The trim little vessel, the most carefully constructed and thoroughly equipped metor yacht ever launched here, slid smoothly down the ways and into the sound, where she floated gracefully for a few moments. Then, her motor humming, she backed under her own power out of the cradie in which she was launched and made a short trial spin down the bay. Little Miss Caroline Schmidt christened the yacht.


