I drove in and got the gas and tried to act natural, so they wouldn't suspect me. The man didn't say anything—he just looked hard at me.

"I got to Albany and went through the town I thought of a place where I used to go swimming, and drove across the bridge of the Willamette. But I couldn't get down there. I drove out onto a dock back at town, but it was torn up. I had to go some place, and started through the town. Then I thought of the Calapooia, and I went there. Somehow I got the sack out of the car. I tried to roll it under the rail, but it wouldn't go, so I stepped over the rail and pulled it over the side of the bridge.

"I had to wash. I was all over blood. I couldn't go home so I went to the hotel.

Later, Hecker said, Bowker proposed that instead of buying liquor, Hecker's friend had they should hold up the man, take the entire 30 cases and drive away. Hecker said he objected. "I had arranged to sell the whiskey and I didn't think it was right to try and take it."

"It means \$1200 or \$1400 to you, and he can't do anything with this gun in his face," said Bowker.

Threat Is Alleged. "I didn't want to, and after we turned and started back to Portland, Bowker noticed I had turned the light away which had been intended to signal my friend.

"Hecker, what are you doing, trying to double-cross me?" Bowker said.

"No," I told him. "Hecker, you little —, you are double-crossing me," Bowker shouted. "I'll kill you," and he grabbed his gun.

RUSSIANS DECIDE ON PRIVATE DEALS

Negotiations Begun After New Clash at Hague.

BRITISH DELEGATE MET

Chief of Association of Creditors Meets Litvinoff in Conference on Oil Lands.

THE HAGUE, June 30.—(Special Cable.)—After another conflict between Russia and the rest of the world in the property sub-commission Friday, Maxim Litvinoff, chief soviet delegate, decided to complete a swift series of private negotiations while the conference was still in session.

The first of these, involving \$300,000,000, was attempted with Leslie Urquhart, a British delegate and head of the Association of British Creditors of Russia. Urquhart's organization claims the mining and oil regions of the Ural mountains.

He and Litvinoff had a short conference today, and they hope to settle individual differences. That the Russians believe in this method was demonstrated at Rapallo. Litvinoff proposes to negotiate the American claims in the same manner.

PARIS YIELDS TO TUNISIA

MORE LIBERAL POLITICAL CHARTER IS ASSURED.

Anti-French Demonstrations Are Responsible for Liberalizing of Administrative System.

PARIS, June 30.—(Special Cable.)—Following the recent agitation in Tunisia, it is now announced that France is preparing a new political charter for her protectorate in North Africa. Although the regime proposed still will leave Tunisia a considerably less favorable position than that enjoyed by Egypt and Algeria, it will give her a stronger voice in her own affairs than at present.

The Tunisian assembly, as now constituted, includes French and native members, the latter not being elected but nominated by the French administration. It is not certain that the new charter will satisfy the aspirations of the Tunisians, whose anti-French demonstrations became serious some time ago, although efforts were made to suppress news of them here.

The abdication of the Bey of Tunis was discussed and many agitators were expelled from Tunis before the French government promised to endow the protectorate with a more liberal regime.
