussed. A meeting will be held next Monday night at 8 o'clock and all residents and property owners are urged to attend.

SUIT ON NOTE FILED.—On a note given for \$7000 in 1903 there is now due the sum of \$14,533.14, according to complaint of C. M. Kline in suit filed in district court against P. A. Kline. The sum has thus grown through the interest rate was only 6 per cent and despite payments aggregating about \$700. The papers do not indicate the relationship of the parties to the suit.

HARDING ENVOY PINS FAITH TO PRAYER

Miss Robertson Breathes Spirit of Pilgrims.

ROSES SHOWER VISITOR

Woman Representative Says She Appealed for Guidance Before She Ran for Office.

If one can imagine a member of congress in these unregenerate days praying for guidance before accepting the nomination for office one might form some sort of mental picture of the sort of woman Miss Alice Mary Robertson, representative from Oklahoma, is.

America's Lady Astor, only woman member of the nation's parliament, who came to Portland yesterday as the president's representative to the Rose Festival, is that kind of person. She believes in prayer. She clings fast to the old-fashioned religion. She says what the country needs is more of it.

Pilgrims Spirit Is Shown.
 To all intents and purposes Miss Robertson is a bit of the spirit of Plymouth Rock transplanted to Oklahoma. She is the daughter of New England missionaries who spent their lives teaching the Cherokee and Creek Indians. The strength of character that has somehow come to her regarding religion is shown in the granite shores of New England shows itself in every feature.

"I never had any thought of public office," said Miss Robertson, telling of her quite accidental entry into the country's political life. "I was a republican in a strongly democratic state and, besides, I was an anti-suffragist. I was vice-president of the state organization opposing suffrage when the state passed the bill giving the vote to women."

Farmers Turn Republican.
 But conditions in her state upset democratic control. The Gore-Ferris conflict left sore spots in the dominant party. The farmers two years ago had wonderful cotton crops, the biggest in years. Then the federal reserve board shut down on credits to farmers, making it impossible to buy cotton and the result was such hard times that the farmers turned republican. Miss Robertson was called upon and told she was the only republican who could win and was urged to become a candidate.

Then she said she took six weeks to think it over and prayed for guidance. She has been praying ever since when she felt she needed greater strength than her own and, possibly, she has put up a prayer or two for some of her fellow members of the great American debating society, but as to that she did not say.

Month Kept Shut at First.
 Miss Robertson said she kept her seat for many weeks in congress without doing anything except to keep her eyes and ears open and her mouth shut, and this against the advice of friends. She said it did her a lot of good.

"The most successful people are those who possess poise and control," she said. "One thing worth while is service to one's fellow-men and the Almighty. The woman who undertakes the work of a man should do a substantial work. Men are attracted particularly to women in business and they must be prepared to sacrifice the wonderful joys of motherhood and the blessings of grandchildren."
