

HILLSBORO DRESSED UP

FESTIVE ATTIRE PUT ON FOR
FETE OPENING TODAY.Four-Day Fourth of July Celebration Will Be Biggest Ever,
It Is Declared.

Hillsboro will be in festive and patriotic colors today, ready for the opening of a four-day Fourth of July celebration, the biggest, according to O. Phelps, of any held there in 30 years' municipal observance of Independence day. The celebration starts at 10 o'clock this morning, and will be held in the Hillsboro city park.

In connection with the patriotic celebration, the pioneers of Yamhill, Washington and Multnomah counties will hold their annual reunion, and the whole countryside is expected to turn out for a revival of community and rural friendship.

For the afternoons and evenings vaudeville programmes, baseball and other games have been arranged. Dances will be held in the Hillsboro auditorium, and four different musical organizations will assist in the entertainment. They are the Elks' band from McMinnville, the Hillsboro military band, the Portland Scottish bagpipe band and the state G. A. R. fife and drum corps.

The vaudeville performances will be given by De Kohls' aerial globe rollers, Cortelli's dogs and acrobats, and Joe LeStrange, who will make a triple drop balloon ascension. These three troupes will give daily performances.

At 9:30 o'clock on Tuesday morning a parade of patriotic and fraternal organizations will be held. This will be followed by a patriotic ceremony in the park, at which Dr. L. W. Hyde, ex-state commander of the Spanish war veterans, will be the principal speaker. The committee in charge, O. Phelps, F. L. Austin and A. H. Rasmussen, has arranged for ten acres of parking space adjoining the park.

PARTY OF MASONS HERE

MOST OF 167 ARE PENNSYLVANIA RAIL EMPLOYEES.

Visitors Will Be Taken on Tour
of City Beginning at 8:30
o'Clock This Morning.

One hundred and sixty-seven Masons, the majority associated with the Pennsylvania railway system, reached Portland late yesterday afternoon over the Southern Pacific lines.

The party is in charge of James C. Agnew, a Pennsylvania railway official. The party will meet in Portland by Mayor Baker, William H. Galvani, Ed Shearer and Dave Segar.

The entire party will be taken on a tour of the city beginning at 8:30 o'clock this morning, and at 9:30 o'clock automobiles furnished by Al Kader temple of the Shrine and Masons of the city will leave the Imperial hotel for a trip over the Columbia river highway. Luncheon will be served at Eagle Creek.

The Pennsylvania party left Philadelphia on June 18 and will be home about July 8. After leaving Philadelphia, stops were made at Chicago, Denver, Colorado Springs, Salt Lake, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Leaving Portland, the party will stop at Spokane and then go to the Glacier National park, then to Minneapolis and thence directly home.

BROKEN LEG CAUSES SUIT

\$256 Damages Asked as Result
of Auto Injury to Boy.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Mrs. Nina Taylor has brought suit against Garfield Schwartz for \$256 and costs, for injuries received by her 9-year-old son, Samuel Taylor, who was struck by an automobile owned and driven by Schwartz, while the lad was crossing the Abernethy bridge in the northern part of the city on May 25.

In the complaint the plaintiff says that the child stepped behind a parked car, and that Schwartz recklessly and carelessly failed to have his car under control and ran into the child, causing injuries. The boy's leg was broken.

WELFARE AID IS BARRED

Provisions of Sheppard-Towner
Act Cannot Be Accepted.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—Governor Hart today explained that having no authority from the legislature to accept the provisions of the Sheppard-Towner act, he could not comply with the numerous requests from parent-teacher associations throughout the state in this matter.

He called attention to the fact, however, that this lack of authority does not prevent the state from receiving the appropriation for this year, as the appropriation will not lapse until June, 1923.

Secor, Boyd Finalists.

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., June 30.—J. B. Secor of Williams and A. P. Boyd of Dartmouth will fight it out tomorrow for the individual championship of the intercollegiate golf association in the 36-hole final of the links of the Garden City Golf club. Both won their way to the finals this afternoon by defeating Harvard rivals in the semi-finals brackets, Boyd downing D. A. Williams four up and three to play, while Secor took the measure of Durham Jones in a close match 2 and 1.

KLAN ANSWERS ACTION

CANDIDATE DECLARED TO
HAVE SOUGHT MEMBERSHIP.

Kleagle, in Reply to \$25,000
Damage Suit, Says Aspirant
Is Seeking Notoriety.

MEDFORD, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Answers to the action of Benjamin F. Lindas, attorney of Medford, who brought suit recently in circuit court for \$25,000 for alleged damages as the result of an affidavit alleging that Mr. Lindas sought but was denied admission into the Ku Klux Klan here, were filed today in circuit court by John Jefferys, attorney of Portland, acting for the organization, and H. E. Griffiths, one of its liegions stationed in this city.

Interest in this case is further enhanced by the fact that late yesterday Mr. Lindas, who has been a bitter foe of the local Klan for months past, announced his formal candidacy for mayor.

Mr. Griffiths in his answer asserts that the "affidavit was and is true," and further alleges that Mr. Lindas "seeks public notoriety" in filing the suit and also "political power and

prestige among the opponents of the Ku Klux Klan."

The Ku Klux Klan, as an organization, filed a short answer, stating that the seat of the order is at Atlanta, Ga., and that there is no branch in this county, hence no legal action is possible except in Georgia.

It has long been common talk here that Mr. Lindas intended to run for mayor at the fall election, hence when his nominating petition, signed by 30 citizens, and platform were filed the action created no surprise. He is the first candidate to aspire for the mayoralty to succeed Mayor Gates, who many months ago announced that he would not seek nor accept a re-election.

SIGHT OF CORPSE FATAL

Woman Swoons and Dies After
Gazing on Body of Sister.

SAN JOSE, Cal., June 30.—When Mrs. Andrew Sosa gazed upon the body of her dead sister, reposing in a casket at a Mountain View undertaking parlor last night, she fell swooning into the arms of her nephew standing at her side and died a few moments later.

Her dead sister was Mrs. Guadalupe Hopkinson, member of one of the old Spanish families in the Santa Clara valley.
