HOSPITAL FUND IS CRITICISED.

Because of an increased assessment of 25 cents a month for railway hospital dues required from employees of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company after July 1, employees are considering a complaint and request for readjustment of the hospital fund. This latest addition to hospital fees makes it necessary for each employee of the company to pay \$2 annually into that fund. It is said that the hospital revenues became depleted and the added tax was made necessary, although the order is far from popular with employees, who had nothing to say in regard to the fixing of hospital dues.

JURY AWARDS \$9615 DAMAGES—Damages of \$9615 were allowed J. E. Pulkraab by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Gatens yesterday afternoon, at the conclusion of a trial which has occupied a month in which the plaintiff sought to establish a damage claim of approximately \$25,000 against the Bankers' mortgage corporation, owner of a sawmill purchased by Pulkraab. The mill was at Sherwood, Or., and on purchase was to have been moved to White Salmon, Wash., according to the plaintiff, who contended that the delay of the defendant in moving the plant was responsible for a heavy loss in orders.

BUILDING FUND CAMPAIGN BEGUN—A building project for St. Michael and All Angels' Episcopal church at East Broadway and East Forty-third street, is under consideration and a campaign to raise a \$50,000 building fund has been launched. The proposed buildings include, in addition to the new edifice, a new rectory and parish house. Dean Vincent is chairman of the building fund and Frank C. Jackson, director. Rev. T. P. Bowen is vicar of the mission and the proposed new buildings will be a memorial to the late Bishop Charles Scadding, founder of the church.

RAILWAY SPENDS \$7,000,000—New freight and passenger equipment of value of \$7,000,000 has been ordered by the Washburn railroad, according to word received by the office of J. E. Holton, general agent at Seattle. The purchase of new cars is in addition to the recent order of 2000 new refrigerator cars, costing \$5,000,000, by the American Refrigerator Transit company, which is to be shipped through Pacific refrigerator line. In carrying out its order for rolling stock, it is anticipated large use of northwest lumber will be made.

SALEM EX-RESIDENTS TO PICNIC—All ex-residents of Salem will gather at Laurelhurst park Saturday, July 1, for the annual Salem picnic. The ex-residents of the capital city have perfected an organization in Portland which for several years has sponsored the annual get-together of ex-Salemites. A programme has been arranged to begin at 4 o'clock and at 5:30 the basket lunches will be opened. In the evening the business session of the organization will be held and officers elected.

WORLD CONVENTION SOUGHT—Plans for a possible world's Christian Endeavor convention in Portland in 1925 will be discussed at a meeting to be held in the Hotel Oregon, Friday at 12:15. The Christian Endeavor societies of Portland are facing the problem of providing a \$15,000 guarantee in order to bring the convention here. About \$2500 of this amount will come from the registration of Oregon delegates. Business men and civic organizations will be asked to pledge practically all the rest.

KIWANIS PLAN PICNIC—The Kiwanis club of Portland will hold a joint picnic with the Kiwanis club of Astoria some time this month, according to action taken at the club luncheon yesterday. The Salem Kiwanis club also is expected to attend. The Portland club will not meet next Tuesday, July 4. At the next meeting, the delegates to the international convention, held in Toronto last week, will report. Alfred A. Aya spoke yesterday on "The Rubber Industry in Its Relation to the Northwest."

JOINT DEBATE TO BE HELD—A joint discussion by representatives of the Oregon single tax league and the non-partisan league will feature the programme at a picnic to be held under the auspices of the non-partisan league at Silverton Saturday afternoon. The subject for debate is: "Resolved, That the single tax constitutional amendment now before the people of Oregon is to be preferred to the tentative programme and tactics of the non-partisan league."

COOS PICNIC PLANNED—Residents, present and past, of Coos county, will gather for their second annual picnic at Braden's Grove, near Hubbard, Or., on the Fourth of July. Everybody will bring victuals, but arrangements are being made by Dr. Chester L. Bender, president of the association, to have coffee served to the picnickers. A programme is being planned. NIPPON RAILROADER COMING.

How western railroads will look to east-ern eyes can perhaps be learned from Shinji Otsuki, Japanese railroad official, after he completes his visit to Portland and his inspection of railroad properties here next fall. Otsuki is scheduled to be in Portland September 2, 3 and 4. During those days railroad officials in the Portland offices expect to show the Japanese railroader a thing or two and promise to explain the whole works to him. In his own home town, Tokio, Otsuki is assistant passenger traffic manager of government railroads.

MEN NEEDED IN HAYFIELDS—Although hay is ready for cutting in the Bend county, laborers are few, according to a call sent to the state chamber of commerce headquarters here yesterday by the Bend Commercial club. It was said that a labor shortage exists in that country and that 35 to 50 men will be needed in the hayfields during the next two weeks, while there will be other work for 60 days or longer. The Bend Commercial club advised that \$2.50 a day and board would be paid hay hands who are able to do the work.

FREIGHT RATES TO BE CUT—Reductions in transcontinental freight rates will be announced by the Southern Pacific company in certain commodities as soon as supplies can be issued to existing tariffs. Rates on tea imported through Pacific coast ports will be cut, both in carload and less than carload lots, and on canned pineapple when destined to Toronto, Ontario, and Montreal, Quebec, and common points. The latter reduction will apply on both imports and domestic traffic when originating at or imported through Pacific coast terminals.

SAILOR HELD AS DEPORTER—Futami Harutsuki, Japanese, was arrested yesterday charged with having deserted the Japanese steamer Rozan Maru at Astoria. He was held by immigration officials until arrangements for his deportation can be completed. Warrant for deportation of Jacob Daster, inmate of the Oregon insane asylum, has been received. Daster, native of Switzerland, was said to have entered this country a year ago. Later he came to Oregon and is now a public charge.

DANCE CARNIVAL TONIGHT—To defray a portion of the expense of sending the octet of the Women's A. C. club to the national convention, Los Angeles, a dance carnival will be held tonight on the Bluebird. The Portland delegation was sent to Los Angeles to advertise Portland. While the major portion of the expenses of the trip will be borne by the Portland club, it is hoped that the dance will pay a small share.

OSBORNE ASKS NEW TRIAL—Motion for a new trial for Harvey E. Osborne, found guilty recently in federal court on a charge of white slavery, was filed with the United States district clerk yesterday. Insufficiency of evidence and errors in the original trial are alleged.

CITY AUTO CAMP POPULAR

FAME OF MUNICIPAL CENTER FOR TOURISTS SPREADS.

Records for May Show Gratifying Increase in Number of Cars and Visitors Registered.

The fame of Portland's municipal auto camp evidently has reached many tourists, for the attendance for May of this year shows a big increase over that of May, 1921. Total for the number of machines in 1921 was 419 and this year 629 cars have been registered. Last year 1214 persons were counted for the month of May and 1922 for the same month shows that 1772 visitors enjoyed the privilege of the camp. Superintendent Keyser of the bureau of parks has kept close touch with the camp that the increased number of guests and motorists might be as adequately accommodated as those of last year. Expansion of the camp has come readily, fitting in with plans made before the camp was established, which provided for growth of the enterprise.

Funds received from the camp during May of this year total \$675, and last year \$143 was received from registration fees. This promises to show greater relative increase than May, and reports will be made up by the bureau of parks next week.

AUTO SIGNS CRITICISED

Columbia Highway For Hire Machine Advertising Held Deceiving.

Complaint is being made that the for-hire cars which bear signs advertising the Columbia highway trip. These cars advertise trips for \$3 and up. The people who take the \$3 ride get as far as Crown Point and do not traverse the real highway, the \$4 trips take passengers to Multnomah falls. Tourists who get as far as Crown Point return little impressed with the highway, thinking that they have seen it. John B. Yorn, state highway commissioner, suggests that some power in authority should deal with the situation and that people who take the \$3 and \$4 rides should be informed just what they are to get on those trips, with the explanation to visitors as to the extent of the highway and the various points of interest which should be seen.
