

DALLAS ELECTORS VOTE EXTRA LEVY

First Unit of High School
Gymnasium Assured.

BUDGET WINS APPROVAL

School Election Hottest One Held
in Years—Oscar Hayter Is
Re-elected Director.

DALLAS, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—By a vote of 89 to 92 at the annual school election Monday, the district budget, carrying with it an extra levy of \$4500 for the first unit of a high school gymnasium, was adopted. It was the hottest school election held here for several years.

Oscar Hayter, local attorney, was re-elected director with little opposition, although an eleven-hour movement was started to write in the name of Glen DeHaven, a farmer, leader of the forces opposed to adoption of the budget. Mr. DeHaven received 21 votes.

BOARDMAN ELECTION CLOSE

Farmer Wins in School Contest by
Five Votes.

BOARDMAN, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The annual school meeting was held in the school auditorium Monday. The report of the auditor showed a reduction in cost per pupil for high school instruction from \$230 to \$160 per year, due in part to increased attendance and in part to the fact that the salary charge was divided because two of the teachers did part time work for the grades in manual training and domestic science.

The vote for a director for three years was close. The candidates were Lee Moad, station agent at Messner, and W. H. Glibreth, farmer on the east side. Glibreth won by five votes. L. V. Root was chosen clerk.

The meeting went on record as favoring the placing of a radio outfit in the auditorium for school and community use.

FOSSIL SCHOOL DEBT PAID

Director and Clerk Re-elected at
Annual Meeting.

FOSSIL, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The annual meeting for the purpose of electing a director and clerk for school district No. 21 was held here Monday afternoon. O. Parker was re-elected a member of the board. Scott Sasser was re-elected clerk.

In addition to meeting current expenses of the year the board has paid off a \$3500 bonded indebtedness, which dated back to 1906, when the present school building was erected.

A resolution asking that an expert be employed to examine the building and report as to whether it is safe and adopted. If it is found to be unsafe steps are to be taken at once to make it so before the opening of the next term of school.

La Grande Man Re-elected.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—At the annual school election in the district comprising the city of La Grande J. A. Russell was re-elected for another term. Mr. Russell has served on the board several terms and for the past year was chairman of the board. He received 49 votes, while on two ballots other names were written in, he being the only avowed candidate. The other votes were for C. B. Miller and C. Humphreys.

Estacada Has Election.

ESTACADA, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The annual school meeting was held Monday night. F. G. Robley, director and chairman of the school board, was re-elected for a term of three years, there being no other nominations. Mrs. Myrtle Bellis was also re-elected as clerk. Another special election is called for July 7 to elect a director to fill the unexpired term of George B. Weatherly, who is removing to California.

Clerk and Director Stay.

SCAPPOOSE, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The annual school meeting of district No. 1 for the election of director and clerk was held Monday at the Scappoose high school. Charles Koutek, who has served for three terms, was the retiring director. He has served the school district for the last nine years. Mrs. Charles Gerlach, the retiring clerk, has held that position for two years. Both were unanimously re-elected.

5 INDICTED AT ASTORIA

ONE NOT TRUE BILL IS RETURNED BY GRAND JURY.

Recommendation Is Made That
County Court Exercise Control
Over Dance Halls.

ASTORIA, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The circuit court grand jury this evening returned five indictments as well as one not true bill. One of the indictments was secret. The defendants and the charges against each in the other indictments were: Charlie Sing, alias Louis, a Hip Sing tong man, charged with murder for killing Seid You, a member of the Bing Kung Bow Leong tong; Dale Arthur, charged with larceny in stealing money from T. Thigris; Arthur Anderson charged with sodomy and Robert Drake charged with assault with intent to

rob. Drake is the man who attempted to rob the Knappa State bank at Knappa recently and was captured after a revolver duel. The not true bill was in the case against Wong Kow, a member of the Bing Kung Bow Leong tong, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon on Ah Quong, a Hip Sing tong man. In its report the grand jury recommended that the state automobile department be asked to revoke the licenses of all persons found guilty of operating motor vehicles while intoxicated, that the county court exercise control over all dance halls outside incorporated towns and forbid dancing after 1 o'clock at night, that fences be constructed at dangerous curves on the Warren-ton-Flavel road and that all rooming houses and hotels be compelled to comply strictly with the law requiring registry of tenants.

MR. SHULL IS CHAIRMAN

ELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD
HEAD UNANIMOUS.

Meeting of Directors Harmonious
One—Committees Named by
New Executive.

Frank L. Shull was elected chairman of the school board last night to succeed A. C. Newell, defeated at the recent school election by F. S. Pickering. Mr. Shull was nominated by Director Woodward and his election was unanimous.

Although rumors were afloat before the meeting that some action might be taken toward removing R. H. Thomas from his position as school clerk, there was no discussion, or even intimation, of such a move at the meeting. The directors acted in perfect harmony on all questions.

The following committees were appointed by chairman Shull: Education, W. J. H. Clark and George B. Thomas; business, J. E. Martin and F. S. Pickering; property, George P. Eisman and W. F. Woodward.

The \$3,000,000 bond issue matter was referred to the committee on education and superintendent of schools for determination of interest and denomination. It was decided that the corporation laying for the new Roosevelt high school in St. Johns should be held under the auspices of the grand lodge, A. F. and A. M., Saturday at 2:30 o'clock. Director Woodward will be the speaker and Captain George S. Edmondstone, superintendent of properties, will represent the grand master of the lodge.

E. H. Whitney, assistant superintendent of schools, was selected as delegate to the National Education association convention, to be held in Boston July 1-8.

EX-PASTOR DENIES BIGAMY CHARGE

Underworld Folk Are Kinder
Than Church Crowd, Plaintiff.

COMPANION IS SILENT

Woman Said to Have Helped Un-
fringed Minister Wants to
See Attorney.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 21.—Although credited with having eliminated segregated districts from several California cities, Rev. Donald D. Stewart, held in the county jail here facing charges of committing bigamy in four states and fleeing a quartet of wives out of thousands of dollars, declared today that he found the men and women of the underworld have greater hearts and were more charitable to him than the members of his own church.

"I have gone down and down from the time that I was unfrocked in Oakland in 1914," Stewart said. "Men and women of the underworld of the disreputable and despised strata of life, were kinder and more charitable to me than members of the church whose worship I had led. Not one of my flock stood by me in my trouble. I was alone. But there came messages of encouragement and friendly regard from the underworld and I have learned that those of the underworld have the greater hearts."

Charges Are Denied.

Stewart denied the charges of bigamy which have been made against him. He also denied that Mrs. Ethel Turner Osbaldeston, taken into custody with him, and who, it was alleged, posed as his sister, and arranged Stewart's marriages, was guilty of any wrong. Mrs. Osbaldeston denied she had done any wrong but refused to make a statement until she had consulted her attorney.

Ordained as a minister in Edinburgh, Scotland, Stewart is said to have conducted pastorates in Paterson, N. J.; Sanderson, Tex.; Douglas, Ariz.; Chico, Calif.; and Hayward, Cal., near Oakland. He first came to public attention in California, according to Everett C. Driggs, assistant superintendent of a private detective agency which made the arrests, when Mrs. Maude Hendricks was said to have killed herself at Hayward Dec. 30, 1914, when Stewart, said then to be known as Browne, refused to marry her.

Charge Is Dismissed.

He is said to have been arrested charged with a statutory offense in connection with this affair, but the charge was dismissed because of lack of evidence.

At Chico Stewart was said to have conducted a temperance campaign. He there wrote the song, "Well Make California Dry."

He is wanted on charges of bigamy in Boston, Indianapolis, New York and Detroit, Driggs declared.

STEWART WANTED IN EAST

Mrs. Osbaldeston Said to Have
Made Complaint.

NEW YORK, June 21.—The Rev. Donald D. Stewart, temperance worker, held in Los Angeles with Mrs. Ethel Turner Osbaldeston on a charge of being fugitives from justice from Boston, where Stewart is under indictment for polygamy, grand larceny and conspiracy, is wanted here by the police for bigamy.

Stewart was indicted here in November, 1929, on the complaint of Mrs. Osbaldeston, who was alleged to have posed as his sister and aided in some of the bigamous marriages of which he is accused.

In 1918 Stewart married Mary Barbara James of Mount Carmel, Pa., in Wilmington, Del., according to private detectives who investigated his career. After bringing his wife to New York he was said to have suddenly disappeared. Two months later he returned and again lived with her. Shortly afterward Stewart was alleged to have told her that a woman, "Ethel M. Turner Osbaldeston," had entered his life, and his wife went with him to Detroit, where the detectives said he later deserted her.

March 6, 1929, the operatives alleged Stewart married Mrs. Osbaldeston in New York. In 1921, according to the detectives, Stewart married Bertha Ellen Granis in Indianapolis and was declared to have deserted his third wife in Detroit a short time later.

Returning to his second wife, Mrs. Osbaldeston, he went with her to Boston, it was charged. There she

became his "sister, Miss Jane McGregor," the detectives alleged. The police say she was instrumental in bringing about the marriage of Stewart to Norma Ehrenreiter.

Records of the church show Stewart to have been stationed in Texas in 1911, and in southern Arizona in 1912 and 1913.

Fraud Also Charged.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 21.—The capture of Donald D. Stewart, near Sierra Madre, Cal., ends a search conducted since July, 1921, after it was charged by the police that Stewart had defrauded the Aetna Savings & Trust company of Indianapolis of \$1250 and deserted Bertha Ellen Granis of this city, whom he married here February, 1921. According to authorities he also defrauded Bruce Granis, a brother of his Indianapolis wife, of \$1200, and sold a car belonging to another brother.

LIQUOR IN DIVORCE SUIT

WIFE SAYS SHE HAD TO PAY
FINES OF HUSBAND.

Complaint Is Made That Spouse
Was Involved in Bootlegging
and Other Failures.

Allegation that her husband has been "an amateur bootlegger, barber and lothario," was contained in the complaint filed in circuit court yesterday by Enid Smith, seeking divorce from W. C. Smith. Two of the husband's attempts at bootlegging are said to have caused Mrs. Smith no little trouble and expense.

Her complaint alleges that in August, 1930, while they were in Canada on a visit, Smith took her automobile and "started bootlegging operations" between Canada and Great Falls and Kalispell, Mont. Upon his arrest and conviction she alleges it was necessary for her to pay \$400 to recover the car. She further says that when the Portland police officers found liquor in their home at 889 Halsey street last April she put up \$200 for him, which he has never repaid.

The wife affirms that she has three times set Smith up in business, the last time in a barber shop, lunchroom, cigar and confectionery establishment on Sandy boulevard. She asks that this place be decreed her property, that she be declared sole owner of other property and alimony of \$100 a month be allowed her.

Other divorce suits filed were those by Marie C. against Melvin H. Davis and Grace against W. Wade Brooks.

BATHING FUND HELD UP

ORDINANCE IS REFERRED TO
COMMISSIONER PIER.

Contract With Concessionaire at
Peninsula Park Declared to
Bar City Competition.

Ordinances providing for the creation of a rotary account of \$1500, for purchase of bathing suits, the fixing of rates for rental of suits to patrons of Peninsula park, and an ordinance calling for bids for laundering suits and towels, introduced by City Commissioner Pier yesterday, were referred to him for further consideration.

City Commissioner Mann called attention to the fact that the concessionaire at Peninsula park had a contract for the rental of bathing suits, and maintained that it would not be fair or legal for the city to engage in the same business.

The tax supervision and conservation commission at its session last fall eliminated appropriations for the purchase of bathing suits and towels from the budget.

This made it impossible for the city to continue free towel and bathing suit service, and Commissioner Pier proposed a rental system whereby the service might be made self-supporting. However, in view of the contract existing between the city and the concessionaire, it is probable that the rental of bathing suits will be handled by a private agency.

DAMAGE SUIT SETTLED

State and County Ordered to

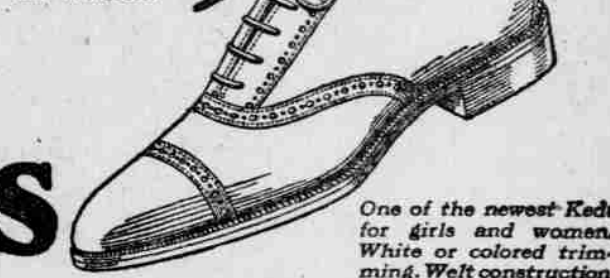
