

BATTLESHIP SCENE OF MERRY AFFAIR

Admiral Chase Host at Im-
pressive Reception.

SURPRISES GIVEN GUESTS

Queen Harriet of Rosaria and
Court Honored; Quarterdeck
In Riot of Color.

At a novel and impressive ceremony yesterday afternoon Rear-Admiral J. V. Chase, commanding the war craft in harbor, presented Queen Harriet of Rosaria with the "queen's flag" and a miniature of his own flag. The presentation was a surprise feature of the reception and tea given on the battleship Connecticut by the officers of the fleet in appreciation of Portland's hospitality during the Rose Festival.

The "queen's flag" was the emblem that flew from the flagpole when her majesty's barge steamed into the harbor to rule over Rosaria. In presenting the replica of the admiral's insignia, Admiral Chase said that he wished to emphasize his appreciation of gracious Portland as represented by her queen.

Bugle Sounds Attention.
One pleasant surprise followed another in rapid succession. On the quarterdeck, over which a canopy had been spread and which was tastefully decorated with flags, bunting and flowers, the dancing was swinging merrily along, summer dresses blending harmoniously with the blue and gold of the naval uniform—when suddenly the naval band, which had been playing "The Star-Spangled Banner," changed to "The Star-Spangled Banner," and the dancing proceeded but little further when the bugle again sounded its abrupt warning and again the dancing ceased, the officers leaving their partners to stand at attention as Admiral Henry T. Mayo and his heavily gold-laced staff came upon the quarterdeck, and the dancing resumed.

Deck Riot of Color.

If the junior officers had their dances interrupted by their seniors, the superior officers entering the scene of festivities, the two distinguished sea fighters were no exception either, for the bugle stopped to position to receive their brother in arms of the land forces of Uncle Sam—Brigadier-General Richard W. Blatchford and his aide.

Within a very short time the quarterdeck of the Connecticut was a riot of color. The dancers were enjoying themselves to the utmost, and the picture cameras were clicking, recording on the celluloid strip the gay scene.

Boatload after boatload continued to arrive, followed by an officer's steamer bearing Queen Harriet and her court. Again the bugle sounded and all the officers lined up to pay homage to the queen.

All told, the affair was one of the most brilliant Portland has ever witnessed. The guests of honor were Queen Harriet of Rosaria, princess, army and navy dignitaries, Mayor and Mrs. George L. Baker, Eric V. Hauser, who presided over the festival, and Admiral Blatchford, who was in charge of the queen's festivities, and a host of other interesting persons helped to make it a big and magnificent affair.

Ship Sails Today.

Bidding farewell to Portland, the battleship Connecticut is to get under way at 10 o'clock this morning and steam for sea after having been in the river since a week ago Sunday. The destroyer division, numbering seven vessels, will remain until the latter part of the week, and were yesterday shifted from the lower part of the harbor to Astoria dock, just below the Steel bridge on the west side, where they are to be open to visitors the same as since their arrival.

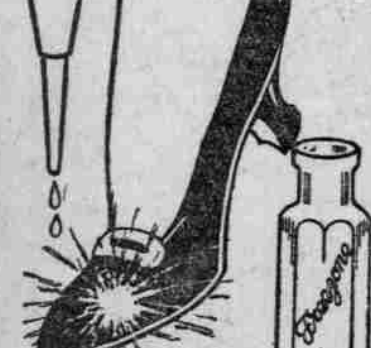

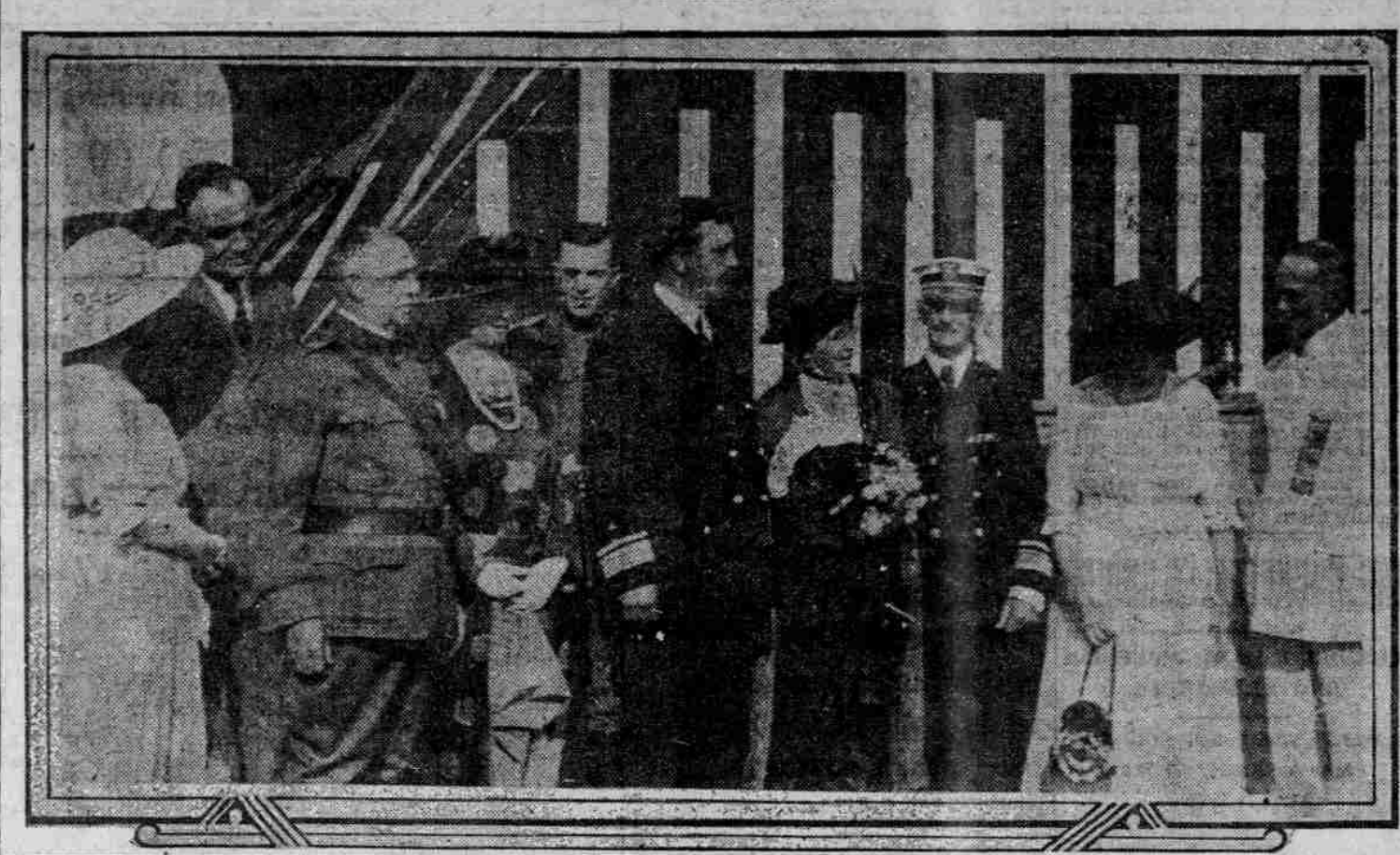

MASONS BEGIN BUILDING

KENTON LODGE WILL HAVE
MODERN NEW HOME.

Two-Story Structure of Brick and
Stone Under Way and Will
Cost \$35,000.

Construction of the \$35,000 building which will house the Kenton Masonic lodge has begun. The new building is being erected at the southeast corner of Denver avenue and Kilpatrick street and will be two stories high, of brick and stone, the first floor to be for stores, while the lodgerooms will be on the second floor.

The excavation work for the basement will be completed soon and it is expected that the cornerstones will be laid within about four weeks. The building will contain a basement and main floor. On the second floor, in addition to the lodgeroom, there will be several reception and lounging rooms and a room for women. The kitchen and dining hall will be on the main floor.

The building will be 50 feet by 105 feet in dimensions and is being constructed by Christian Spies. The building committee of the lodge is made up of John Hamilton, chairman; J. C. O'Brien, L. C. Wilkinson and Mr. Spies. Orlo R. W. Hossack is the architect.

Kenton lodge was organized in June, 1911, and has a membership of 200. This will be its first permanent home, the members having used a leased lodgeroom just across the street from their new location since the founding of the lodge.

L. A. Whitcomb is worshipful master; Carl H. Oswald, S. W.; S. T. Rainey, J. W.; J. C. O'Brien, treasurer, and R. B. Headley, secretary. The new building is expected to be ready for occupancy within five months.

COURT DOCKET, BIG ONE

MORE THAN 500 CASES NOW
AWAITING TRIAL.

Number Cited as Evidence of
Need of More Judges; Outside
Jurists Often Called In.

In the calling of the circuit court docket yesterday by Presiding Judge Tucker, 185 cases were set for trial in September. These are only part of the equity cases awaiting trial, the total exceeding 500. No criminal cases were set for hearing yesterday. These will be scheduled as presented from the office of District Attorney Myers.

The large number of cases remaining to be called is pointed to as proof of the need for more circuit judges. At times as many as three circuit judges from outside districts have been here assisting the six Multnomah county judges in efforts to clear the calendar. At present Judge Phelps of Pendleton is the only outside judge hearing cases in this county.

The six months' term of Judge Tucker as presiding head of the circuit court will expire July 1. The honor then falls automatically to Judge Stapleton.

Vacations of the judges will begin July 1. During July and August the circuit judges alternate as presiding judge for periods of two weeks each. In this capacity they will hold court each Wednesday to hear ex-parte matters, motions and default divorce actions.

BODY OF SAILOR FOUND

W. D. Harris Is Believed to Have
Fallen Overboard.

The body of W. D. Harris, a second-class fireman on the United States destroyer Pruden, was recovered from the Willamette river north of Broadway bridge yesterday afternoon by City Grappler Brady. Harris had been missing since Thursday. He is believed to have slipped from the Fuller, which was tied at the Pacific Coal company docks. First reports were to the effect that the dead sailor was John W. Forbes, who has been missing from the destroyer Chauncey since Friday. The fact that Forbes was missing gave rise to the supposition, until the body was identified as that of Harris. Officers expressed the belief last night that Forbes might have deserted, as he did once before.

Harris was the second sailor of the fleet to die in the local harbor. H. B. Conrad, boatswain's mate on the U. S. S. Connecticut, was drowned as he fell into the river during the Rose Festival water parade Tuesday.

SUIT FOR \$25,000 FAILS

Action Against Doctor for Removal
of Uvula Dismissed.

Non-suit was ordered yesterday in the suit of E. M. Potts against Dr. Gustave E. Bruer, seeking \$25,000 damages because the physician removed the plaintiff's uvula, or soft palate, at the same time his tonsils were taken out. This portion of the operation was alleged to have been without the knowledge or consent of the plaintiff.

Circuit Judge Stapleton, before whom the case was tried, yesterday morning sustained the non-suit motion of Dr. Bruer's attorneys. However, he consented to continue the suit if expert testimony were introduced by the plaintiff. Dr. H. E. Schlegel was put on the stand by the plaintiff and testified as to effects of removal of the uvula. At the conclusion of his testimony the motion for non-suit was renewed. The judge again sustained the motion and dismissed the case.

Tourist Reaches Crater Lake.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., June 26.—(Special.)—The first tourist to reach Crater Lake this year is Frank W. Hudson of Oakland, Cal., who reached the rim yesterday through deep snow drifts, according to a telephone message today from Fort Klamath. Hudson probably will receive the silver loving cup offered by local business men, through the chamber of commerce, for the first out-of-state tourist to reach the lake via The Dalles-California highway.

Klamath Falls Sells Road Bonds.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., June 26.—(Special.)—The county court today awarded the \$400,000 road bond issue, half of the amount recently appropriated for highway construction, to the Anglo-London-Paris National bank of San Francisco. Contract for the installation of approximately four miles of additional water mains for this city was let by the California-Oregon Power company to Al Graham, local contractor. Graham's bid was approximately \$22,000.

MILITARY BURIAL TODAY

SERVICES FOR EX-MARINE
DROWNED AT OREGON CITY.

American Legion Post Arranges
for Funeral for William Col-
lier; No Relatives Known.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 26.—(Special.)—William Collier, ex-sea-

man, formerly a corporal in the marines during the world war, whose body was found in the Willamette river Friday morning, will be given a full military burial in Mountain View cemetery here tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Willamette Falls post, American Legion, of this city is arranging for the service and will have charge. Rev. H. G. Edgar, pastor of the Presbyterian church, and also an ex-serviceman, will deliver the prayer. Collier's body will be from the American Legion.
