The judge was lenient with her on the ground that she was supporting a 16-year-old daughter and apparently was in poor circumstances. She pleaded to court that she had made the beer for her own consumption.

ARMED STRIKEBREAKER FINED—Byron Burley, employed in the Albina shops, was fined \$20 and sent to jail for 30 days yesterday by Municipal Judge Ekwall on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. He was caught early yesterday after he had flourished a revolver at William Dawson, a railroad shop-worker, who is now on strike picket duty. Burley was employed as a strike-breaker.

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OPTION PURPOSE PUZZLE

PROPERTY OWNERS DECLARE NEGOTIATIONS ARE ON.

Realty Dealers and Railroad Men Speculate on Probable Use of East-Side Area.

Assertions of property owners along the west side of East First street that Claude D. Starr, realty dealer and one of the chief owners of the Sovereign Apartment Hotel company, has obtained options on their property and agreed to close the deals shortly continued to cause speculation among real estate and railroad men yesterday as to what use might be made of the property if the purchase is made. Mr. Starr has steadfastly refused to make any statement.

It is evident from the options obtained that it is planned to secure property along the First street frontage from points near Burnside street practically to Hawthorne avenue. Reports yesterday were that the options had been definitely obtained on a half block of the Ladd Estate Company between East Oak and East Pine street on the west side of East First street and also a half block of the Weinhard estate between East Main and East Madison streets on East First street. The other options are reported on property between these two at intervals, most of them being between East Morrison streets and the Ladd estate holdings on East Pine and Oak.

The fact that the property obtained was along the tracks of the Southern Pacific company led many to believe that the purchase might be contemplated in the interest of this company. E. L. King, superintendent of the Southern Pacific here, said yesterday that so far as he knew the Southern Pacific had nothing to do with the deals.
