TOURISTS TO LEARN OF OREGON.
 For the purpose of interesting tourists in the desirability of Oregon as a home, M. V. Andre, special representative of the Chamber of Commerce, has established an office at the Municipal auto camp, where he will supply information to persons in the camp. The work will be done in systematic fashion. Andre will list the names of persons interested in Oregon and their particular preferences. After they return to their homes, the Chamber of Commerce will follow up the work with correspondence. Mr. Andre, working in conjunction with the state tourist bureau, will be prepared to supply road maps, road information and other data regarding desirable camp grounds and vacation resorts.

Anyone in good physical condition may join the party, and those who are successful in finishing the climb are eligible to membership in the Mazamas.

SWIMMING POOL FOR GIRLS.—Campfire girls at Camp Namanu, on the Clackamas river, are to have the use of the large swimming pool on C. S. Jackson's estate, which has been donated to the girls. An expert swimming instructor will be in charge to teach beginners and to give a four weeks' course in first aid. The girls will be given an opportunity to gain special honors in swimming, diving and rescue work. The first group of girls will leave for camp tomorrow morning at 9 A. M. Saturday morning for Camp Namanu.

CLAMS PUT UNDER ARREST.—Amateur jockeysmiths had their inning in the United States district court yesterday when Marshal Holchicks received a solemn and formal order from the United States district court that he fare no more with the cases of adulterated clams. The order, couched in all of the legal dignified verbiage, left the official no discretion in the matter. "You are hereby commanded and enjoined that you forthwith arrest 192 cases of adulterated clams," the warrant read.

WOMAN GOES INTO BANKRUPTCY.—Listing her liabilities at \$160, all doctor and hospital bills, and her assets at \$25 worth of personal clothing, Olive Dunning filed a bankruptcy petition in the United States court yesterday, asking that she be relieved from financial and legal responsibility. Others who sought legal action to wipe out debts were J. C. Crandall, local contractor and A. L. Schultz, a farmer of Westport.

EX-POSTMASTER IS ARRAIGNED.—Oliver J. Pierce, ex-postmaster at Brownlee, Or., who has been indicted and arrested for charges of misappropriation of government funds, was arraigned before Judge Bean in the United States court yesterday. Pierce was given until Monday to enter a plea. A practice of paying personal bills with postal money orders which he was unable to make good, drew him into the trouble.

MILL OWNER FINED \$100.—M. B. Hull of Colton, Or., was arrested July 8 at Milk creek by Deputy Game Warden Means and McDaniel on a charge of allowing sawdust to settle in the creek. He was fined \$100 by Judge Noble at Oregon City on July 10. It is alleged that sawdust from Hull's mill was escaping into the creek, thus making the stream harmful for fish to feed in.

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WIFE WANTS EASY MONEY

FLOYD RUSSELL ASKS COURT FOR DIVORCE DECREE.

Railway Eating House Cook Says Spouse Naggd Him Out of Job and Smokes Cigarettes.

Floyd Russell, in a suit for divorce filed in the circuit court yesterday, asserts that his wife, Mrs. Russell, married in Vancouver, Wash., May 27, 1921, left him on June 26, 1932, with the declaration that "she was not for the money from then on and was going to get it in the easiest way." She admitted also having attended "booze parties" with other men, he says.

George A. Thomas, in a suit against Elta Thomas, married in Vancouver on October 3, 1920, complains that his wife nagged him out of a job as head cook of the railroad eating house at Huntington, Or., and since coming to Portland refuses to keep house, sitting about instead smoking cigarettes and using vulgar language. Thomas E. Read avers he has been abused in a divorce action filed yesterday. He charges Marie E. Read with throwing various household utensils at him, specifically with hurling a shoe at his head on July 6, 1932, with such good aim that it hit him on the head and clipped a piece from his ear. He was married in 1928.

Other divorce suits filed were: Minnie M. against Joseph E. Jones, J. N. against Viola Griffin and Maude A. against Grant King.

S. T. WOOSTER NOT IDENTIFIED AS ROBBER OF TAXI DRIVERS.

S. T. DOCK COMMITTEE NAMED

LOCAL MEN TO GET DATA ABOUT MERGER.

Personnel of Board Announced by S. M. Mears, Chairman of Foreign Trade Body.

Announcement of the personnel of a committee, which will conduct public hearings relative to the advisability of merging the commission of public docks with the Port of Portland commission was made yesterday by S. M. Mears, chairman of the foreign trade committee and the Chamber of Commerce. The following prominent local men will have charge of the hearings: A. L. Mills, chairman, W. B. Ayer, Ben Selling, Nathan Strauss and J. W. Ganong. The hearings will begin early in August.

The committee will be powerless to act in the proposed merging, but will attempt to gather information as to the benefits to be derived from such a union, and to gain a fair idea of public sentiment regarding the change. According to the terms of a law passed at the last legislature, the two commissions may merge if they see fit. The union is not mandatory. A time limit for such action was placed in the bill setting December 31, 1932, as the last day for the merging.

The committee headed by Mr. Mills will invite all persons interested in the plan to appear and give their reasons for or against the merger. The purpose of the meetings will be simply to determine public sentiment and to outline a course dictated by economic considerations. Some time ago the chamber as a whole advocated the merger, but for fear that public sentiment might have changed it was decided to reopen the question to general discussion.
