

WRECK OF TRAIN IS TRIED IN TEXAS

Bloodhounds Are Put on
Gang's Trail.

ONLY ENGINE DERAILED

Delay of 20 Minutes in Service
Is Reported by Texas &
Pacific Receiver.

DALLAS, Texas, July 16.—An attempt was made to wreck the Texas and Pacific passenger train Number 21 from New Orleans, west bound for El Paso, this morning. Bloodhounds have been placed on the trail of men who made the attempt, J. L. Lancaster, receiver for the Texas and Pacific lines, declared tonight.

The engine of the train was derailed a few miles from Marshall, Texas, which is about 30 miles west of Shreveport, La. Mr. Lancaster said, according to reports to his office, only a 20-minute delay resulted, he said.

EACH SIDE IS HOPEFUL

Vell of Silence Descends Over
Rail Strike Situation.

CHICAGO, July 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—A veil of silence descended like a blanket over the railway strike situation today as both rail heads and strike leaders turned hopeful eyes toward the momentous developments the new week was expected to bring forth.

The bitterness which has marked the progress of the walkout at times during the past two weeks, seemed to have been succeeded by a peace almost approaching an understanding.

Railway executives who declared their willingness last night to attend any meeting called by the United States railroad labor board with a view to effecting a settlement, "that would not nullify, but would uphold and carry out the board's decisions," spent the holiday in deep seclusion.

B. M. Jewell, leader of the striking shophmen, visited his almost deserted headquarters for a short time only to read his mail and telegrams.

He read the rail executives' statement with a grin, but refused to make any comment. "There'll be nothing over the week end," he reiterated.

"I can't say a word, son, not one word," Ben Hooper, chairman of the labor board, sighed wearily, throwing his arm across the shoulders of the reporter who had found him alone in the offices of the board.

Despite the silence of the leaders, hopes of an early settlement were expressed freely in both railway and labor circles, although no tangible basis for these expectations was given.

One of the factors often quoted to justify a belief that the drift was toward peace, despite the failure last week of Mr. Hooper's efforts to bring the shoulders of the executives together, was the statement of R. A. Henning, general chairman of the Federated Shop Crafts of the Northwest, that only the refusal of eastern roads to agree to reinstate striking shophmen with their full seniority rights is preventing a settlement of the strike as far as the northwest roads are concerned.

The railroads throughout, it was declared, have insisted that their men return to work as one of the first steps toward peace, and the belief was expressed that the restoration of the rights sought alone would not prove a great stumbling block in the way of a full settlement. In this connection a member of the labor board asserted that the roads had stopped the recruiting of men to replace the strikers, at least to a large extent.

STRIKE SURVEY IS STARTED

San Bernardino Sheriff Acts on
Request of Governor.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., July 16.—W. A. Shay, sheriff of San Bernardino county, this morning began a survey of the strike situation in response to a telegram received from Governor Stephens asking for full details as the result of requests for troops for protection of Santa Fe shops here.

Sheriff Shay stated an inspection of the shop district showed all strikers' pickets had been withdrawn and no further action had been stopped this morning by strikers in the Cajon pass region.

Sheriff Shay telegraphed the governor that the situation here is much improved.

The Santa Fe has made an appeal to the governor for protection of trains.

NEW STRIKE IS THREATENED

Roads Warned to Cease Trying to
Have Shop Work Done.

DETROIT, Mich., July 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Railroads must cease their reported efforts to compel maintenance of way workers to perform the duties of striking shophmen or the maintenance of way men will be called out on strike, E. F. Grable, international president of the Maintenance of Way Brotherhood, declared here tonight.

Mr. Grable indicated that in any event no strike action by his organization could be expected before Thursday, the date he has set for a meeting here of the Brotherhood's grand lodge, which includes the general chairmen of all divisions and members of the executive council.

ALL DEPUTIES ARE CALLED

Attack Made on North Carolina
Railroad Yards.

ROCKY MOUNT, N. C., July 16.—All available deputy sheriffs in Edgecombe county were called to duty today following an attack upon a squad of railroad guards. In a proclamation to strikers, the city authorities warned that further outbreaks would result in a request that troops be sent to control the situation.

A number of the guards were kidnapped, taken into the woods and severely beaten. Two of them were reported to have been seriously injured.

LOCAL CONDITIONS IMPROVE

Great Northern and Northern Pacific Roads Issue Warning.

Employees of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific lines on strike must return to their work before 10 A. M. tomorrow or lose all seniority and pension rights, according to notices received from the headquarters of those lines yesterday by A. J. Davidson, general manager of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle line here.

Mr. Davidson said that conditions locally were improving and the places of the men on strike were gradually being filled. He estimated that between 61 and 62 per cent of a normal force was now being worked among the crafts on strike. The biggest shortage, he said, was in the shop force.

Other railroad officials reported that matters seemed to be working themselves out in a satisfactory manner here.

North Carolina Troops Requested.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 16.—Request for troops was sent to Governor Morrison tonight by the mayor of Rocky Mount and the sheriffs of Edgecombe and Nash counties to block in the way of a full settlement. In this connection a member of the labor board asserted that the roads had stopped the recruiting of men to replace the strikers, at least to a large extent.

13 Special Agents Kidnaped.

ROCKY MOUNT, N. C., July 16.—Six of the 13 special agents and guards of the Atlantic Coast Line railroad who were kidnaped early today by a mob of alleged strikers and some sympathizers were still missing tonight. Four of the men were located during the day at Elm City and three at Wilson, several of the rescued having been so roughly handled by their captors as to require medical attention.

Masked Men Assemble.

RENO, Nev., July 16.—A party of masked men, believed to be sympathizers of the striking railroad shophmen, assembled near Sparks, railroad division point, five miles from here, about 9:15 o'clock tonight. Governor Boyle and other state officers left for the scene soon afterward. There were said to be about 20 men in the party.

Mass Meeting Is Called.

WACO, Tex., July 16.—Call for a mass meeting of members of all the 15 standard railroad unions in Texas to be held in Waco next Tuesday to consider the strike situation was issued today following a meeting here of 500 representatives of the unions.

UTAH DEMOCRATS SEEK CHURCH AID

Party Wants Mormon Help
to Elect Senator.

KING LIKELY TO LOSE

Republicans Confident of Victory
in Fall Elections Whatever
Turn Events Take.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, July 16.—(Special.)—Democrats, badly split in this state, profess to see some hope of capturing seat in the United States senate this autumn by the nomination of Ernest Bamberger, a non-Mormon, by the republican state convention held here yesterday.

But admittedly, it is a faint hope. Bamberger, whom the republicans nominated, is a nephew of ex-Governor Bamberger. Here is the way the Bourbon leaders here argue that they have a chance to elect a democratic United States senator from Utah.

They say that ever since Apostle Reed Smoot was sent to Washington, it has been recognized that no non-Mormon has a chance to be senator. They assert that it is the policy of the higher powers of the Mormon church to maintain a Mormon democrat and Mormon republican as senators, so that the church in this state will always be certain of a voice with the ruling powers.

Mormon Democrat In.

That is the situation at present, Senator King being the democratic Mormon. Mr. King, however, despite his many activities in Washington and the wide advertising he has received, has not been able to hold his own party, and there is strong probability that he will be denied a renomination.

Because of this split, the republicans thought they had an opportunity to win a seat this year. If they nominated a candidate who stood well enough with the church to insure that it would not oppose him, they would have a good chance to win.

Now the democrats declare that they will be certain of drawing the silent influence of the hierarchy if they nominate a strong man. W. W. Armstrong, a big banker, and William R. Wallace, formerly state chairman, who is also wealthy, are making a fight for the place and it is believed one of them will make the nomination from Senator King.

Publicly the church authorities are keeping their hands off the senatorial contest, but it is well known that in the October general conference of the church the priesthood, whose members reach to every small subdivision of the state, generally get a hint of the state of mind of the first presidency; and this hint is extremely powerful with Mormon voters, especially the women. The democrats hope that the hint will be to favor the democratic nominee.

Large Force Fights Fire.

Advice received here said the flames had been confined principally to the old slush-hags, very little green timber had been damaged and the fire was believed to be under control.

UNDER STRIKE CONDITIONS BEST EXPLAINED BY CHAIRMAN BEN W. HOOPER OF THE UNITED STATES RAILROAD LABOR BOARD IN HIS STATEMENT OF JULY 1ST READING AS FOLLOWS:

"In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employees. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions, which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop crafts are striking.

"Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason public sentiment and full government power will protect the men who remain in their positions and new men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been made for the full protection of all new employees, the same as old employees who have remained loyally at work. Applicants should apply to the office of the superintendent at Portland (Union station), or to the assistant superintendent at Roseburg.
