

ST. LOUIS BROWNS STILL HOLD LEAD

New York, Chicago and Detroit Close Behind.

YANKEES TAKE SLUMP

With Giants Leading in National, Chief Interest Centers on American League.

NEW YORK, July 2.—With the New York Giants still having the National league race well in hand, despite valiant but fruitless efforts by St. Louis and Brooklyn to overtake them, chief interest in the majors is centering on the spectacular pennant hunt in the American circuit in which four contenders are battling around the top.

The St. Louis Browns, who have shown no signs of withdrawing under the strain of pre-seasoning, held a lead of two and a half games today, but three other clubs—New York, Chicago and Detroit—are bunched close behind. Experts concede the Browns and the Yankees greater reserve power for the drive down the stretch, but either of the other two western contenders, on present form, has at least a fighting chance.

Yankees Take Slump.
Closing the last week with an old time burst of slugging, Babe Ruth and his teammates gave further proof that they are recovering from a protracted slump. With a record of 11 won and 14 lost on a disastrous trip around the circuit the Yankees braced against Washington and Philadelphia and today scored their fourth straight victory.

The Chicago White Sox, with their pitchers in rare form, proved the sensation of the race, however, running their winning streak to eight games and displacing Detroit in third place.

Good pitching, especially by Walter Johnson who hung up his third straight shut out and the 37th of his major league career, was responsible for an improved showing by Washington, while Cleveland, after taking two from the Browns, proved easy for the leaders, who made it four straight today.

First division teams all displayed winning form in the National league, the Giants retaining a lead of four and a half games today after double victories on the part of both St. Louis and Brooklyn, while New Yorkers were idle.

Cincinnati Still Fourth.
Cincinnati kept fourth place by a slim margin over Pittsburgh and Chicago, despite a double setback at the hands of the Cardinals. The Pirates may break as a result of a managerial shift; George Gibson resigning last week because of the team's disappointing showing and being replaced by Bill McKechnie, his ex-assistant.

The Chicago Cubs have slumped as a result of erratic pitching while Philadelphia and Boston clubs in both circuits are battling to keep out of last place.

HUNTINGTON, DURNO GIVING INSTRUCTION AT EUGENE.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 2.—(Special.)—Oregon athletic instructors, Shy Huntington in football and Edwin R. Durno in basketball, are drilling classes aggregating 21 men in the coaching of football and basketball. These men, most of whom will be coaches in Oregon high schools next school year, are taking classwork in the rules and fine points of the game, and besides are doing several hours a week of actual field and floor work. Later in the term W. Hayward, Oregon's track coach, will have charge of a class in track and field sports.

Huntington is passing along to the high school mentors some of the pointers which first Besdek and later he himself used, Durno when in college was recognized as one of the fastest and cleverest forwards ever seen in action.

NINE DRIVERS QUALIFY

AVERAGE SPEED ON TACOMA TRACK 103 MILES AN HOUR.

Two Minor Accidents Mar Event. Wonderlick Smashes Car and Wilcox Takes Fire.

TACOMA, Wash., July 2.—(Special.)—Nine of the 12 drivers entered for the Tacoma speedway races here Tuesday, July 4, qualified for positions this afternoon at an average speed of 103 miles an hour, shattering all previous speedway records for qualification tests. Jimmy Murphy, present American champion, lowered his record for the track of last Thursday at a speed of 109 miles an hour.

Other drivers to qualify in the order named were Harry Hartz, Tommy Milton, Cliff Durant, Roscoe Scales, Joe Thomas, Frank Elliott, Howdy Wilcox and Art Klein. Eddie Hearn, Jerry Wonderlick and Bennett Hill have not qualified and will take the last positions in the lineup at the start Tuesday.

Two minor accidents marred the event today. Wonderlick, driving his fast Duesenberg, careened into a curve at more than 100 miles an hour, spun around three times and crashed into the guard rail. The crowd arose with a cry and when the dust cleared away the plucky pilot calmly climbed from his machine and surveyed the wreckage. A crumpled tail and a bent steering post was what he found.

Howdy Wilcox provided the ac-

ond thrill when his car burst into a cloud of smoke near the spot of Wonderlick's accident. For a moment it was thought the entire car was in flames. The damage was slight and the car rolled to the pit under its own power. Both Wonderlick and Wilcox will not be barred from the race because of these mishaps.

For the first time in the history of the American speedway a complete radio broadcasting station installed at the track will broadcast the news of the race lap by lap.

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JOBS EASY TO GET, SAYS CITY OFFICER

Unemployment Declared at End in Oregon.

MORE WORKERS NEEDED

"Down-and-Outers" Alleged to Be Only Ones Unable to Find Chance for Labor.

What has become of unemployment? was a new question which came to light yesterday through a discussion of the problem with which the berry growers around Brooks, Gervais and Salem find themselves confronted. When loganberries were seen to be ripening to the picking stage, calls were sent to Portland for pickers and the response has been negligible.

The berries and who will pick them constitute a comparatively minor feature. The fruit is ripening fast and the canneries are ready to open, but there are no pickers. Also, there are no unemployed, according to Arthur W. Jones, director of the municipal employment bureau.

Work Declared Piffling.
Mr. Jones said that for the past month or six weeks unemployment had been practically normal; that is, everybody who wants work has it, and the habitually unemployed are the only ones not working.

"These are the 50-per-centers," Mr. Jones said. "They are the men and women who would not work anyway—the inefficient, the economic burdens."

Business Better Generally.
"When this major portion of labor is at work, the other 50 per cent of the workers are drawn into the working mill through the increased demand for more men if they could get them, and this factor is largely the reason for the elimination of the unemployment bugaboo."

Lumber and agriculture supply work for 65 per cent of Oregon's population, and both of these industries are at their very peak right now.

The ex-rabbi also related his thrilling experiences when, he escaped from the bolsheviks after all his family, except one son, were killed.

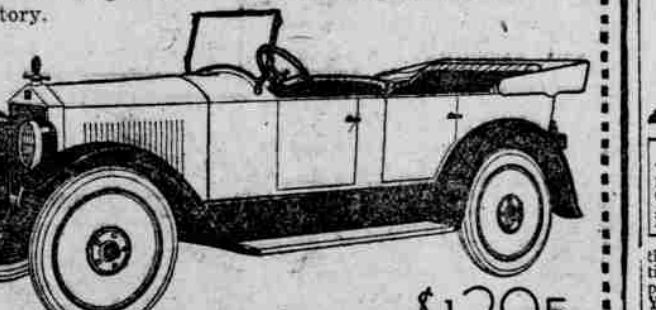
