

OUTLAW IS PROUD OF TRICKING POLICE

Loss of Blood Blamed for
Final Capture.

ODDS CALLED NOTHING

Bad Man. Sorry He Did Not Have
Ammunition for Rifle
to Fight Posse.

RAWLINS, Wyo., June 18.—Fred Brown, alias Gus Grimes, alias Ernest Bush, wanted in Omaha for the holding of two women and a man as prisoners, bound in chains in his shack, today declared that if he had not fainted from loss of blood when shot by a member of a posse near here yesterday he "never would have given up."

"Why didn't I throw up my hands when the odds were all against me," Brown said, repeating a question asked him. "Well, odds are never against me as long as I have a gun. I never would have put up my dukes, I never would have given up if I had not fainted from loss of blood."

Three Murders Suspected.
Brown was more than willing to talk about how he said he had outwitted officers and seemed particularly pleased to relate how he had bound up two Sidney, Neb., officers with their own suspenders but when he was asked concerning a series of crimes in connection with which he will be held as a suspect, he merely shrugged his shoulders. The crimes of which he is suspected include three murders.

Brown admitted tying up the two women in Omaha, but he refused to tell why he did it.

AMMUNITION LACK REGRETTED.

Brown admitted that 15 years ago he was a shepherd in Wyoming and that then he used the name of Ernest Bush. But he refused to tell anything about his family.

He bemoaned the fact that he had no ammunition for the rifle he obtained in Sidney, Neb.

"If I only had ammunition for that rifle I took off that Sidney marshal," he said, "I would be sympathizing with you birds instead of you sympathizing with me."

"I should have bought some cartridges in Cheyenne. You can't do anything in these mountains without a rifle. Revolvers are no good."

LONG-BELL CHIEFS LEAVE

Officials to Meet R. A. Long at
Weed and Return to Kelso.

KELOSO, Wash., June 18.—(Special.)—J. D. Tennant, vice-president of the Long-Bell Lumber company, and S. M. Morris, western representative, left last night for Weed, Cal., where they will meet R. A. Long, chairman of the board of directors of the Long-Bell Lumber company, and accompany him on a tour of inspection of the company's properties at Weed, after which they will return north, accompanied by Mr. Long, for an examination of their development project here. Engineering data is nearly all complete, and it is expected that the company will disclose definite plans for construction following the forthcoming visit of Mr. Long at Kelso.

The company has leased a site for a ferry landing at Rainier, Or., on the opposite side of the Columbia from its mill site, and will operate boats and barges for the transportation of supplies and materials.

FAMILY REUNION HELD

Descendants of 3 Lewis County
Pioneers Have Meeting.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 18.—(Special.)—More than 100 descendants of J. C. Davis, Rebecca (Prince) Tyrell and Samuel Layton, pioneer settlers of Lewis county, attended the semi-annual reunion of the Davis-Prince-Layton association at the Forest Grange hall yesterday. The event lasted all day, a basket dinner being served at noon, with dancing in the evening.

J. C. Davis, Rebecca Prince and Samuel Layton crossed the plains in 1840, Layton and Davis settling on what is now Layton's prairie, in southern Lewis county. Mrs. Prince, a sister of Davis, was a widow with one child. She later married Captain Tyrell and settled in the Skokumchuck valley. Mirilla B. Layton, 85, daughter of Mrs. Tyrell; Charles Layton, son of Samuel; and Andrew Davis, son of J. C. Davis, are the three oldest descendants of the pioneers in question.

WARSHIPS PLAN VISIT

Destroyers to Spend Fourth of
July at South Bend.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., June 18.—(Special.)—The United States destroyers Fuller and Percival have been ordered to South Bend from July 1 to July 25, to take part in the big celebration here, according to advices from the navy department. The vessels will come from Portland where they will take part in the Rose Festival. The crew of the Percival has telegraphed a challenge to the South Bend baseball team for a three-game series.

Barrett, 23, who received the highest honors of the class of '22 at the graduation exercises at West Point, was an overseas veteran in the 28th division during the world war, a dispatch bearer to headquarters during the battle of Verdun, the ranking soldier of the 188th Infantry selected to compete in the West Point entrance examination. Barrett for the last three years of his course has ranked the highest both in office and studies.

During his second and third years Barrett was class historian. This year he was a member of the board of governors of the First Class club and executive editor of The Howitzer, the West Point year book. Barrett also played on the football team, ran on the cross-country and track teams and qualified as an expert rifleman. As a cadet he ranked as a first captain, the highest cadet officer at West Point.

SOCIALISTS WANT CHEAP
GRAIN RETAINED.

Landowners Against Selling of
Product to Government Below
Market Quotations.

BERLIN, June 18.—(Special Cable.)—Bread has become the center of the conflict between republicans and monarchists in Germany. Many are suspicious, pugnacious and ready for trouble and they find it strong in the country, all estate owners and most of the peasant land owners being monarchists. Bread has become the natural line of cleavage for the political struggle.

The fight can easily break the coalition on which the Wirth government rests. The majority socialists, the strongest party behind the government, have given notice they will leave the coalition if the law is repealed. But the nationalist parties, backed by the grain growers, are determined to prevent a repetition this year of conditions under which they are forced to sell their product below the world market price.

The struggle would be an ordinary one if the political division did not also separate republicans and monarchists. The city populations, for whom the socialists want to get cheap bread, are the convinced republicans. The enemies of the old regime. Those who wish to remove the reduced rate to the government are almost all monarchists and believe in the old regime. So both sides in the reichstag are sharpening their political knives.

TRAIL LEADS TO STILL

Operators Caught Red-Handed;
Distillery Cleverly Concealed.

ST. HELENS, Or., June 18.—(Special.)—Sheriff Wellington discovered one of the largest and most cleverly concealed moonshine stills that has yet been found in this county, when he followed a dim trail leading from Scappoose creek to a tent camouflaged with leaves and twigs. In the tent the moonshine still was going full blast and in charge was John Fyke, an Australian. His helper was Steve Konic, also an Australian. There was a large quantity of mash and a considerable amount of the finished product.

Justice of the Peace Philip fined Fyke \$500 and Konic \$400, and Frank Hill, on whose place the operations were carried on, was fined \$100, which he paid.

POWELL REUNION IS SET

Descendants of Pioneers to Gather
Next Sunday.

MONMOUTH, Or., June 18.—(Special.)—The fourth annual reunion of the Powell Memorial society, composed of the descendants and relatives of John A. Noah and Alfred Powell, pioneers of 1851, will be held next Sunday in the Copeland grove on the site of the original Powell donation land claim eight miles east of Albany.

CANTON ATTACKED BY SUN'S SOLDIERS

Capital of South Is Held by
Parliament Faction.

NEW BATTLE IS FOUGHT

Fugitive President's Forces and
Wu Pei-Fu's Army Clash
Around Kiangsi.

KIUKIANG, Province of Kiangsi, China, June 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Fighting continued throughout Sunday in some places outside Canton, the soldiers of Dr. Sun Yat-sen, president of the southern government, making brave efforts to defeat those of Chen Chiung-ming, despite the fact that their government itself had collapsed entirely and Sun has fled.

Chen, one-time adherent of Dr. Sun, controls Canton, presumably in behalf of Wu Pei-fu, whose plans for convocation of the old Chinese parliament Chen forsook Dr. Sun to embrace.

Dr. Sun, who fled Canton Saturday, still is at Whampoa, Kwangtung province, where he sought refuge on a Chinese gunboat. Whampoa is on the Canton river, near Canton.

AMMUNITION BLOWN UP.

Severe fighting continues in Kiangsi province, whose conquest Sun planned as a means of reaching the valley of the Yangtze. Last Saturday a junk load of ammunition exploded as the junk was floating down the river at Nanchang, capital of Kiangsi, killing 50 persons. Advice received here do not make clear whether the junk had been set adrift by Sun's men or was being used by the defenders of the city to transport munitions.

Forces of Dr. Sun and of Wu Pei-fu, who is carrying on the defense of Nanchang and Kiangsi province in behalf of the Peking government, have fought a battle around Kianfu, about 150 miles southeast of Nanchang. Hundreds of Wu's wounded are coming down the Kan river from the battle area to Nanchang, where all the hospitals already are full.

AMOY, China, June 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—The president's residence in Canton has been taken by the troops of General Chiang-min. Dr. Sun Yat-sen is supposed to have made his escape on board a gunboat.

CITY IS BOMBARDED.

Canton city was bombarded Saturday afternoon by gunboats under command of Sun Yat-sen. The residents deserted the city. There were only a few casualties.

The soldiers of the invading army did considerable looting. Sun Yat-sen's army in Kiangsi is reported to have been defeated. It is reported he is awaiting the arrival of his defeated army, when an attempt will be made to retake Canton.

FACTIONS SIGN ARMISTICE

Fighting Declared Over on South
Manchurian Front.

TIENTSIN, June 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—An armistice between the forces of General Wu Pei-fu, head of the central China military establishment, and Chang Tso-lin, Manchurian rebel leader, has been signed at Chinwangtao, according to reports reaching here over the railroad line to that port.

According to these reports, Chang's Fentien troops are withdrawing from the Shanhaiwan sector and hostilities already have ceased.

It is hoped here that normal railway traffic may be restored within the week between Peking and Shanhaiwan, where it has been obstructed by the fighting on the south Manchurian front for some days.

ONE AT INN ARRESTED
