

COLORADO GUARD IS CALLED OUT

Burning Mine Property Causes Mobilization.

MORE ORDERS AWAITED

Martial Law Not to Be Established in Mine Fields Unless Opposition Is Encountered.

DENVER, Colo., June 29.—Nine companies of the Colorado national guard were ordered to mobilize tonight in seven cities and towns of the state, following the burning of two railroad bridges and the damaging of mines in northern and southern Colorado coal fields last night and early today.

The orders for the mobilization of the guard and for the recruiting of the state ranger force from its present strength of 50 men to a total strength of approximately 400 were issued late today by Colonel Patrick J. Hamrock, state adjutant-general, following a conference with Governor Oliver H. Shoup.

General Receives Reports. First reports of the burning of bridges and mines in the coal fields were received at the adjutant-general's office this morning. Within an hour Governor Shoup, who had been at his home in Colorado Springs, was on his way to Denver. In less than half an hour after the conference between the governor and the adjutant-general, telephonic orders were being dispatched to commanding officers of the various guard units.

Steel helmets to equip the organizations mobilized were ordered shipped from Denver tonight. These helmets were received recently from the United States government.

"My orders from the governor are to preserve order in the state of Colorado and to protect life and property," Colonel Hamrock said in a statement issued tonight. "The mobilization of the national guard is a preventive measure against any violence or trouble. Martial law will not be declared unless violence is resorted to by the enemies of law and order."

"We do not expect any opposition to law and order from the rank and file of the Colorado miners. They are law-abiding citizens, but troops of radicals have drifted into the state during recent months and it is these radicals who are making preventive measures necessary."

Property Damaged in Night. The principal disturbances which led up to the events of today occurred near Walsenburg in Huerfano county, in the southern Colorado coal field. Two railroad bridges, one near the Ideal mine of the Colorado Fuel & Iron company and the other at the Rouse mine of the same company, were burned last night and early this morning.

Four miles of the Colorado Fuel & Iron company have been cut off from railroad communication by the burning of the bridges. In addition the tipple of the Stella May mine, a small property near Walsenburg, was fired during the night and was partially destroyed.

One outbreak was reported from the northern Colorado coal fields. The pump was torn from the Red Ash mine at Louisville, in Boulder county, and water pipes leading into the mine were broken.

Reports late today from both Huerfano and Boulder counties stated that quiet had prevailed during the day. County authorities expressed confidence that they would be able to handle the situation without help of state troops.

FILM COLONY IS SCORED

SENATOR MEYERS DEMANDS ACTION ON CENSORSHIP.

Montanan Declares Free Love and Debauchery Exist at Hollywood, California.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—Senator Myers, democrat, Montana, appealed in the senate today for action on his bill proposing a censorship and investigation of the motion picture industry and its products, declaring that "free love, dissipation, debauchery and drunkenness" exist in the motion picture colony at Hollywood, Cal.

The Montana senator in the course of an attack on the industry which accompanied his appeal for action declared it was his opinion that W. H. Hays, ex-postmaster-general, was employed by the industry to prevent imposition of a federal censorship.

Mr. Myers read an Associated Press dispatch telling of a promise made by Mr. Hays yesterday in a speech before the convention of the general federation of women's clubs at Chautauque, N. Y., to "cleanse movies at their source."

The senator said he favored such action, but believed it should be effected "in the form of official censorship."

"I am afraid the dollar mark will be the censor unless we are ever-acted providing official censorship," said Senator Myers. He lauded the purpose Mr. Hays explained in the address yesterday, but said it "looks like Mr. Hays was employed to prevent censorship."

"There is a powerful movement for official censorship," Senator Myers continued, "that is bound to grow, because it is needed and is a good thing."

Reports that the public was opposed to censorship were denied by the senator, who asserted the belief that the "people who want official censorship will not let the movement be stifled by promises of voluntary reforms."

Senator Myers referred to a number of events, including "the Ar-buckle case" and "the Taylor murder," and declared there "were many which involved the motion pictures and actors."

The recent murder of a man in Washington by four youths, he said, was no doubt inspired by "ideas of romance and crime obtained from motion pictures."

NON-PARTISANS CLAIM DEFEAT OF SENATOR.

Returns From Rural Districts Expected to Overcome Lead of Incumbent.

green of support essential to make him a winner. As McCumber's opponent, Frazier, is the non-partisan league candidate, it would have been expected to follow that McCumber would have had the hearty support of all conservative republicans, and all others to whom the non-partisan league is anathema. But this was not the case. McCumber can be classified justly as a conservative republican. But in the fierce fighting between the two factions in North Dakota, he failed to make his antagonism to the non-partisan league sufficiently conspicuous and whole-hearted to suit the other conservative leaders.

Where a fight is as bitter and as prolonged as the contest between the non-partisan league and its opponents in North Dakota, it was hardly possible for anyone to keep clear of it successfully. The sentiment "whoever is not completely with us, is against us" was rampant. McCumber was charged, not with identifying himself with the non-partisan league, but with failure to help wholeheartedly in various efforts to crush it. As a result, McCumber failed to receive wholehearted support from the only faction upon which he had any reason to depend.

There is some ground for suspecting that the conservative element in North Dakota expects to make its real fight against the non-partisan league, not in the present primary, but in the election afterwards.

The man who has received the democratic nomination, O'Connor, is satisfactory to the conservative elements generally in the state. In Washington it is conceded that McCumber's defeat will be interpreted as a blow at the conservative wing of the republican party in the national sense and to the republican tariff, to which McCumber's name is attached.

Many of the conservative republican leaders feel that while McCumber has been prevailing with them, he has not always "played the game" with entire satisfaction. Just recently he pushed his personal business measure in a way and at a time that has openly embarrassed the other republican leaders. Also, he was the most avowedly pro-league of nations republican in the entire senate.

The defeat of McCumber would, of course, remove him as chairman of the committee on finance. In that position he would be succeeded, under the seniority rule, by Senator Smoot, who would be more satisfactory in that position to the conservative business element of the country generally than McCumber.

McCUMBER FEARS DEFEAT

Rural Vote Held Likely to Overcome Lead Over Frazier.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Senator McCumber, republican, North Dakota, said late today that, on the basis of early returns from the North Dakota primary he appeared to be defeated.

"Apparently the early lead given me will be overcome when returns come in from the country precincts," said the senator. He added that he was not discouraged.

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Red Chief Home From Capital. HOQUIAM, Wash., June 29.—(Special.)—Chief Billy Mason of the Quinault Indian reservation returned this week from Washington, D. C., where he conferred with officials of the Indian bureau relative to matters of importance to the Indians. Senator Potlaster introduced him at the bureau's offices, he said.

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BIG CATCHES REPORTED

RUN OF BLUEBACKS IN COLUMBIA PHENOMENAL.

Gillnetters Make Enormous Hauls and Wheels Are Scooping Fish In by Tons.

ASTORIA, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—By far the largest run of bluebacks in the history of the Columbia river fisheries has been on during the last week, and good catches of that class of fish are still reported.

More than 90 tons of bluebacks were delivered at the local packing plant in one day this week. The catch of chinooks continues slack, and is not expected to improve materially until after the freshest substitutes, as the chinooks will not enter the river while the water is so impregnated with the alkali now coming downstream.

Advices received this morning say the gillnetters operating with small-mesh gear in the upper Columbia have been making daily catches of from 1200 to 1500 pounds of bluebacks per boat, while the wheels are scooping them in by the ton. Last night one gillnetter, drifting between Rainier and Kalama, caught 1900 pounds.

Farther down the stream the catch has not been as large. This is accounted for by the fact that the river is wide, permitting the fish to scatter, and the further fact that in the deeper channels the bluebacks swim close to the bottom in order to escape the alkali in the water, and thus escape under the nets.

WIFE WRECKS EVIDENCE

Moonshine Containers Smashed After Husband's Arrest.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 29.—(Special.)—When Frank Cornelius, deputy sheriff, was talking to W. H. Buhlman, whom he had arrested near Camas, today, Mrs. Buhlman got a hammer and began breaking the jars and bottles containing four and one-half gallons of moonshine. Cornelius made a dash for Mrs. Buhlman, who kept smashing the containers until the hammer became disengaged from the handle and soared into space. The officer was successful in saving only a pint of the whisky, which will be used as evidence.

Mrs. Buhlman also was arrested.

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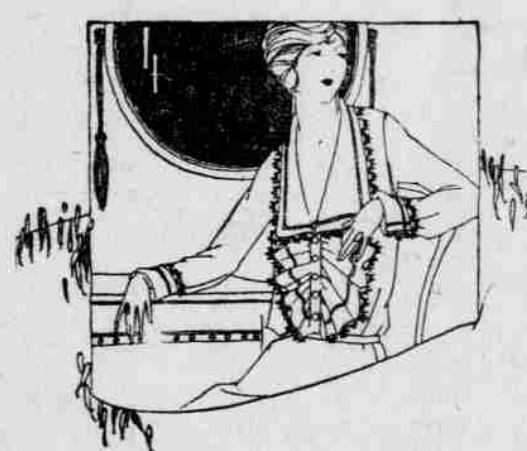
