480 BOOKS COLLECTED

Frontier Stories Declared Printed
for Civil War Veterans,
"Who Ate 'Em Up."

NEW YORK, July 14.—(Special.)—Many cemeteries will report unrest in tombs, and many persons now alive will reach for smelling salts upon the breaking of the news that the classic exhibition of the public library, forty-second street and Fifth avenue, will open its doors tomorrow to classified, catalogued display of American dime novels, including the yellow-backed types of most lurid degree. Newspaper and magazine editors, who were invited to an advance showing today were seen to turn whitish and to giggle from nervousness until keys and pennies in pockets rattled.

The awful exhibits under glass cases recalled too poignantly days of boyhood and woodshed and harness leather and furious fathers who had discovered sons reading these same shockers on parental index expurgators. There are 1480 specimens in the exhibition, any one of which is guaranteed to raise the bravest hair, curdle the most pasteurized blood, and send chilly waves down the warmest spines of the most granite-hearted readers.

Dr. Frank P. O'Brien presented them to the library, and the collection bears the name of "Beadle." Since most of them are publications of literature, Aesthetes would write here "sic." The factory was founded by Erastus Beadle, an Otsego, N. Y., printer, who began producing dime novels in New York City in 1859. After a great success with a dime novel book published in Buffalo, Beadle was the world's first dime novel publisher. Hurrah for the U. S. A. This cheer is not ironic, for it appears after dissertations in the Atlantic Monthly and other critical analysis, that the shivery romances are the most decent ever written.

In not one of the 1480 scare-generators at the library does vice ever conquer virtue. Friends in human form invariably suffer dire punishment, and manly men and women are always able in the end to sigh with satisfaction over the inevitable records of righteousness.

Stories Are Clean.

"Bars and Buffers" is the worst course found on any page printed by the house of Beadle & Adams, as it was known in its days of greatest affluence. Young soldiers of the civil war started the dime novel on its way to glory. They ate 'em up. The first stories were glorifications of the American pioneer.

Beadle had come from an old American pioneer family. Then he got around to city life. The last of the Beadle series appeared in 1892. "Wishah, the Child Spy" was one of these, and the cover shows two villains, one a beary and the other a slick dude, faced in the woods by a flapper wearing a fringed leather skirt, moccasins, feathers in hair and adorned with a musket in one hand, a revolver in the other, a dirk in her belt and a spitting snake coiled about her throat as another agency of offense.

"Who are you?" demanded Haidrick when he found his voice. "Wishah," replied the little maiden with the utmost composure. That's on the cover. And that kind of young lady's literature, which Beadle turned out in thousands at this period, probably is what has given us the swashbuckling maiden of today.

"Deadwood Dick," "Jack Harkaway," "Calamity Jane" and "Deadly Eye," the first of the Buffalo Bill stories, were Beadle originals. It is interesting to learn that some of Beadle's imitators were formerly employees of his house, and a learned treatise written about Beadle for the library's July bulletin declares that these later frontier and adventure stories were degenerate imitations, lacking the Beadle vigor.

Thirty-one Types Found.
Among the 31 types into which the collection is divided, we find "Deadwood Dick" stories among type J, beginning in 1884. Type J seems to be the start-off of the alliterative titles, for the companion stories concern "Cattle King Charlie," "Dick Darling," "Roaring Ralph Rockwood," "The Double Daggers," "Sharp Sam" and "Photographic Phil."

Why say it? All the redskins bite the dust, all hero scouts shooting pieces are trusty rifles that ring out on the night air, and coaches are always held up in Dead Man's gulch, and Dandy Dick, the detective, always wins.

Then Beadle & Adams turned their attention to "Select Speakers" and the "Ladies' Letter Writer," also to popular songs, the sauciest being "The Sign of the Cross" and "Feather." But in 1891 they were still causing cold sweats with "Mustang Morrie's Mandate" and "Lightning Lee's Luck."

MR. FORDNEY ON COAST

AUTHOR OF TARIFF BILL NOW
VISITING IN ABERDEEN.Prediction Is Made That Legis-
lation Will Be Rushed When
Congress Resumes.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 14.—When the members of the congress get back on the job after the mid-summer recess the tariff bill, now before the senate, will be passed with some modifications, which doubtless will be made in the upper house, the bonus bill will go through, the railroad strike will be settled and the business of the country will go along in the even tenor of its way, and prosperity will extend until the country has reached the condition of normalcy, which is generally desired.

These opinions were expressed today by Joseph Fordney, chairman of the house ways and means committee, who is here for a stay of a few days on business and to visit relatives. Mr. Fordney talked also of his retirement, stating that his determination was final. He also stated that it was not influenced by any fear that he could not be elected.

In fact, Mr. Fordney said, he believed that should he run there would be no democratic opposition candidate. His long service, he believed, had earned him the rest and freedom from official cares he desired. Mr. Fordney has large timber interests here and will spend considerable time looking after them, but will make his home in Saginaw, Mich.

2 SLAYERS ESCAPE
AFTER FATAL CRASHArizona Sheriff Is Killed in
Auto Upset.

DEPUTY IS STUNNED

Injury to Official Who Lost Life
Is Said to Indicate Being
Struck on Head.

TUCSON, Ariz., July 14.—George White, sheriff of Santa Cruz county, was killed, and Manuel Martinez and Placido Silvas, convicted murderers, escaped last night when an automobile in which the prisoners were being taken to the state penitentiary at Florence overturned on the Nogales-Tucson highway near Continental, 18 miles south of here.

Sheriff's posse from Tucson and Nogales began searching for the escaped convicts.

Sheriff White was driving the car, which left the road and overturned. Martinez and Silvas, shackled together, were riding in a rear seat. The supposition was that one of the pair struck White on the head from behind, causing him to lose control of the automobile.

Deputy Sheriff Stunned.

Deputy Sheriff Smith, who was seated in the machine beside White, was stunned.

Martinez was sentenced to hang next month and Silvas was given a life term as a result of their conviction in Nogales of the murder of Postmaster and Mrs. J. Frank Pearson of Ruby, Ariz., who were slain last August in a bandit raid.

The body of Sheriff White was brought to Tucson today by Deputy Sheriff Munger, who said that Deputy Sheriff Smith's condition was such that he was unable to explain the cause of the wreck.

Traces of Blow Found.

Deputy Munger stated that the skull of the dead sheriff seemed to indicate he had been struck on the head with some heavy instrument, but that the entire body was badly crushed and bruised by the overturning of the car.

NOGALES, Ariz., July 14.—Manuel Martinez, who with Placido Silvas was convicted of murder for the slaying of Postmaster and Mrs. J. Frank Pearson of Ruby, Ariz., was to have been hanged August 18. Silvas faced a life sentence in the penitentiary.

The Parsons were shot to death when a gang of bandits rode into Ruby on horses and raided and looted the Ruby postoffice. The two convicts who escaped last night near Continental when Sheriff White was killed were the only ones of the bandit gang captured after the raid on the Ruby postoffice.

TOURIST PARTY IS HERE

Columbus, O., Citizens Taken
Over Columbia Highway.

After having completed the southern portion of a complete tour around the United States, a party of 50 persons from Columbus, O., arrived in Portland yesterday morning for a two-day stop. During the afternoon they were taken about the city and over the Columbia highway. All expressed themselves as highly pleased with the northwestern country.

The party already has toured through Colorado, Utah and California and will return to their homes via Seattle and then eastward along the Canadian border. The party is under the personal supervision of Colonel T. T. Smith, civil war veteran, who has been engaged in conducting tours about the United States for 40 years.

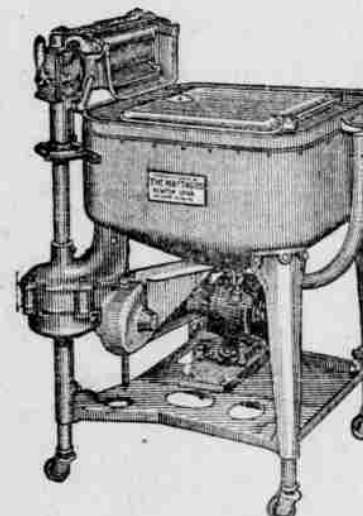
