

RAIL CUT TO APPLY
TO LUMBER RATESNew Charges From Pacific
Coast Announced.

ADJUSTMENT IS CERTAIN

Commission's Order Will Be Exe-
cuted Fully, Says Southern
Pacific Freight Agent.

The recent decision of the inter-state commerce commission ordering a 10 per cent reduction in freight rates will apply to lumber shipments to the east in spite of reported activity on the part of some of the railroads serving the northwestern territory to nullify the rate, according to announcement made yesterday by J. H. Mulchay, general freight agent for the Southern Pacific company. The new rates per 100 pounds on lumber to St. Paul, Omaha and Kansas City from the Pacific coast will be 60 cents and to Chicago and St. Louis will be 70 cents, or a reduction of 6 1/2 cents at St. Paul, Omaha and Kansas City and 1 cent at Chicago and St. Louis. Rates in all related territory will be adjusted accordingly, says Mr. Mulchay.

Cut to Be Adopted.
Mr. Mulchay said he knew nothing about a purported move on the part of the rail lines to keep the old rate of 66 1/2 cents at St. Paul, Omaha and Kansas City in existence. He said the commission's recent order would be carried out to the letter.

"As is generally known," declared Mulchay, "the lines serving the southwestern lumber producing territory in Louisiana and eastern Texas chafing under reduction in rates made by transcontinental lines from the Pacific coast to the Missouri river and Mississippi river valley points, in May this year, made also a reduction in their rates and since the recent opinion of the Interstate Commerce commission ordering a reduction of 10 per cent from the general increase made by the commission on August 26, 1920, the southern lines have threatened to make a still further reduction in the event the transcontinental lines made a further cut in their rates.

Differential Is Eliminated.
"In the reduction made in May this year," he says, "the rates to Omaha and Kansas City were reduced from 73 1/2 cents to 60 cents, that being the rate in effect to St. Paul, Minn. For years prior to that time, the rates to Omaha were carried on a basis of 3 cents higher than St. Paul. However, this differential was eliminated."

Mr. Mulchay is of the firm opinion that the rate to St. Paul should come down from 66 1/2 cents to 60 cents in accord with the commission's ruling. "It has been contented by some lines," he said yesterday, "that the rate to St. Paul should not be changed, but that if a reduction was applied at St. Paul, no further reduction should be made at Omaha or Kansas City, because it would disturb the relationship existing in rates from Louisiana and eastern Texas mills to the Missouri river and Mississippi river valley points. Omaha and Kansas City rates were reduced a similar reduction would have to be made at Chicago."

Albany Offender Serves 10 Days

Rather Than Pay \$20.

ALBANY, Or., June 19.—(Special.)—That he would rather serve ten days in the county jail than pay a fine of \$20, was the declaration of Robert Ward, a young man residing southeast of Lebanon, who went to the county jail here Saturday night. Ward pleaded guilty in justice court to transferring license plates illegally from one automobile to another. After the fine was imposed he declined to pay it.

Ward is a brother of Jim Ward, notorious in Linn county the past few years for many escapades, involving liquor charges and fighting while intoxicated, who is now in the state penitentiary serving a sentence for manslaughter.

BILL STRIKES AT ANTHRAX

SHAVING AND HAIR BRUSHES

OF HORSE HAIR BANNED.

Importation and Transportation

of Deadly Disease Carriers

Will Be Prohibited.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 19.—The health of that portion of the masculine population which does not wear full beards and mustaches but tend to their personal adornment by the use of the razor in their own hands, or in those of a barber, must be protected from exposure to the deadly disease of anthrax, the house today decided when it passed a bill to exclude from importation into this country or transportation in interstate commerce shaving brushes made of horse hair.

While in sympathy with the bill based on testimony of government scientists that the deadly disease of anthrax frequently was transmitted to human beings through horse-hair shaving brushes, Representative White, republican, Kansas, rubbing his bald pate, suggested that there were many persons with a thick growth of hair upon their heads who also should be protected from the peril in that quarter, and he therefore asked that the prohibition be extended to hair brushes made of horse hair. This was done.

ROAD TO WOODLAND BAD

Many Autoists After Leaving

Ferry Encounter Mud.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 19.—(Special.)—The Pekin ferry across the Lewis river between Clarke and Cowlitz counties, on the Pacific highway detour, is operating again, but the road from the ferry to Woodland is almost impassable.

Sunday was an unusually busy day at the ferry, more than 500 cars being ferried across, many of them driven by tourists and fishermen. But when they got out of sight of the ferry they went into the mud above their axles. Tourists are advised to go by way of the Rainier or Goble ferries until fall, when the Pacific highway will be paved from here to Kalama.

VETERAN, 76, SUICIDE

D. E. Stanton's Body Is Found

Hanging in Chicken House.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 19.—(Special.)—D. E. Stanton, 76, civil war veteran and member of Canby post, Grand Army of the Republic, was found hanging by his neck from a beam in a chicken house. The body was discovered by his widow.

The aged veteran suffered a nervous breakdown a year ago, when he was placed for a time in the eastern Oregon hospital at Pendleton. Two daughters, Mrs. Lawrence Puddy and Mrs. Wallace Boddy, both of the upper Hood river valley, and two sons, George and Samuel Stanton, survive.

Women Fight Brush Fire.

BEND, Or., June 19.—(Special.)—A brush fire which had spread to an area of almost an acre was extinguished yesterday near Fall River by Mrs. Emma U. Broderick and Mrs. E. Pearl. Working alone and with out tools, the two women scraped with their shoes and with sticks until they had dragged the brush a line about the fire which it could not jump.

NEW STRIKE PARLEY
TO BE HELD TODAYConference Is Arranged by
Mayor Baker.

UNION RECEDES SOME

List of Concessions Handed to

Chief Executive of City—Em-

ployers Are Silent.

Arrangements for a conference between members of the striking longshoremen's union and the waterfront employers' committee, when the latter body will consider the strikers' latest proposals for peace, were completed yesterday by Mayor Baker.

The conference will be held at 10 o'clock this morning at 613 Oregon building.

Yesterday a union committee composed of F. E. Buchtmann, E. G. Erikson, R. M. Clark, Harvey Holston and A. E. Barnes appeared in Mayor Baker's office and presented a list of concessions that the union men are ready to make so as to end the waterfront strike and lockout.

After going over the list, Mayor Baker declared them to be fair and said that he would immediately ask a committee of the waterfront employers to meet him in his office.

Chance of Success Seen.
The employers would make no statement other than that they had agreed. It was admitted on both sides that there seemed to be some chance of successful negotiation.

The committee representing the longshoremen's union was appointed only recently and this was its initial attempt to resume negotiations. In submitting its proposals the committee authorized Mayor Baker to present them to the employers as a basis for the resumption of negotiations.

"We believe that this offer, conceived in a spirit of conciliation, is obviously so fair as to warrant acceptance by the employers," members of the committee said.

Proposals Made Public.

The proposals were as follows:

1. The wage scale as formulated by the state conciling board and heretofore agreed to by both parties is to prevail, with the exception of the scale for trucking and wheel-handling and these items to be further considered in conference.

2. The waterfront employers to exercise the option of hiring such men as they desire and the list system heretofore in vogue to be abolished by the longshoremen.

3. The waterfront employers to maintain such hiring halls as they desire for the employment of non-union workers.

4. The waterfront employers not to be compelled to deal directly with union headquarters but, if desired, through a clearing house or bureau to be maintained in an up-town office building under neutral management and the expense to be borne jointly, the function of such bureau to be the transmission of orders for workers to union headquarters, thereby obviating direct dealing with said union.

Registration Is Settled.
3. Members of the Longshoremen's union not to be required to register in any hiring hall maintained and operated by the waterfront employers.

6. Members of the Longshoremen's union not to be furnished or furnished against by reason of any overt acts committed or charged to have been committed by them in the progress of the strike and lockout.

Believing that in the name of justice and fair play and for the future prosperity and progress of Portland the grievances, real or imaginary, now or heretofore existing between the waterfront employers and the Longshoremen's union, should be adjusted, he, therefore, requests you to convene for a conference between the organizations interested, so that a speedy and equitable settlement may be made. Bankruptcy Petition Denied.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—The United States circuit court of appeals today denied the petition of Theodore Arenz to be released from bankruptcy. The Astoria Savings bank opposed Arenz' petition.

A plea for a "new sense of civic responsibility in matters of international concord," in the United States, as the most certain basis of promoting peace in the world, was made by Secretary Hughes.

"Sound public opinion is most necessary to support the nation's peaceful diplomatic aims," he said. "It must grow on the constant efforts to suspicion, distrust, and hatred. There can be no assurance of peace, and few of the necessary and just settlements which make for peace, in a world of hate."

"It should be recognized that what is more necessary than formulas is a new sense of civic responsibility in matters of international concern. The chief enemies of peace are those who constantly indulge in the abuse of foreign peoples and their governments, who asperse their motives and visit them with ridicule and insult."

"Intercommunication is so easy that domestic discussions of foreign affairs are not confined within the three-mile limit, but are immediately published abroad as indicative not of the sentiment of particular individuals, who may be little relative consequence, but as indicating the sentiments of our people. It is in this way that peoples become separated by mutual distrust, even

NEWBERG, Or., June 19.—(Special.)—The contest for queen of the Berrians closed here Saturday night in whirlwind finish. A parade was held during the evening to attract attention to the contest and drew out a large crowd. The streets were lined with people all evening and the votes were counted and results posted at 15-minute intervals. The final count was made at 10 o'clock and Miss Evah Hadley was chosen queen by a vote of more than 33,000, while her nearest competitor, Miss Eleanor Bassett, had more than 22,000 votes.

A committee accompanied Miss Hadley to Portland today to arrange all matters pertaining to her gown and hotel suite, and other details. The contest brought the Berrians nearly \$500, and after paying expenses of the contest and the queen's expenses the remainder will go toward paying for the band uniforms.
