

GERMANY FACING
FINANCIAL RUINNext Paper Issue Expected
to Destroy Exchange.

OLD TROUBLES APPEAR

Method of Settlement of Near
East Problem Again Reaches
Acute Stage.

LONDON, July 4.—(Special Cable.)
—The two most important questions
which have been for months the
chief sources of contention between
the British and French governments
appear again to be reaching an
acute stage.

The first of these is German repara-
tions and how they are to be paid.
The second is the method of settle-
ment of the crucial near-east prob-
lem.

The reparations commission is
now in Germany to make an invest-
igation, the final report of which
will be laid before the allies when
they meet here in conference at the
end of July.

Germany Near Collapse.
According to reports which
reached the government today from
Berlin, it is believed Germany is
rapidly nearing a financial collapse,
which will reduce her economically
to the level of Poland or Austria.

According to the report, which has
greatly impressed the British gov-
ernment, it is said to be absolutely
essential that Germany be granted
a reparation loan or that there be a
revision of the portion schedule.

It was said that although Ger-
many might be able to make a
July payment of 50,000,000 gold
marks, it would be possible only if
she gets the printing presses going
on another huge issue of paper
marks, which will send down Ger-
man exchange to the vanishing point.

Before any action is taken there
is an inclination here to wait until
the reparations commission reports.
But it is also believed officials here
want to wait the result of the
French finance commission's visit
to America, when an attempt will
probably be made to get the Ameri-
can government to reduce or cancel
the French debt to America in ex-
change for an equal reduction of
German reparations.

Near East Situation Worried.
The near eastern situation has
suddenly taken a decided turn for
the worse as a result of the French
government making an 11th-hour
decision that as the allies are still
technically at war with Turkey they
are not entitled to send a commis-
sion into Anatolia to investigate
reports of Turkish atrocities.

There was a belief here tonight
in official quarters that the whole
commission project, which was
originally planned by the British,
will fall through.

France was said to have agreed to
be represented on the commission
by reports on Greek atrocities. This
qualification was accepted by the
British after much delay. America
finally agreed to send a commis-
sioner, but the French have upset
the whole plan, ostensibly on what is
considered a flimsy pretext, but in
view of her secret desire to keep
the Kemalists there little doubt as
to why she is really anxious to in-
vestigate the reported Kemal atrocities.

The impending London conference,
therefore promises to be one of far-
reaching importance. It is under-
stood that some of the questions
will take place at Chequers, Premier
Lloyd George's residence in Buck-
inghamshire.

wanted George got them, too.

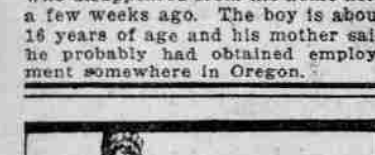
TWINS HELD IN JAIL

VETERANS TO GO FREE

WISCONSIN GOVERNOR WILLS
PARDON MEN IN JAIL.Broken Promises of Government
Blamed for Fact That ex-
Soldiers Are in Prison.

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 4.—Governor
Blaine of Wisconsin announced in
an address here today that he
would extend executive clemency to
every man in Wisconsin prisons
"who can trace his plight, directly
or indirectly, to causes arising out
of the service to his country."

"No partisan considerations, no
attempts at intimidation by po-
litical enemies, will drive me from
that purpose," Governor Blaine
said.

"Executive clemency has been
granted to 25 ex-service men and
denied to none," he continued.

"In those cases where I have
granted a pardon I have found that
all of these boys had a clean rec-
ord."

Governor Blaine charged that the
broken promises of the government,
the stupidity of public officials who
should have anticipated the present
condition and the selfishness of
those who seek privileges from the
government are responsible for the
imprisonment of the large number
of ex-service men who, he says, are
in jail.

"There was plenty of money in
the public treasury to pay war con-
tractors," he said. "Plenty of money
to pay pure graft, plenty of money
to pay the swivel-chair patriots—
in fact, there were millions for every
purpose that smacked of graft or
profiteering and nothing for the sol-
dier boy but prison walls and pov-
erty or privation."

"When I can take these boys out
of prison and put them in civilian
clothes, then I will be satisfied," he
said.

said, he found her dead, while near
her body was a bottle which had
contained poison.

"There is no law which we can
use in stopping this menace, and I
believe a statute should go on the
books which would compel anyone
learning to drive to get a permit
and then get a driver's license
within 15 days," said Sheriff Long
after a law enforcement conference
at which the subject was discussed.

"There are girls here who have been
learning to drive for a year,"
"Spooners on our highways are
endangering lives. A fellow takes
out a girl and, under the pretense
he is teaching her to drive, gets his
arm around her. Some of the girls
permit this stuff to go on and they
never get a driver's license. As a
matter of fact the boy isn't thinking
about driving."

"And when we ask if the girl has
a driver's license she says she is
learning," concluded the sheriff.

REGIONS Present Budget.

Then the Russians presented a
budget to show their willingness to

tinue on a basis of false figures.
Apparently the only way out is
for an inventory of the situation to
go to Moscow and see for itself."

It has already been told that the
allies plan to move the Hague ex-

If the allies, instead of getting down
to business want to wrangle, we'll
wait. We are willing to give all the
information we have."

HEAVY JOLT GIVEN
THE HAGUE PARLEYRussians Are Wrathful and
Allies Are Furious.

MEETING AT STANDSTILL

Soviet Accused of Withholding
Information and Attempt-
ing to Gain Favors.

THE HAGUE, July 4.—(Special Cable.)—The conference was jolted
to a practical standstill today. The
Russians are wrathful because at
the meetings of the sub-commissions
on debts and property the allies
refused to give the information
they demanded on claims. The al-
lies are furious at the character of
the information furnished by the
Russians.

The best symposium of the day's
developments was given to me in in-
terviews I obtained exclusively with
M. Alphand, French chairman of the
sub-commission on debts, and
Maxim Litvinoff, chief of the soviet
delegates.

Mr. Alphand said: "There is no
use continuing if the Russians in-
sist on giving us dreams instead of
facts."

Litvinoff said: "The allies refuse
to give us information. This only
means that the possibility of a set-
tlement is postponed still further."

General Principle First.
In effect the allies reverted to the
principles of Genoa. They refused,
as M. Alphand said, to extend credits
before the Russians announce the
status of the allies' claims, and how
they are going to be settled.

The allies refused to take up in-
dividual cases, but want the general
principle of settlement established
first.

The crash came today when the
Russians insisted on knowing the
names of all the claimants, includ-
ing their social positions and profes-
sion.

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FILM SHOWS BODY
OF PRETTY WOMANStartling Discovery Made by
Photographer.

CANYON SEARCH MADE

Officers Visiting Scene of Sup-
posed Murder Fail to Find
Trace of Body Pictured.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 4.—
Through search of Topanga can-
yon, 25 miles northwest of here, to-
day failed to bring to light the body
of a woman revealed in the fore-
ground of a photograph developed
last night by B. W. Anderson from
a negative exposed by him several
weeks ago. The search was con-
ducted by squads of police officers
and citizens.

On developing the film negative
Anderson found that the body of a
woman lying under a tree among
the undergrowth was clearly out-
lined in the photograph, according
to his story to the police here last
night. The face of the body was
indefinite, but the dress was
mutilated. The photograph showed
a black streak running from the
mouth along the woman's face.
When on the trip neither Anderson
nor his friends saw the body, they
told the police.

Anderson, in his story to the po-
lice, said he and two friends, B. S.
Gross of Redondo Beach, and Wal-
ter Emory of Inglewood, two
months ago were hiking in the
canyon about a mile past Cooper's
ranch, some distance from the road,
when Anderson stopped and took
several snapshots of his friends in
different poses. The hike continued
and the film was placed in his kit
to remain forgotten until last eve-
ning, when he developed them.

To his surprise, he noted the body
of a woman partially clad lying be-
neath a mesquite bush in one corner
of the film. Thinking possibly the
film had, by some freak of photo-
graphy, created the image of a
woman, he quickly developed six
other prints. All showed the woman
clearly. The face is that of a pretty
woman and the features appear to
be those of a Greek or Latin na-
tionality.

Anderson immediately rushed to
the University police station and
told his story. Sergeant Combs
with five other officers and Ander-
son, immediately went to the canyon
on an effort to locate the body. The
police found the spot described by
Anderson after a six hours search,
but due to the thick undergrowth
and the darkness in which they were
forced to work the body was not
found. The police abandoned the
search until 8 o'clock this morning,
when a second party undertook to
locate the body.

Police said the pictures indicated
that the dead woman was probably
the victim of a brutal attack and
had been dragged to the spot where
the photographs disclosed it.

Pease in China Likely

Leaders of South Main Headway
Toward Agreement.

CANTON, China, July 4.—(By the
Associated Press.)—Probability of a
reconciliation and peaceful settle-
ment of their differences by Sun
Yat-sen, president of the South
China republic, and Chen Chung-
Ming, the military leader who de-
posed him, was reported to be
brighter than at any time during
the past two weeks.

General Ngai Beng-Ping, com-
mander of the Third division of the
Canton army, is reported to be
for and it was understood that he
has paved the way for a concrete
proposal which will bring the two
southern chieftains together as an
other step in the general programme
to reunite all China.

The only recent sign of disorder
in the Canton region was a bomb
explosion today in Shekpi, four
miles from the city, which wrecked
the railroad and blocked
traffic between Canton and Hong-
kong.

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
