CITY PROTESTS TAX.—A protest against the assessment of the 2-cent tax on gasoline against the city, was made by Frank S. Grant, city attorney, yesterday in a letter to Attorney-General Van Winkle. In the letter Mr. Grant asked for an opinion from the attorney-general as to whether the state could impose such a tax on the city. The tax on gasoline was created by the state legislature in 1921, when it placed a tax of 2 cents a gallon on all gasoline consumed in the state. The contention of the city is that the city cannot tax a municipality. Mr. Grant and S. C. Pier, commissioner of finance, have been appointed a committee to investigate the matter. The city commissioners recently received a communication from Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, demanding license fees for city automobiles for the last two years.

FIRE ENGINE TRUCK.—In order to avoid striking an automobile piloted by a woman driver while answering a fire call yesterday, fire engine No. 7, with the rear end of a truck at Grand avenue and East Morrison street, causing slight injuries to two of the firemen. The engine was answering a call on East Belmont street when it reached the traffic congestion at Grand avenue. The truck, it was charged, failed to give right-of-way, and the driver, C. P. Lehl, 794 East Eleventh street, North, was arrested on that charge. The injured firemen are R. B. Lillis and R. Eldridge. Lillis was taken to St. Vincent's hospital. It was said his knee might be fractured.

JUNE FINES \$11,925.50.—During the month of June the municipal court collected a total of \$11,925.50 in fines, forfeited bail and costs, according to the report of Judge Ekwall filed with the city auditor. The largest item was that of fines, \$11,925.50 being assessed against the breakers of municipal ordinances.

CRUISE CONVENTION PLANNED.

The Guernsey breeders of Washington and a few from Oregon and Idaho will meet in Seattle the evening of July 26, and will leave about midnight for a three-day trip among the islands of San Juan and inland counties. Two stops will be made in Clallam county. These three counties are becoming noted as Guernsey centers. The visitors will not only have an opportunity to view some excellent scenery, for which these sections are noted, but will have a chance to inspect some good Guernsey cattle. Elaborate arrangements are being made to entertain the visitors at the various stops, where they will be treated with picnics, barbecues and clam bakes on the beach.

APPEAL FOR PICKERS MADE.—An appeal for berry pickers and cannery workers was made yesterday to Mayor Baker by D. E. Towle, manager of the Berry Growers' association of Gresham. Unless 300 hands are obtained immediately, Mr. Towle informed the mayor, the berry growers of eastern Multnomah county will sustain serious losses. Due to the unusually hot weather the berry crop has ripened more rapidly this year than ever before, and for this reason a large number of pickers are needed. Should the growers lose heavily on their investments this year, Mr. Towle said, the industry is apt to be killed.

MONTANA NEEDS HARVESTERS.—An army of harvesters is needed in Montana, according to advices received yesterday by Arthur W. Jones, director of the public employment bureau, from the chief of the division of labor of Montana, who asked that unemployed men in search of work be directed toward that state. Because of recent rains, it was said, Montana will have the largest wheat crop in its history. An inquiry into available harvest help, however, developed the fact that 14 counties alone need 3000 additional men and work will be available for from eight to ten weeks.

COMPLAINTS.—Complaints have been made by a number of residents along Lombard street, in the vicinity of University street, that rubbish has been allowed to accumulate at the street corners of the vacant lots from Greeley street to St. Johns. Through a misunderstanding a number of residents believed that the city street cleaning department would continue as of old again this year and gather up the rubbish if it is placed in convenient places. The city has discontinued the practice and the rubbish remains. Now there is an effort to get the city to clean it up.

MISS GARRISON IS VISITING HERE.—Miss Margaret Garrison, well-known reader and entertainer, is spending some time at the home of her sister, Mrs. E. S. Huckabay, 1132 Mallory avenue, while the Ellison-White Chautauque company, with which she is now associated, is filling its engagements in this part of the state. This is Miss Garrison's initial appearance on the Chautauque circuit; nevertheless, she has won a high place as an entertainer because of the quality of her work and her pleasing personality.

HIGH SCHOOL EFFORTS CONTINUED.—Although little encouragement has been offered the members of the Westmoreland Community club by the school directors of district No. 1, in an effort to get a high school building in the southeastern part of the city, the club will continue its efforts. Ways and means of getting the matter before the directors were discussed at the regular monthly business meeting of the community organization.

MOTORBOAT SMOKER IS PLANNED.—Members of the Portland Motorboat club will gather at the clubhouse July 25 for a smoker and jubilee in celebration of the completion of the membership drive, which has been going on for the past few days. Four prizes will be awarded for the members bringing in the greatest number of applications, including a ship's clock and a fine pair of field glasses. The next regatta of the club has been set for July 29 on the river.

BAD ROAD POSTPONES CAMP.—The establishment of a camp at Lost Lake by Samuel C. Lancaster has been put off until next year because of the poor condition of the road leading to the lake. A party headed by Mr. Lancaster and who visited the lake recently reported that the road was almost impassable, due to premature use during the wet season. The forest service has recommended the closing of the road until it is in shape.

LABOR RADICAL TO SPEAK.—William Z. Foster, leader in the radical movement in the trade-unions and opponent of Samuel Gompers, will speak for Russian famine relief at the municipal auditorium next Wednesday night at 8 o'clock. The next evening, in the Lincoln high school auditorium, he will discuss "The Crisis in the American Labor Movement."

COURT GIRLS GIVE PLAY.—A benefit play to assist in the fund for the new library building in University park was given by the girls' classes of St. Andrew's Episcopal church in St. Andrew's parish house recently. The play was an adaptation of Grimm's fairy tales on "King Thrusheard." A substantial fund was netted for the new building, now nearly completed.

GARBAGE DUMPER FINED.—Failure to observe a health sign on Terwilliger boulevard, prohibiting the dumping of garbage in that vicinity, cost J. Andrews a \$20 fine in police court yesterday. Police caught him just as he was dumping a few sacks of garbage within a few feet of one of these signs. He was fined an additional \$1 for operating his automobile without a driver's license.

THUG CHOKES WOMAN

VICTIM IS DRAGGED INTO BRUSH BUT ESCAPES.

Pleadings of Mrs. E. R. Bush
 Lead Offender to Take Watch and Then Depart.

Mrs. E. R. Bush, 79 West Jarrett street, was choked into insensibility and robbed of a Swiss wrist watch late Thursday afternoon, after alighting from a St. Johns street car, she reported to the police yesterday. The attack took place near Concord and Jessup streets, she said, when a roughly dressed man seized her and choked her until she became unconscious. After she had revived a bit, she said, she was carried to a clump of brush, where her assailant started to attack her. Her pleadings caused him to let her go after taking her watch. She described him as being about 30 years old. He wore dark blue bib overalls, a dark gray coat and a black hat.

The attack on Mrs. Bush is but one of a series of similar acts in Portland during the last few months and police thus far have been unable to apprehend any of them. The thug who attacked Mrs. Bush does not answer the description of the man who has been seen lately in other parts of the city.

Early in June residents of the Mount Scott district reported to the police that some old man had been accosting small children and had made several attempts to attack little girls.

During the last three weeks reports have been received at intervals of a young man who has been annoying young girls in the Mount Scott park. Several small children narrowly escaped him before he left that part of the city.

Chief Jenkins has issued instructions to the police to make every effort to apprehend these men, as conditions have become so bad that parents are afraid to permit their children to leave their homes without older escorts.
