AUTOIST GETS 100 DAYS

RECKLESS DRIVER ASSESSED \$100 FOR BRIDGE CRASH.

Judge Says Law Is More Lenient to Intoxicated Persons Than to Others in Motorcars.

A person addicted to reckless driving always should get intoxicated before taking the wheel of an automobile if he wishes to escape adequate penalty for his crime was the advice of District Judge Deich yesterday as he gave a maximum punishment of 100 days in jail and \$100 fine in the county jail to Ralph Almetre and regretted he could do no more. Almetre was arrested by Motorcycle Deputy Lamont Sunday after his machine had collided with another driven by Harry Clayton on the interstate bridge fill, carrying both through the fence and over the embankment.

"The legislature in its wisdom seems to have provided protection for drunken auto drivers," commented Judge Deich. "As the law reads, the sensible thing for an automobile driver to do, if he wants immunity, is to get drunk. A person arrested for reckless driving is subject to a fine of \$400 and a year in jail, but the worst a drunken driver can get is 100 days in jail or a \$100 fine or both."

Occupants of the machines in the wreck were slightly cut and bruised. Clayton testified that there was liquor on the breath of Almetre and that C. A. McQuarrie, an occupant of Almetre's machine, had been drinking. Almetre admitted having had two drinks, but denied that he was intoxicated. McQuarrie was fined \$50 for being drunk. Almetre recently paid a fine for moonshining.

POSTMASTER IS ACCUSED.—OLIVER J. PIERCE, BROWNLEE, IS IN COUNTY JAIL. Prisoner, Accused of Stealing Federal Funds, Brought Here to Face Indictment.

Accused of misappropriating federal funds while serving as postmaster at Brownlee, Or., Oliver J. Pierce, 57, was placed in the county jail as a result of a secret indictment returned against him recently by the United States grand jury. Pierce was arrested Friday at Brownlee by Deputy United States Marshal Wells. A 60-mile overland trip to Baker followed. Pierce and his prisoner reaching Portland yesterday morning.

According to Deputy Wells, Pierce is one of the best-known residents of the district between Baker and the Idaho line. During the trip from Brownlee, a small station on the railroad branch out to the town, Pierce, though a prisoner, was treated with great respect by the people of the district. In the little town where he made his home Pierce was regarded as its leading citizen, being, in addition to postmaster, justice of the peace, storekeeper and unofficial banker.

De Valliere declares that he has, for some unknown reason, been receiving threats from unidentified individuals over the telephone, these persons insinuating that "they were going to get" him and also saying, "You know what happened to Director Taylor in Hollywood? Well, you are going to get the same—and you may get it this evening."

"Believe me," said De Valliere, "and that was the reason I did not attend the entertainment. I know that the entertainment committee would take care of things. And if for some unknown reason some enemy of mine wanted that opportunity to stage a scene I was not going to embarrass my friends and members of the club by being there. I was in touch with them during the evening. I have been conducting my business openly and above-board, and my books are open for investigation at any time."

Motor Licenses Net \$3,000,000.—OLYMPIA, Wash., July 10.—(Special.)—Motor vehicle license fees for the year today passed the \$3,000,000 mark, Fred J. Dibble, director of licenses, announced. Last year's total receipts were \$2,928,000. From present indications, Mr. Dibble said, the fees should run from \$350,000 to \$400,000 for the balance of the year, making the total for the biennium more than \$6,000,000. Applications for licenses are coming in faster this year than last and the department is issuing an average of 2500 pairs of plates each week.

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PLUMBERS TO BE BONDED.—WORK ON LATERAL SEWERS FOR HOUSES, IS REASON.

Faulty Work in Construction Is Declared to Be Cause of Plan to Protect Home Owners.

A plan to bond plumbers engaged in laying of house lateral sewers is under consideration by A. L. Barbur, commissioner of public works, because of the number of complaints which have reached the department recently over faulty work.

Under the proposed plan, the plumbers would have to file a two-year indemnity bond before they could construct lateral sewers, this bond to protect the property owners in case of defective work. A number of complaints have been made recently over faulty work in laying terra cotta laterals.

The terra cotta manufacturers say that the pipe was not defective, but that the trouble rested with faulty workmanship. Inasmuch as the city inspectors every lateral laid, Commissioner Barbur believes that the city is morally if not legally responsible to the householders to see that the work is satisfactory.

It was proposed at first to compel a water test for every lateral constructed, but the plumbers objected that this would cost so much that it would bring the price of the terra cotta laterals close to that of cast-iron laterals. In such a case, they said, they would use cast-iron pipe entirely, because of the possibility of leakage from the terra cotta pipe. Terra cotta manufacturers thereupon protested against such action, stating that the industry in the city virtually would be ruined should it be taken.

OSTEOPATHS VISIT CITY.—Delegates to Recent Convention Entertained in Portland.

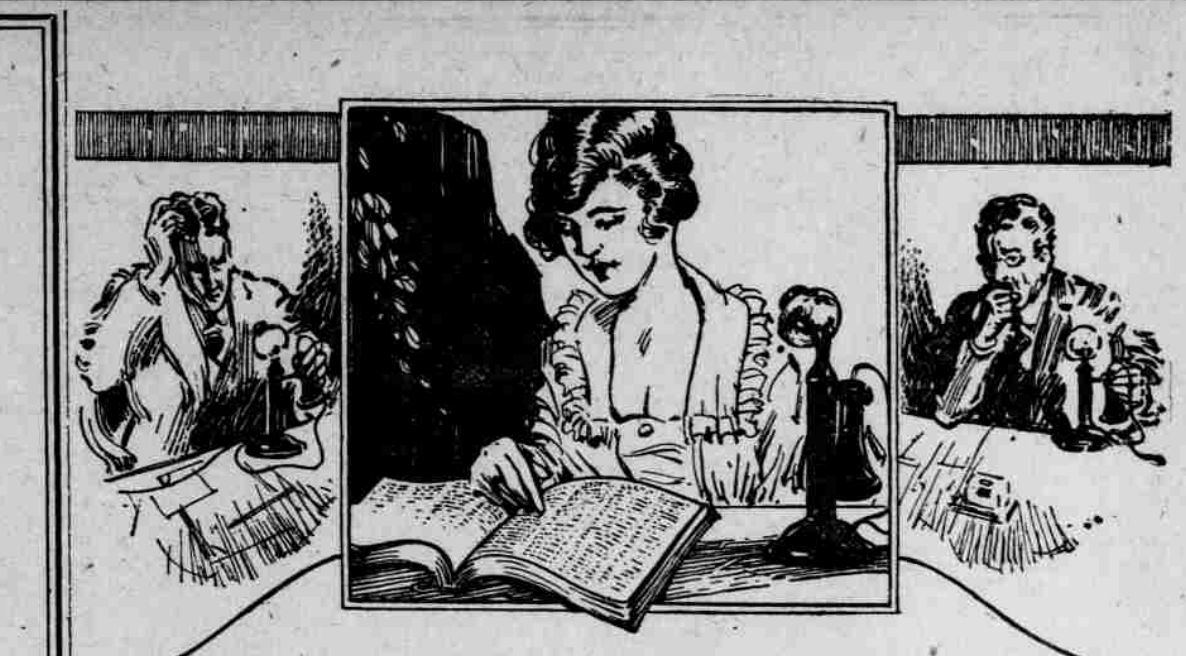

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FATHER FINDS SON'S BODY.—Young Man Drowned in Chehalis River July 4 Recovered.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 10.—(Special.)—The body of Arthur Sherman, who was drowned in the Chehalis river here July 4, was found at 6:55 o'clock yesterday afternoon within 15 feet of where he disappeared, by his father, Joseph M. Sherman, 822 Sixteenth avenue, Seattle.

Young Sherman was drowned when he slipped and fell into the river as he was crossing a boom of logs by his way to the seaplane M-17. He was 19 years old, a graduate of Franklin high school of Seattle and was employed as a draughtsman in the engineering department of the Boeing Airplane company of Seattle. He came to Aberdeen on the seaplane M-17 for a pleasure trip. He is survived by his father, mother, six sisters and three brothers, all of Seattle. The body was taken to Seattle this afternoon.
